## Councilmen Approve Tax Abatement District

City aldermen gathered Feb. 12 for their monthly meeting in the City Hall. Present were mayor George Terry; councilmen June Suggs, W.A. Bentley, and Harold Fabian; city secretary Stella Lee; and City superintendent Bob Glenn.

In their first action of the night, councilmen rejected the request to purchase a copier for Lovett Memorial Library.

Ordinance #216 establishing the Tax Abatement District was passed on its first meeting. The ordinance was drawn up as an emergency ordinance by lawyer Don Lane.

Tax Abatement Contracts were tabled.

Bid received concerning the covering of land at the old dump ground were rejected, due to a misunderstanding of the amount to be covered. The council will ask for new bids, and will open them March 12.

In further action, councilmen decided to pay employees \$2 extra for each dog caught.

A two-way radio was purchased for the new city pickup, at a cost of \$800, installed, and bids will be taken for the sale of the 1968 pickup currently owned by the city.

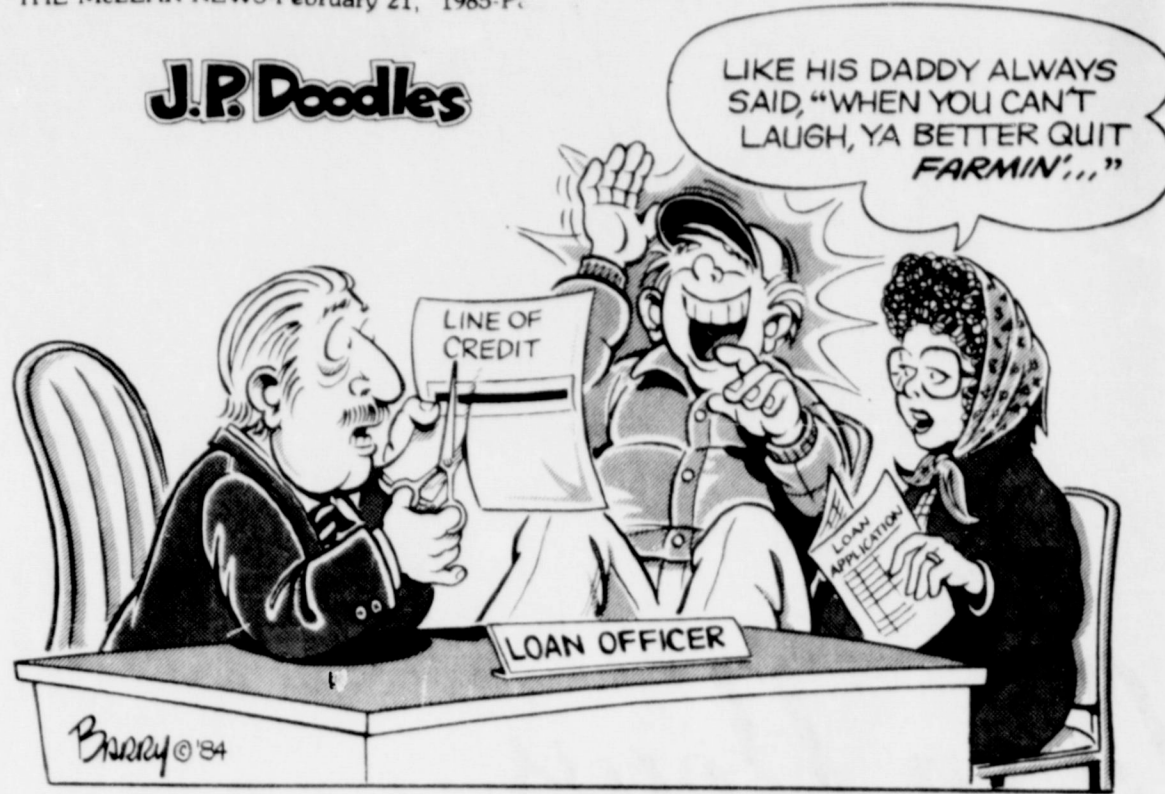

## Boyd L. Thompson Files For Board

Boyd Lee Thompson became the first local citizen to file for one of the two three-year trustee positions opening on the local school board, according to business manager Shirley Johnson.

Filing for positions in the school and city elections will continue until the March 6 deadline. There are two trustee positions open in the school election, and those are currently held by Joe Magee and Loyd Hunt. Neither man has filed for re-election at this time.

At presstime, the only person having filed in the city election

was George Green, who filed last week for one of the two-year full-term alderman positions.

There are two full-term alderman positions, one one-year unexpired term, and the mayor's term open for re-election in

the city elections. Councilman W.A. Bentley's term is one of the positions open, and he has not yet filed for re-election. The other two terms were previously held by Loyd Bybee and Wayne Bybee, who resigned their posts last summer.

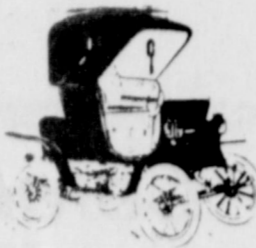

I left the program proud of youngsters...and yet feeling slightly depressed about the whole program.

I know it's really important for our youngsters to be aware of the dangers of strangers, especially now that child kidnapping and child abuse are such prevalent crimes.

It hurts me to think that my children at ages six and four have to attend seminars warning them about potentially dangerous situations and criminals.

But I also know that it's better for them to be informed about the possible dangers than to be naive and potential victims. In that respect, I was really thankful for the professionals who took time from their busy schedules to come to McLean and inform our children...and we parents.

It's not a pleasant subject or thought. But, as two sad parents in Chillicothe will profess, it's happening. And it's something we'd better think about and warn our children about.

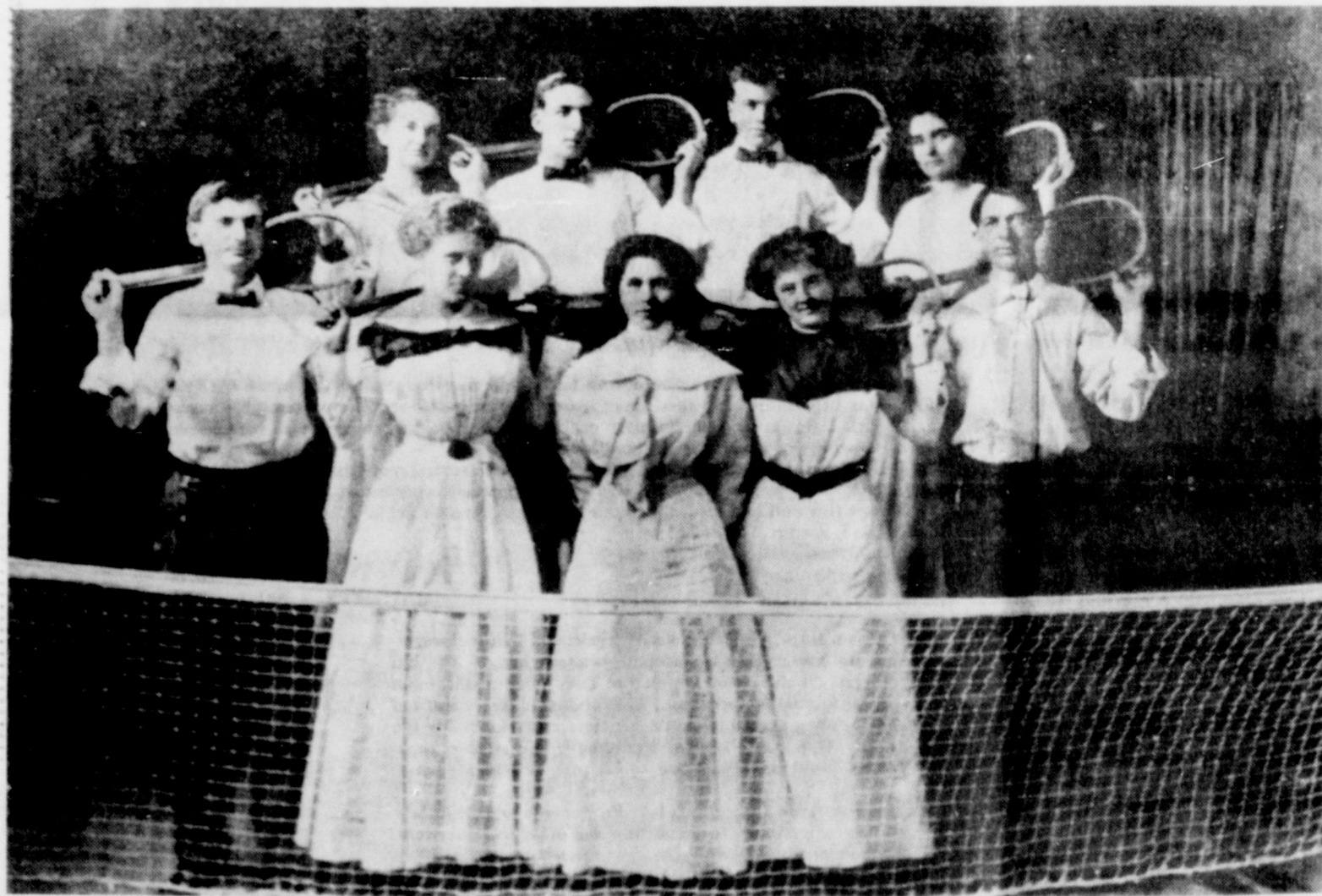

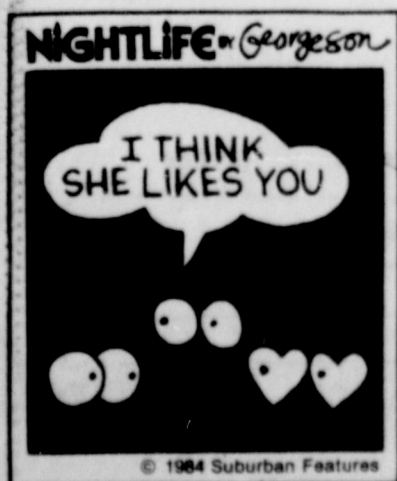

# Basic sauce makes pasta dishes easy

It started in France, home of many of the world's great culinary traditions. Today, it is popular in urban areas across the nation.

It's nouvelle cuisine, a form of lighter cooking that generally offers smaller portions of interestingly spiced and prepared foods.

For the sophisticated palate, nouvelle cuisine may not be new, but it has recently been gaining popularity among more and more American households.

Hot and cold pasta dishes are among the more popular entries in the nouvelle cuisine — but they're not the traditional spaghetti, lasagne and other fare normally associated with Italian cooking. Pasta salads, seafood-

pasta combinations and other recipes are currently very popular.

The following recipe for a basic tomato sauce is designed to be served with pastas. I recommend making a large batch of the basic sauce, which can be frozen in smaller portions. The variations on the basic sauce can be quickly prepared by defrosting the already cooked basic sauce and adding the additional ingredients.



**BASIC CHUNKY TOMATO SAUCE**  
1 medium onion, coarsely chopped (about 1 cup)  
2 cloves garlic, minced  
2 tablespoons olive oil  
3 cans (14 1/2 ounces each) Del Monte Stewed Tomatoes  
1 can (15 ounces) Del Monte

**Tomato Sauce**  
2 tablespoons crushed oregano  
2 tablespoons crushed basil  
In large saucepan, sauté onion and garlic in oil until onion is soft. Place 1 can of stewed tomatoes in blender container. Cover and run on low 2 seconds. Add to

onion and garlic. Repeat for remaining tomatoes. Add tomato sauce, oregano and basil to saucepan. Boil uncovered 15 minutes, stirring frequently. Serve over

pasta, vegetables or chicken; use in soups and stews; or make a sauce variation.  
Yield: 6 cups.

**CREAMY TOMATO SAUCE**  
2 1/2 cups Del Monte Basic Chunky Tomato Sauce

1/2 cup whipping cream  
Hot cooked pasta  
Chopped parsley  
Combine tomato sauce and cream. Heat through (do not boil). Serve over pasta. Garnish with parsley.  
Yield: 3 cups.
