
men gathered the wood, cooked the meals, took care of the kids, made all the clothes, took care



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

It hurts me to think that my children at ages six and four have to attend seminars warning them about potentially dangerous situations and criminals.







For the sophisticated palate, nouvelle cuisine may not be new, but it has recently been gaining popularity among more and more American households.

Hot and cold pasta dishes are among the more popular entries in the nouvelle cuisine - but they're not the traditional spaghetti, lasagne and other fare normally associated with Italian cooking. Pasta salads, seafoodpasta combinations and other recipes are currently very popular

The following recipe for a basic tomato sauce is designed to be served with pastas. I recommend making a large batch of the basic sauce, which can be frozen in smaller portions. The variations on the basic sauce can be quickly prepared by defrosting the already cooked basic sauce and adding the additional ingredients.



BASIC CHUNKY TOMATO SAUCE

- 1 medium onion, coarsely chopped (about 1 cup)
- 2 cloves garlic, minced 2 tablespoons olive oil
