Scholarship To Be Awarded

That long-awaited hour for most seniors is just around the corner...and I'm sure most parents are feeling many mixed feelings now. We will honor the graduates in a special edition next week - so keep an eye out for it. Good luck and congratulations, seniors!

One person, however, is not on my Sunday list, but I do hope she'll have a special Mother's Day. She is a lady who watches over Kristina and Charlie when I'm at work. She reads them stories, and makes sure they're fed. She lets them help her in the kitchen (ugh!) - she lets them help her in the yard work. She holds them when they're hurt and consoles them when they're upset.

She has not tried to take my place with my children, but has made a place in their hearts that belongs to just her. She gives them love - and they love her. For that I am thankful.

Friday night's graduation exercises will mark the beginning of a new tradition for McLean's seniors, as one of six seniors will be presented the first Madge Page Scholarship by founder Mert Cooper, and principal Ron Cummings.

Madge Demorest Clay Page was born December 23, 1892 in Denton, the youngest child of Calvin Henry Clay and Martha Ellen Townley Clay. She died March 7, 1971, in McLean and is buried in Wheeler.

"Mom" Page, as she was affectionately known to all in her family, moved from Denton in 1901 with her family, to Wheeler.

They lived in a half-dugout on a farm about three miles south-east of Wheeler. She graduated from high school in Wheeler in 1911.

She wanted to go to Normal School (college), but in those days girls in this part of the world simply did not go to college.

Mom Page married James Aubrey Page in Shamrock, June 7, 1911.

"Smokey Joe" Page, as he was called, was quite a baseball player. He pitched in the Minor Leagues, what was then called the Bush League.

He had a contract to pitch for a team in Missoula, Montana.

"Smokey Joe" Page died August 14, 1926, in Elk City, Okla., as the result of a batted ball that hit him in the stomach.

In 1926, Mom Page was windowed at the age of 34 - pregnant and with three small children - the oldest of whom was 14 years old. After her baby was born in January of 1927, she took her young family and moved to Wheeler.

Her children are Verdalee Page Cooper of Pampa, Peggy Pevy of Hobbs, New Mexico, Amos Page of Wimberly, and Joe Page, who is deceased, and was a principal in Pampa.

A widow with four

small children, Mom Page bought into a grocery store in Wheeler. She went broke during the depression selling groceries on credit. She salvaged \$1,500 from the grocery business and bought a variety store in Wheeler.

Mrs. Page later sold her variety store and moved to Lefors where she expanded with three businesses. She had a variety store, a drug store, and a picture show.

In the fall of 1951, Mom Page sold her businesses and moved to McLean, where she bought two picture shows. At one time she also owned a variety store and a cafe in McLean. She also built the Durby Drive In Theatre.

Mom Page was very active in the community of McLean, and was a member of the First United Methodist Church.

The scholarship program, which will present its first recipient with a \$4,000 scholarship Friday night, has been set up by her family.

A scholarship fund has been established at the Booker First State and Trust Bank in Booker.

The recipient of this year's award was decided by a point system, designed by local school officials. Seniors received points for scholastic achievement (the higher the grade point, the more points received); points for sportsmanship; citizenship; leadership; activity (in school, community and church organizations).

The six senior finalists for this year's scholarship are Terri Pipes, Angie Wilson, Bryan Smitherman, Allen Patman, Tommy Milam, and Darin Corley.

Lions Club's 'Journey For Sight' Raises Over \$500

The McLean Lions Club's first annual 'Journey For Sight', held Saturday, was an unqualified success, according to local chairman John M. Haynes.

The journey, a walk-a-thon/jog-a-thon, to raise money to aid the blind or sight-impaired was a six-mile trek, and was undertaken by twenty hardy citizens ranging in age for 10 to 81 years.

Pledge donations from local individuals and

businesses ranged from 25c to \$10 per miles travelled. The total of these donations earned by the determined participants will bring in over \$500. Seventy-five percent of this money will go to local Lions Club sight projects, and twenty-five percent will go to the national organization.

"This is truly a worthy charitable effort and those who donated their money can be assured that it will be used to fill a real need for someone

who otherwise would be unable to obtain help," said Haynes. "The Lions want to thank all those who helped with money donations."

"Lions who deserve credit for their help are Sam A. Haynes, Carl Dwyer, Ron Cummings and Joyce Haynes. All these were on hand Saturday to help with the paper work, organization, refreshments and the money other chores which accompany a production like this," stated Haynes.

"Those who walked or ran the six miles were real heroes of the day, and each of them has our undying thanks for their time and super physical effort," he said.

The day's biggest money-maker was James Smith, who obtained pledges totaling 96 dollars. John C. Haynes, at 81 years of age was the oldest participant. He had pledged totaling 46 dollars.

"We were really pleased with John

Haynes," said a journey-observer. "When they unloaded at McClellan Creek, he headed south, up that long hill and never looked back until he was on top of Graveyard Hill."

A complete list of the donors was not possible, because some of the deals were made verbally, and the club did not want to take the chance to omit anyone.

"We want to stress that the club thanks all who helped in anyway, stated Haynes. "This was our first year - we

learned a lot and will be able to expand and enlarge the project next year."

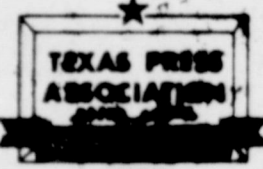

This Sunday mothers all across America will undergo the rigors of Mother's Day. Whether we are lavished with attention or ignored, and we all have experienced both, it will be a day to remember.

When my brother and I were children we would ask Mom what she wanted to receive on her special day. Her answer invariably was, "Anything, so long as I don't have to clean with it, cook with it, or iron it." Being the insightful children that we were, we would turn up Mother's Day morning with an assortment of egg beaters, feather dusters, and all cotton handkerchiefs, because we knew that she was using reverse psychology on us, and we were bound to please. And, being inventive gift givers, the next year we would make her really happy with vacuum cleaner bags, spaghetti tongs, and half a pair of lisle stockings. The only time I can remember as unusual was the Mother's Day I slipped up and gave Mom a jewelry box. Dad thought we were going to have to ship her off to the loony bin in order to get her to stop crying, but I always maintained that a child should be allowed at least one mistake in his lifetime. My brother almost never forgave me for upsetting Mom like that, and still refers to the incident as The Time We Almost Lost Mother Because Of My Stupid Sister.

And I've tried, really I have, but this new generation of children doesn't seem to catch on as quickly as my brother and I did. 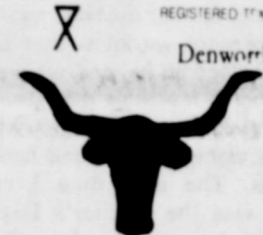
