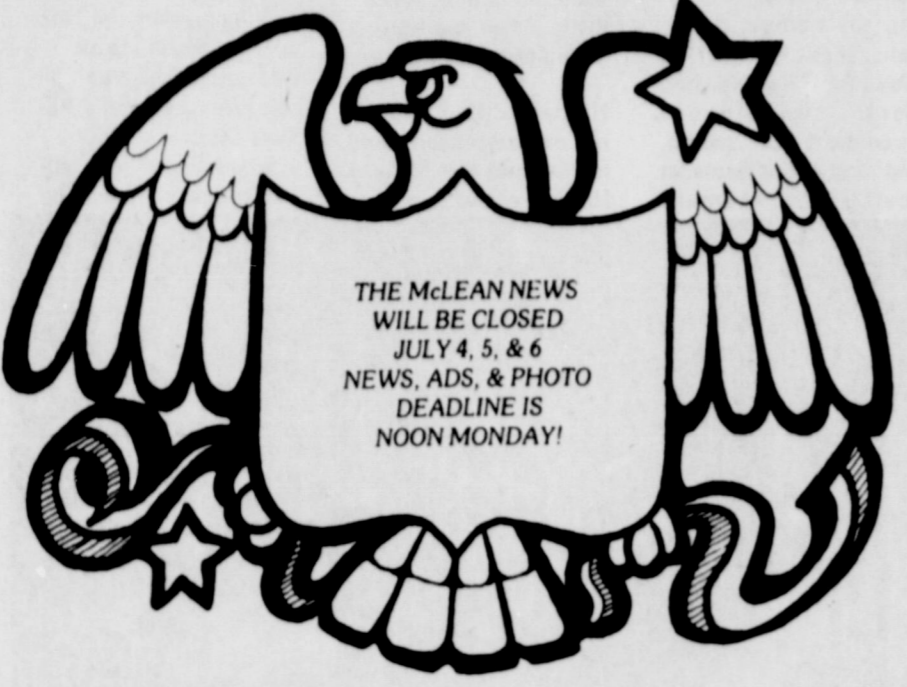

Rodeo Brings Rain And Over 650 Fans

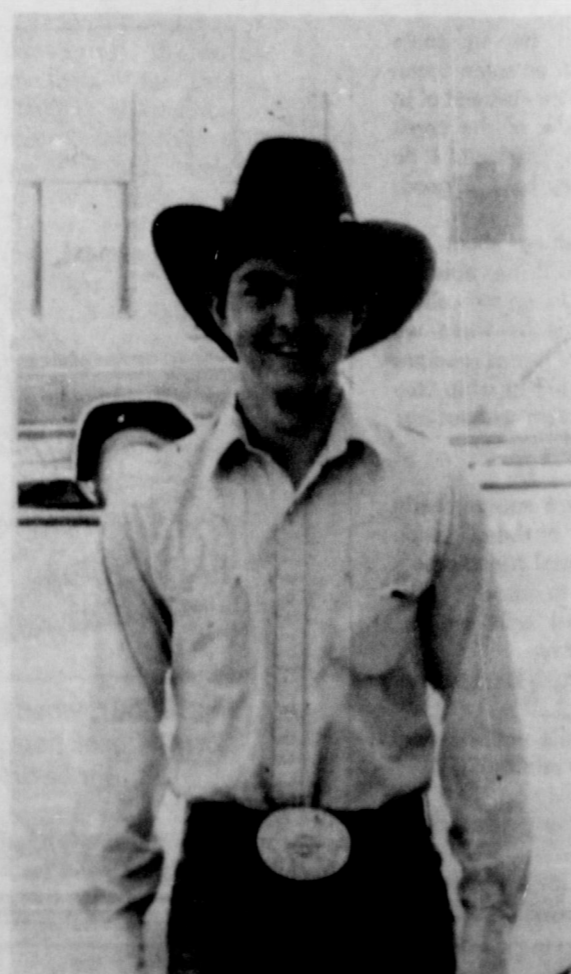

McLean Ambulance Association Sets July 1 Open House

The Ambulance Association had responsibility to equip the new ambulance. "It will run approximately \$30,000 to equip the ambulance", stated McLean paramedic Bill Thomas. "Although the ambulance is mostly equipped now, those funds will have to come out of the local ambulance service, donations, etc." The ambulance will be complete with an advanced life-support, an IV Therapy, Cardiac Monitoring, and Air Way Management. Raising the legal drinking age nationally from 18 to 21 is, in our opinion, a wise and proper thing to do, and we hope the Congress, in its wisdom, is going to do it. But we think it is important that we remember why the legal drinking age, nationally, was lowered to 18 in the first place.

We were wrong on both counts. Now we are appalled by the slaughter on

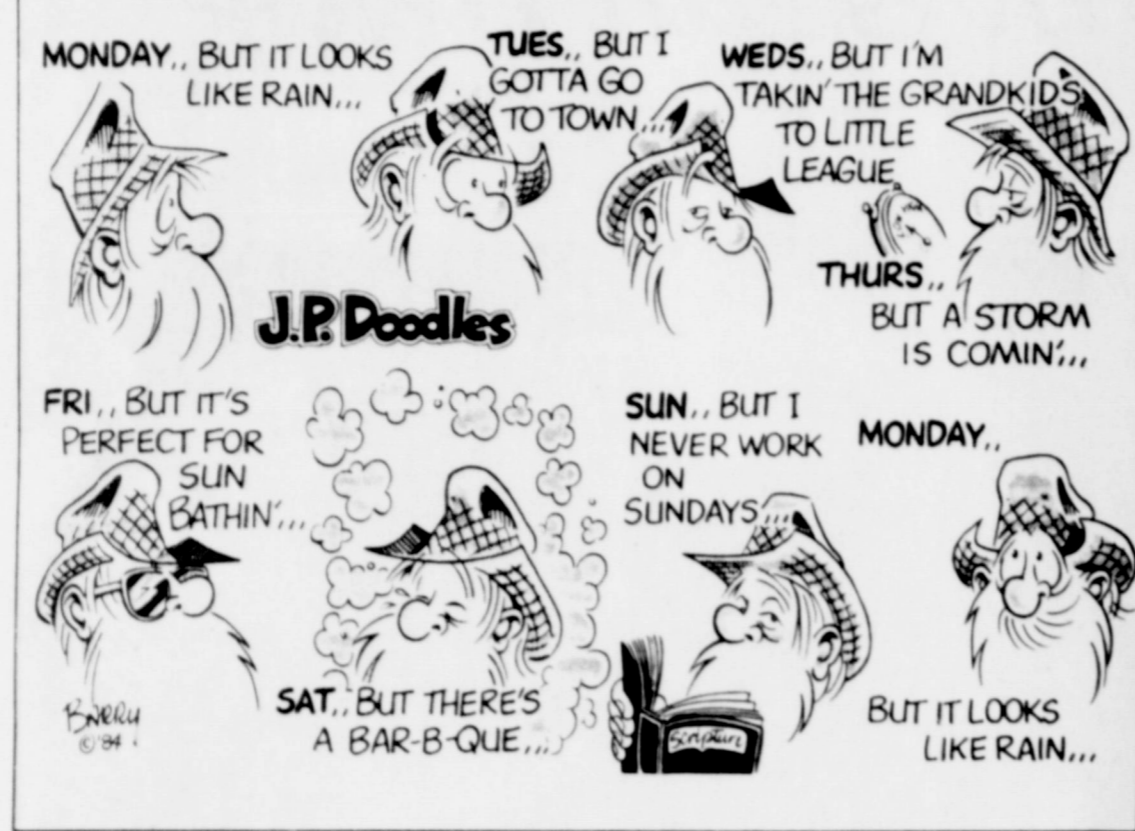
our highways from teen-age drinkers, and there is a hue and cry to raise the drinking age. Fine...but let's raise the fighting age, too.

If we're going to require our kids to be older and wiser before they shoulder the responsibilities of handling alcohol, we also owe them the opportunity to become older and wiser before they shoulder guns and take on the responsibilities of killing people on the battlefields.

We could all stand a little more maturity before we destroy our world.

The first fan was made in 1886 by Schuyler S. Wheeler who placed a propeller on the end of a shaft which he turned with an electric motor.

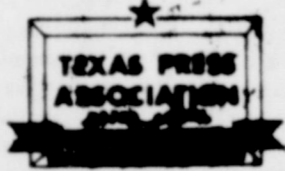

"Isn't this the Marbles residence?" my poor, misguided neighbor whimpered.

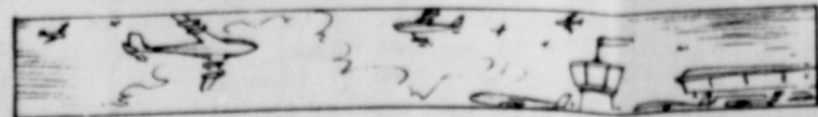
"No, it isn't," answered whoever it was on the other end of the line.

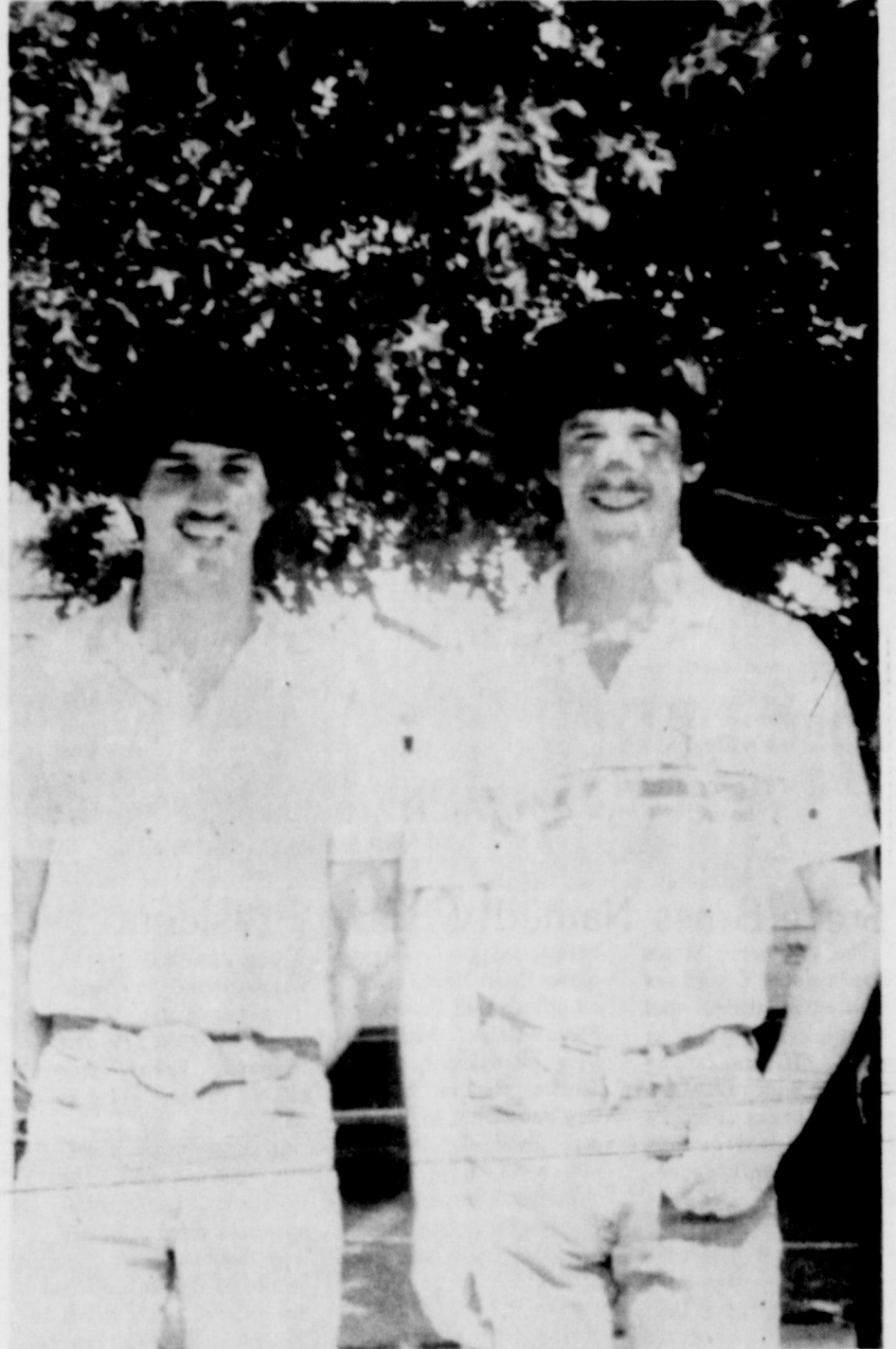
Kevin McDowell received the Clark Foundation Scholarship





Steve Brass Named WSBBA President

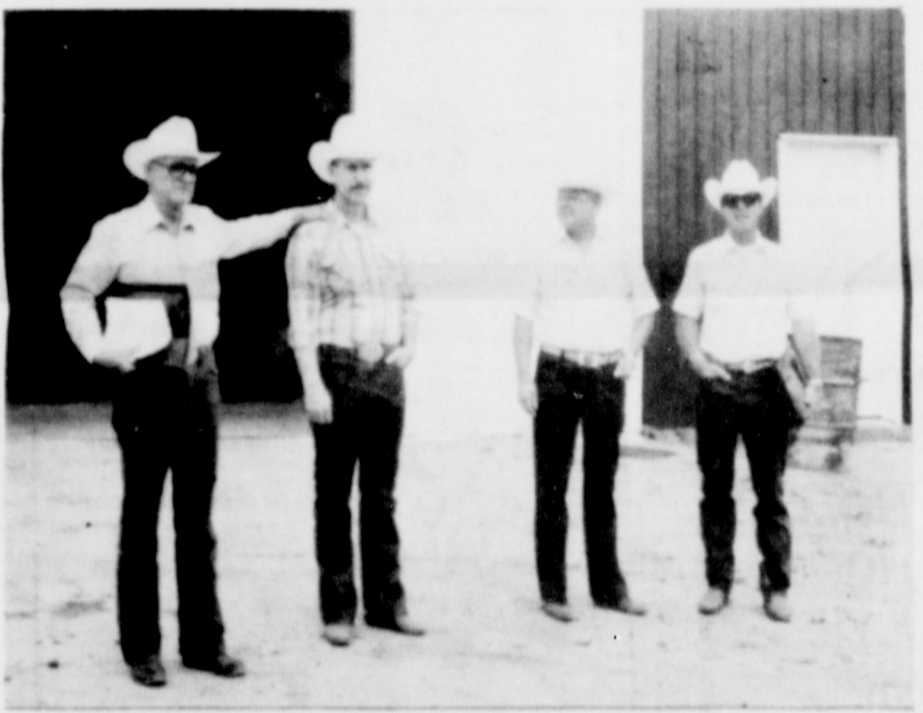

The course will cover the most current tech-

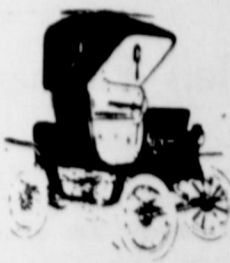
niques for resuscitating drowning victims, handling back and neck injuries in the water, and recovery principles for open water.

Instructors will be from Northwest Texas Hospital and Panhandle Emergency Medical Services from Amarillo.

The cost for the course will be \$30 per person. This will include lunch, which will be served at






