Smitherman Receives Madge Page Scholarship

Last week was one of those weeks - a non-stop whirlwind of activities. We had baccalaureate, graduation, and Mother's Day all lumped into a few days.

We managed to make it though-although, if we had had a senior graduating I'm not sure we would have made it.

A special thanks to friend, Angie Wilson for wishing me a public "Happy Mother's Day"! Angie decorated the windows of the news office sometime early Sunday morning or late Saturday night-and although I didn't see them until Monday morning, the thought was appreciated.

Angie keeps counting down the days she has left before she goes to work at Ceta Canyon for the summer camps. I'm not sure if she's doing this for my benefit or hers, but I think I will miss her and her daily surprises and notes.

Friday will bring about my 26th birthday, and for the first time, I don't dread becoming another year older.

Perhaps it's because 26 doesn't sound too terribly old. Or perhaps it's just that I feel fortunate to be facing another year with no major problems facing me.

On our way to church Sunday morning, Wayne and I passed a family camped on the side of the road, in an old, delapidated camper. A 1951 Chevy was parked beside the camper, and looked in dire need of attention.

The family itself was numerous - we counted four children about 3-10 years old, and then saw a baby.

The family was still there when we returned home from church that afternoon. With the temperatures shooting toward 90, we wondered how they would keep themselves and the baby comfortable in the small shelter they had provided for themselves.

We decided to inform local officials of their obvious plight Monday, and see if we couldn't get them some type of help, but they were gone.

It's possible that they weren't in as much difficulty as we believed them to be. However, the incident made me thankful for our air-conditioned home and trusty ol' car.

The recent publicity about young mother Terri Linz, formerly of Miami has made me thankful for my own good health and good fortune. She underwent transplant surgery Sunday, and we are hoping for the best for her and her family.

This young woman is the victim of a rare disease, and without the transplants, she had little hope. She is also the mother of three small children, and I'm sure this new chance at life has meant much to her

The Madge Page Scholarship, McLean's newest award, was presented by founder Mert Cooper for the first time, during graduation ceremonies Friday night at First Baptist Church.

Named "Outstanding, All-around Senior" and receiving the award, was salutatorian Bryan Smitherman.

The \$4,000 scholarship was founded this year by members of Mrs. Page's family. A \$25,000 fund has been established in the Booker First State and Trust Bank in Booker by the family, to insure the annual awarding of the scholarship.

Smitherman, the 18-year-old son of Tony and Monta Jean Smitherman, was previously awarded a \$4,000 Texas Tech Dean's Scholarship, a \$500 Gray County Extension scholarship, and the Independent Colleges and Universities scholarship that will cover tuition costs.

Smitherman plans to attend Texas Tech University in the fall, and will major in pre-med.

Speeches from Smitherman and Valedictorian Allen Patman highlighted the commencement exercises, along with the singing of the class song and the school song.

Patman, the 18-year-

old son of Ed and Lisa Patman, finished the year with a grade average of 98. He also received the Texas Education Agency scholarship, awarded to the highest ranking senior to cover tuition expenses.

Patman has enrolled at the University of Texas in Austin, and will study architecture.

Dr. James Cornett, former president of West Texas State University, was the guest speaker.

Also honored was Angie Wilson, the highest ranking girl in the class and the third-ranked student over-all. Miss Wilson will also receive a Texas Education Agency scholarship to cover tuition costs. She has already been named the recipient of a dean's scholarship from McMurry College and was awarded the McLean Beta Sigma Phi and McLean Volleyball Association scholarships.

Miss Wilson will attend McMurry College in the fall. She plans to major in pre-med. Angie is the 18-year-old daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Billy Wilson.

After the graduation ceremonies, a reception sponsored by the senior's parents was held in the basement of the Baptist Church.

McLean City Fathers Discuss Town Zoning

The McLean City Council met in regular session May 8 at 7 p.m. The meeting was called to order by Mayor George Terry, with the following members present: Loyd Bybee, Wayne Bybee, June Suggs, W. A. Bentley, Dr. H.F. Fabian; city secretary, Stella Lee; city superintendent Bob Glenn; Jim Finkenbinder and Lloyd Kurtz.

Minutes of the April meetings were read and approved.

Motion by Fabian, seconded by Bentley, all present voting in favor of motion, to designate a

law officer to handle the dog and cat problems and enforce city ordinances, subject to clarification of state laws from the Attorney General's office.

Motion by Lloyd Bybee, seconded by Suggs, all present voting in favor of motion, for city to lay gas and water lines to property line on cost plus 10% basis. Patching streets will be cost plus 10%, except labor and backhoe work.

Rent for McLean Clinic building tabled, for ruling from Attorney General's office.

Motion by Wayne By-

bee, seconded by Bentley, all voting in favor of motion, to contact property owners about curb and gutter work before doing street improvement work.

Mr. Finkenbinder met with council to present rough draft of zoning ordinance. Council will need more information, zoning maps, etc.

Motion by Bentley, second by W. Bybee, all present voting in favor of motion, McLean will not support the Pot Hole Fund.

Motion by Fabian, seconded by Suggs, all voting

in favor of motion, to advertise for bids to build fence at South end of landfill.

Bids for lease of disposal land were received and opened. J.C. McAnear was high bidder. Motion by L. Bybee, second by Suggs, all present voting in favor of motion, to accept bid from McAnear for one year lease. Natural gas used will be charged for at current rate.

Motion by Bentley, second by W. Bybee, all present voting in favor of motion, to grant waiver See COUNCIL, Page 2

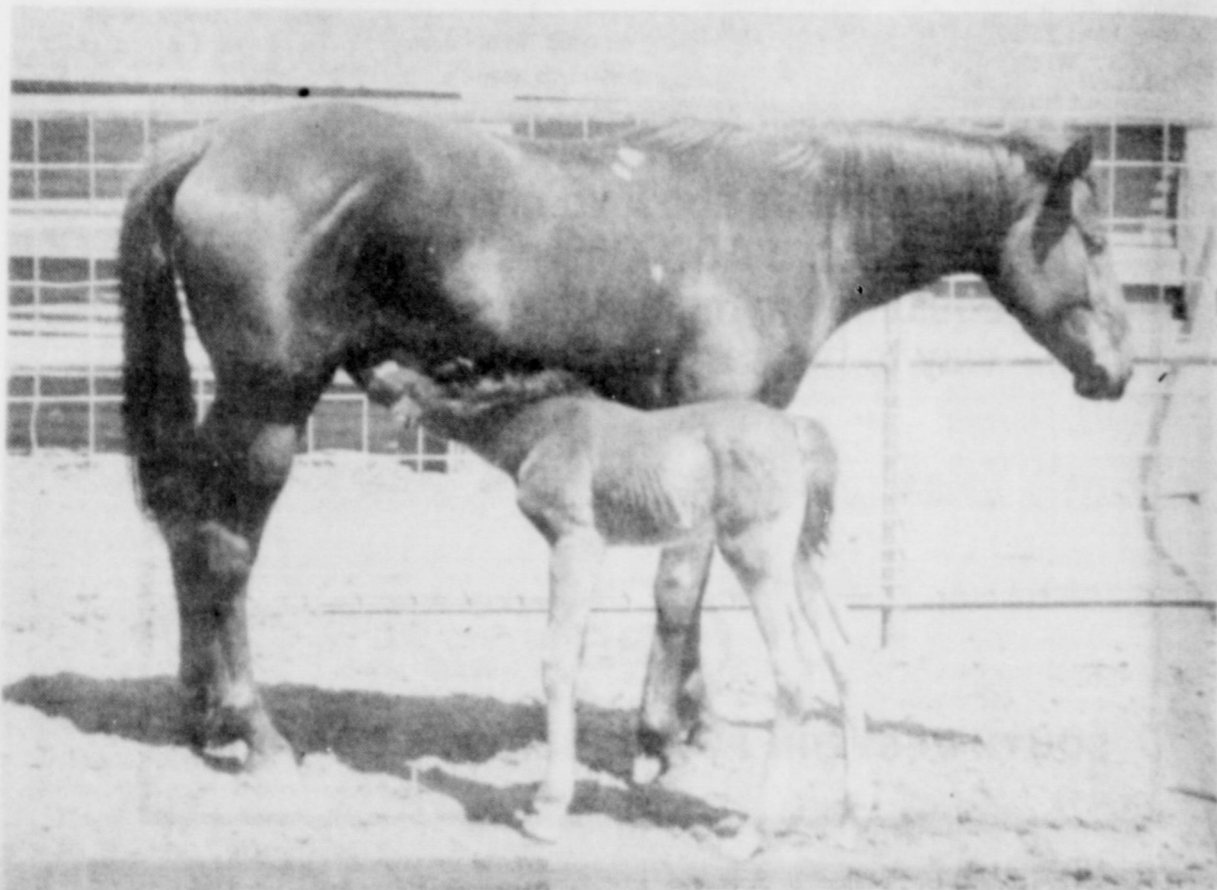
