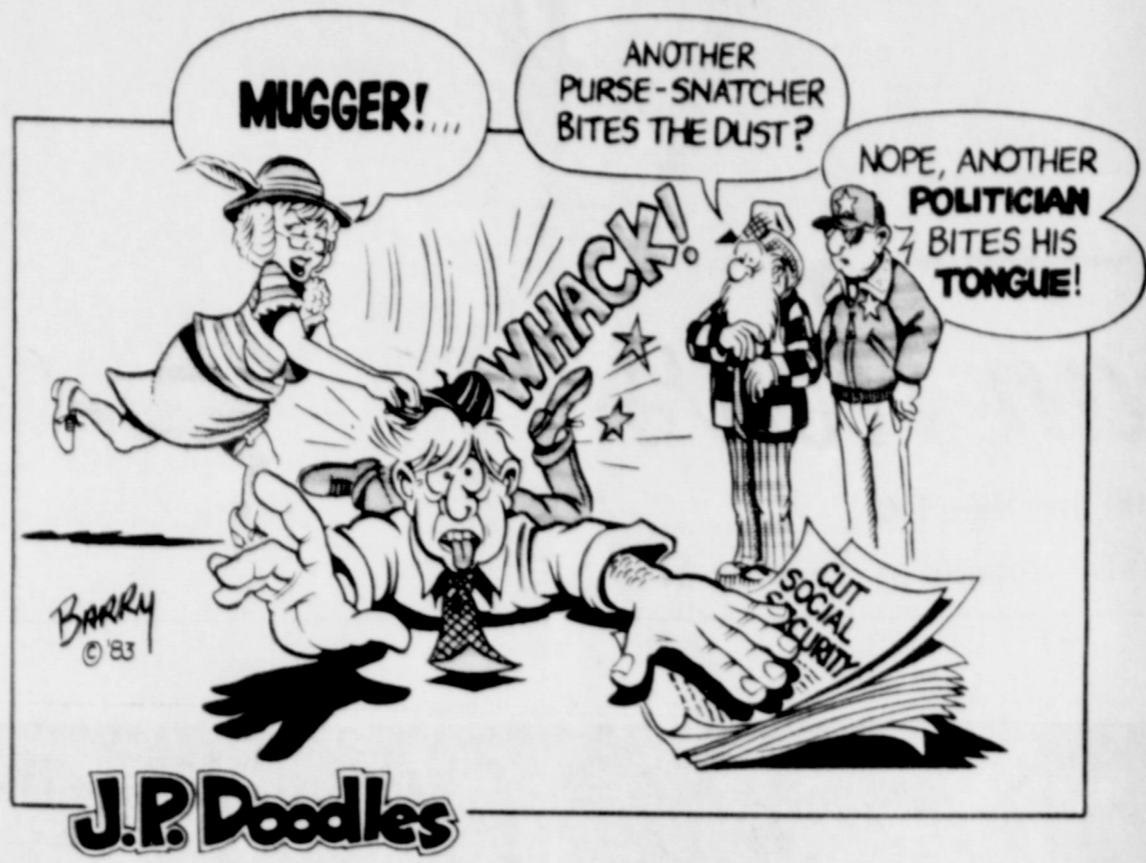

Services For Lefors' Wayne Moxon Held

Services for Wayne Leon Moxon, Lefors community leader who was electrocuted May 16 in an accident near Lefors, were at 10 a.m. Friday in the Lefors First Baptist Church. The Rev. A.G. Roberts and the Rev. Gene Lancaster, pastor of the church, officiated. Burial was in Memorial Heights Cemetery by Carmichael-Whatley Funeral Directors of Pampa. Mr. Moxon died at 3:20 p.m. May 16 of electric shock suffered while he was working at an oil lease on the Gething Ranch, 10 miles north of Lefors. The accident reportedly occurred while he was attempting to fuse a transformer bank. Born at Leedey, Okla., Mr. Moxon had lived in Lefors since 1945 and had been employed by Gulf Oil Corp. for 20 years. He was a volunteer fireman and an emergency medical technician and had served as an EMT instructor for many area residents. He was a member of First Baptist Church. He was a veteran of service with the U.S. Navy and was married to Irene Elam in 1963 in Pampa. Survivors include his wife, a son, Kevin Paul of Lefors; two daughters, Lisa of Amarillo and Keri of the home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Moxon of Lefors; two sisters, Loretta Irby and Pat Seely, both of Lefors; and three grandchildren.

I suppose everyone takes the pet plunge at one time or another. We were no exception. "The boys need a dog," advised our friends. "We want a puppy," cried the children. So we went out and adopted a Saint Bernard with the high-falootin' moniker Baron Manfred von Worsley.

I say adopted because it turned out that the Baron decided he was not a Saint Bernard at all, but instead was a rather fuzzy third son. He called himself Gumpy.

And we should have known we were in trouble when he was three months old and refused to eat anything unless "Mama" had cooked it, on the premise, I assume, that if his older "brothers" got a home-cooked meal, so should he. For the rest of his life I had to sneak in the kitchen and pour dog food into a saucepan so that he would eat his dinner.

We had anticipated the acquisition of Gumpy by reading all the best dog-training books, and by watching Saint Bernard movies. We knew what we were getting—a slow-moving, gentle dog who would lie quietly in front of the fireplace, only leaving our side when someone needed rescuing from a blizzard. What we got was a hairy, four-legged child with dog breath.

Oh, he was trained, all right. In fact, he trained himself. He was a self-educated weather predictor, for instance. At the first bolt of lightning, Gumpy would break down the back door, rush muddily through the house, and jump right in the middle of my bed. Every time that happened I knew it was raining outside. The next day, so did everyone else—wet-dog smell is impossible to wash off.

Gumpy also had an impeccable sense of timing. He knew, for example, to the split second when was the most inconvenient time for him to break out of the back yard and run madly to my office so that I could haul all 200 pounds of him back home. It never failed that three minutes before my most crucial deadline I would look up to see him drooling copiously on the front office door. The drool continued throughout the trip home. Dog drool is another thing that's impossible to wash off.

Gumpy also was entertaining. He loved to eat grapes, one at a time, while he lay on his back, somewhat in the manner of a Roman emperor. And he could rip fence boards off their moorings with his bare teeth. I think you may get an indication of the extent of my social life when I tell you that some of my most exciting evenings were spent watching my furry son methodically tearing up the backyard fence.

To his credit, Gumpy was a great watchdog. We would hear his furious barking and rush out to find him glowering at a tree limb. We were never attacked by falling leaves, thanks to Gumpy. He loved meter readers, too—especially their legs, arms, and fingers. On meter reading days I would coax him into the garage with little tidbits of home-cooked meals—steak and baked potato, salad with thousand island dressing, and cherry pie for dessert, thank you—just so some poor guy could read our meter without being mistaken for an appetizer.

Gumpy died after a long, fun-filled life, and he left an empty spot in our lives. But we take comfort in the fact that he probably ripped his way through

the pearly gates, and that Saint Peter is now trying frantically to steer him over to doggy heaven. Saint Peter might as well give up—and pass the grapes. Gumpy may be the only tail-wagging angel heaven ever gets.

Senator Bill Sarpalius Reports



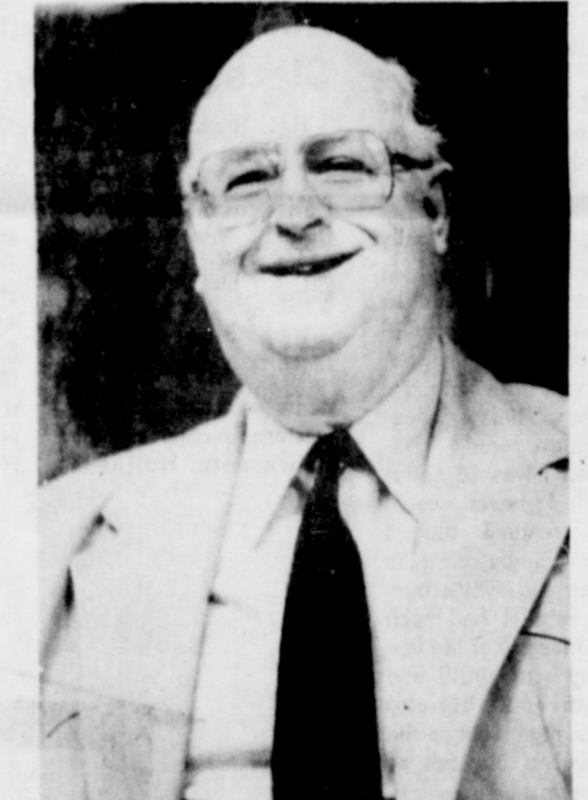
AUSTIN — Vocational training in public schools is under the gun as a special legislative session approaches. A strong effort is being made to discredit vocational education because of the few minor problems common to all large programs. The Select Committee on Public Education has criticized vocational education for having special rules which prevent the use of teachers to instruct nonvocational classes or to perform nonvocational education duties. Another criticism is that vocational facilities cannot be used for any purpose other than vocational education. Federal regulations, which once prohibited the use of vocational education teachers and facilities for nonvocational education purposes have been changed. It is no longer a prohibition. The State Board of Education, through its rules process, is now moving to allow schools to use vocational education teachers and facilities in nonvocational education areas. The State Board of Education, responding to the results of a 1981 legislative mandated study of vocational education in Texas, has recently undertaken action to correct many of the problems currently cited by the Select Committee. The State Board, through its rules process, is also putting into place a requirement that all vocational education personnel will work on 10-month contracts. Local schools will have to justify to the Texas Education Agency the need for any vocational educator to work 11 or 12 months. There has been room in the past to question some of the practices relating to vocational training, but to take the meat ax approach the Select Committee would take in cutting funding to vocational training would be a disservice to a great number of young Texans and to the economic stability of our State.

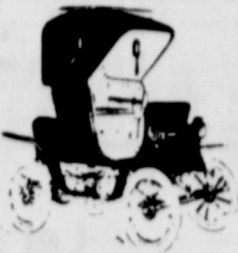

Potpourri To Sell New Book

CUT 'N SHOOT, TEXAS -- Generations of fighting Harris blood exploded through Roy Harris's veins that night in 1958 as he stood in the boxing ring in Los Angeles.

The city of the Angeles is a long way from Cut 'N Shoot, Texas, but the fighting was not all that much different. It was

"root hog or die". The kid from the piney woods of East Texas came out second best and Floyd Patterson retained his title undefeated Heavy-weight Champion of the world.

But the whirlwind career that catapulted Roy Harris to the pinnacle of the professional boxing world, remained a sensational story. How could a rustic backwoodsman turned gentleman-scholar-soldier, cope with such a challenge.

That story is finally told in CUT 'N SHOOT, TEXAS. (Eakin Press, \$8.95 paperback) a new book written by boyhood pal, Robin Montgomery, another Cut 'N Shoot kid who turned out to be an historian, writer and college professor.

Today, Roy Harris still makes his home in Cut 'N Shoot, just a stone's throw from the Houston metropolis city of Conroe. He is a practicing lawyer, real estate dealer and county clerk for Montgomery County and he still finds time to help coach Golden Gloves boxing contenders.

CUT 'N SHOOT, TEXAS is, in part, the story of how and why Roy Harris emerged from backwoods obscurity to the lofty heights of fistic heaven -- a heavyweight title bout. But it is also the record of the rapidly vanishing breed which spawned and nourished him -- the rugged individualistic frontiersmen of

the oil-rich south-east Texas thicket country.

The Harrises came to the Texas pineywoods from Tennessee by way of Arkansas. These Scotch-Irish Celtic people were born fighters and fight they did, all the way from the lowlands of Scotland and Ireland, and through Pennsylvania and the Cumberland gap. They found Indians and each other, mainly because they liked to fight.

Roy learned to fight out of self-preservation. A reporter asked his father if anyone could whip Roy. "Yep," Henry Harris answered. "Me."

The characters of Cut 'N Shoot are legend, and all bigger than life. There was "Wildman" Woodman, and Cousin Coon and Cousin Armadillo whose coonskin caps and backwoods talk set them apart from the regulars at Ramsdell.

The author's introduction to Cut 'N Shoot was to be thrown into murky waters of an oil well brine pit. This was standard initiation for newcomers and described by one resident as "about as bad as when I stumped my sore toe by eatin' fried chicken was better."

Since his father, J.T. Montgomery, was principal of the school at Cut 'N Shoot, the author was privy to the intersanctum of the Harris clan and others who made their living hunting wild hogs and cutting timber. Today Dr. Montgomery is a college professor at Southwestern Oklahoma State University at Weatherford, Okla., and author of a history of Montgomery County where his ancestors settled before Texas became a republic.




