## Fire Strikes McLean Four Times; Heavy Losses Suffered Each Time

A fire, which started at approximately 7 a.m. Tuesday morning damaged a portion of the McLean Cattle Company, Inc.'s feedmill. The fire was controlled and extinguished by the McLean Fire Department and Company personnel. The fire originated in the finished feed elevator leg and was confined to the structure. The

Company has not established the exact cause of the fire. Repair work was being performed on the finished feed leg during the last few weeks.

The Company has not yet established the extent of the damage.

"It is too early to determine how much loss we have incurred. The damage is serious, but we will be able to continue feeding the 12,000 cattle we currently have," said Patman. "Our mill is designed so we can use our grain

receiving elevator leg for finished feed. We will have some added problems in scheduling grain receipts and may have to work some extra hours," he added.

McLean Volunteer Firemen responded to several more calls during the week.

On Feb. 14, at 7 a.m., a garage belonging to Jim Chandler caught on fire and burned. The garage and its contents were destroyed.

At approximately 2 p.m. the same day, a grass fire on the Johnson ranch was reported. According to fire chief Jim McDonald, the fire was started by someone lighting fireworks on the ranch. "Apparently someone just drove on the ranch and lit the fireworks. Of course, they were gone by the time the fire was spotted," said McDonald.

On Feb. 15, at 2:15 p.m., a truck tractor

semi-trailer owned by Legg's Products of Wilston Salem, California, and driven by Joseph H. Cobington overturned and caught on fire. The fire department and the highway patrol were called to the scene of the accident.

"The fire department did an excellent job containing the fire in the immediate area," said DPS trooper John Holland. "The truck was loaded with nylon hose, and it was almost impossible to get the fire in the truck extinguished." The fire department planned ahead and did a fine job containing the fire. It was a good piece of work, and we appreciate it," said Holland.

Cobington, the driver of the truck and a passenger suffered minor injuries and were transported to the Shamrock Hospital by McLean Ambulance.

However, during the past few years, the people holding the Chamber together and doing the work have been whittled down to two or three individuals. And the meetings are poorly attended.

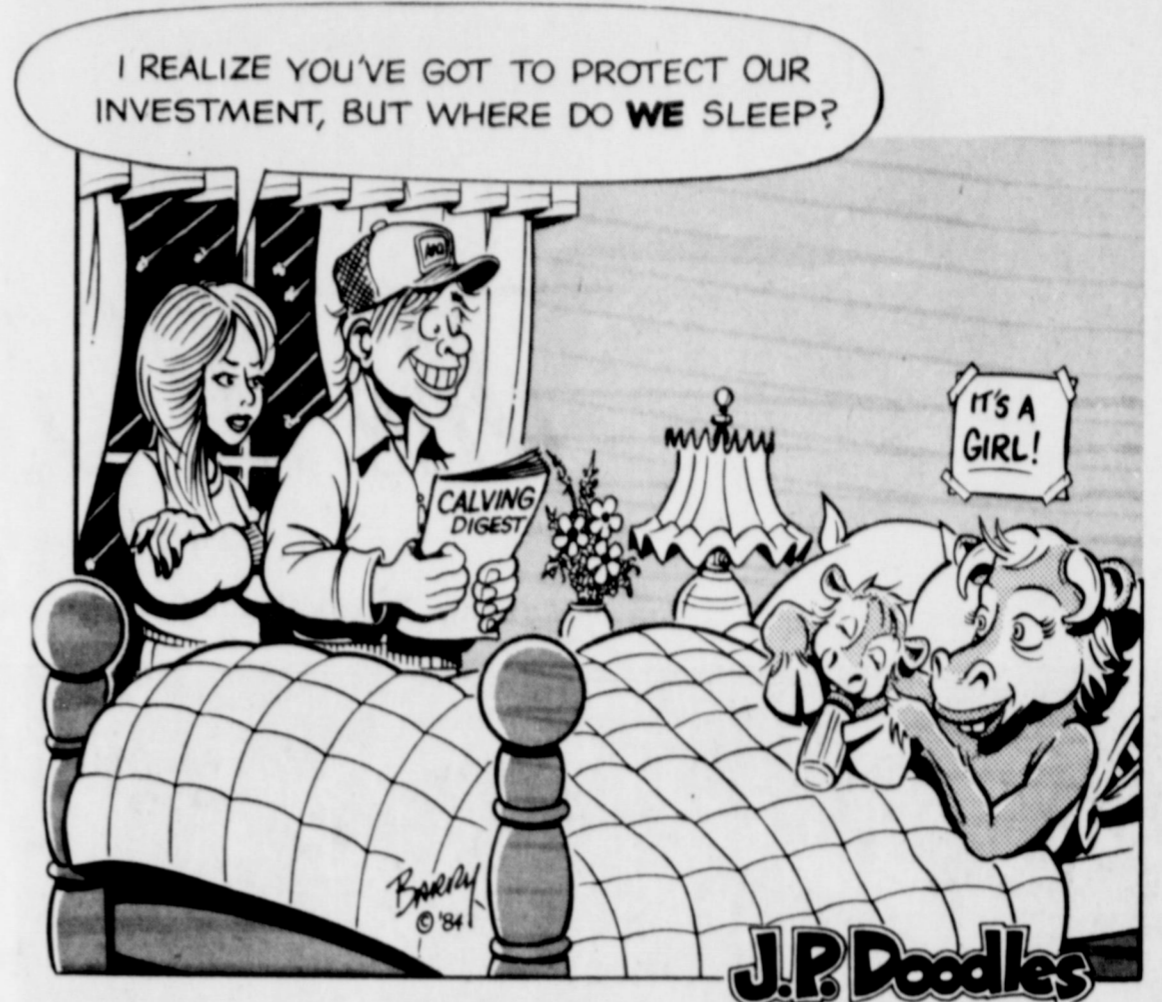

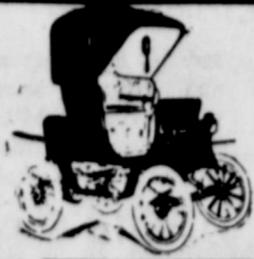

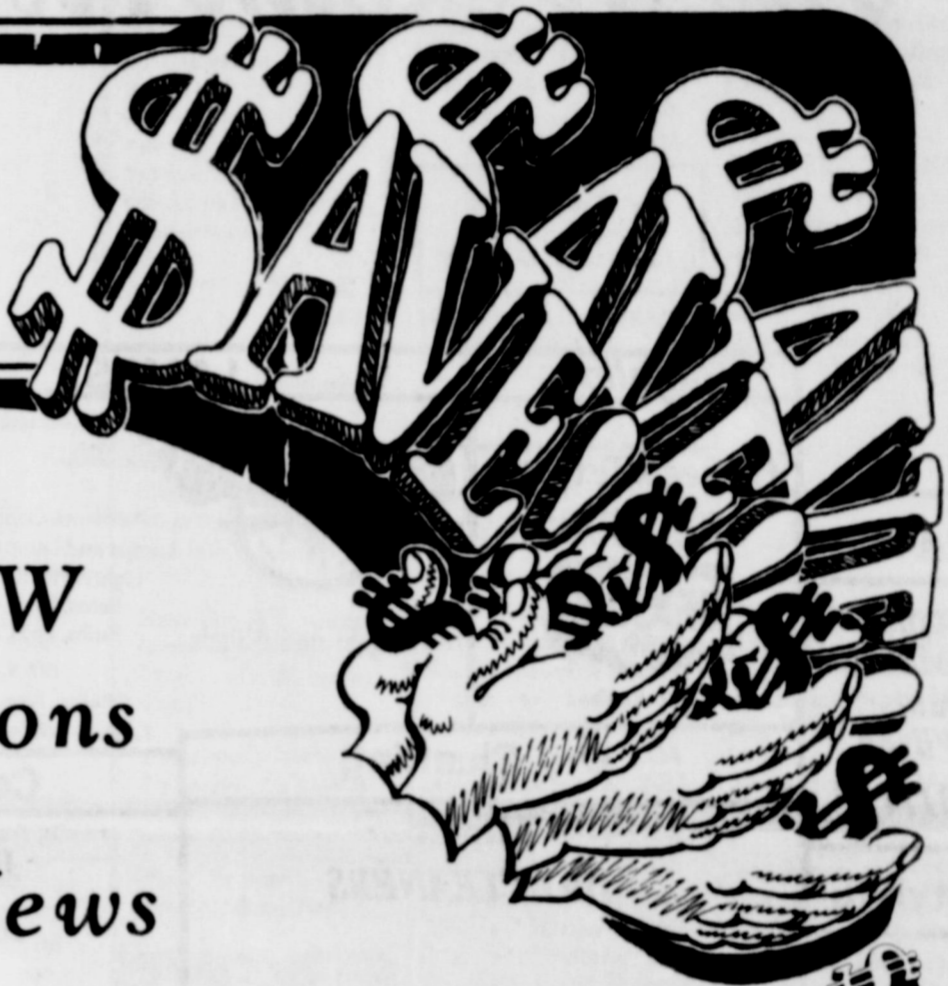
