Groom Hospital Opens May 29 ; Denied Medicare Approval

Steps towards opening McLean's Hospital were forwarded recently when Groom's Hospital was opened by Futura Health Care Services. The City of McLean currently has a contract with Futura and hopes to eventually re-open its hospital.

Groom Memorial Hospital officially opened May 29 with Dr. Tim Hartman of Cushing, Okla., five registered nurses, several licensed vocational nurses and a lab technician on its staff. The hospital, however,

suffered a major set-back recently when a survey team with Medicare/Medicaid failed to approve the certification for the facility.

According to Phil Miller in *The Groom News*, the survey team

made their inspection and submitted a listing of pre-survey deficiencies to be corrected before an actual survey can be conducted.

In spite of reassurances from Futura employees that the hos-

pital remains open, Groom Ambulance Service attendants have been asked to continue to transport patients to Amarillo or Pampa until further notice from officials.

"The hospital will re-

main open and is ready to accept patients," said Administrator Richard Cumbie. "And until Groom Memorial is approved for Medicare and Medicaid certification, patients must use other forms of medical

insurance or may arrange for private pay for bills.

Local officials do not expect McLean to receive their Certificate of Need which will allow the hospital to re-open, until late October or early November.

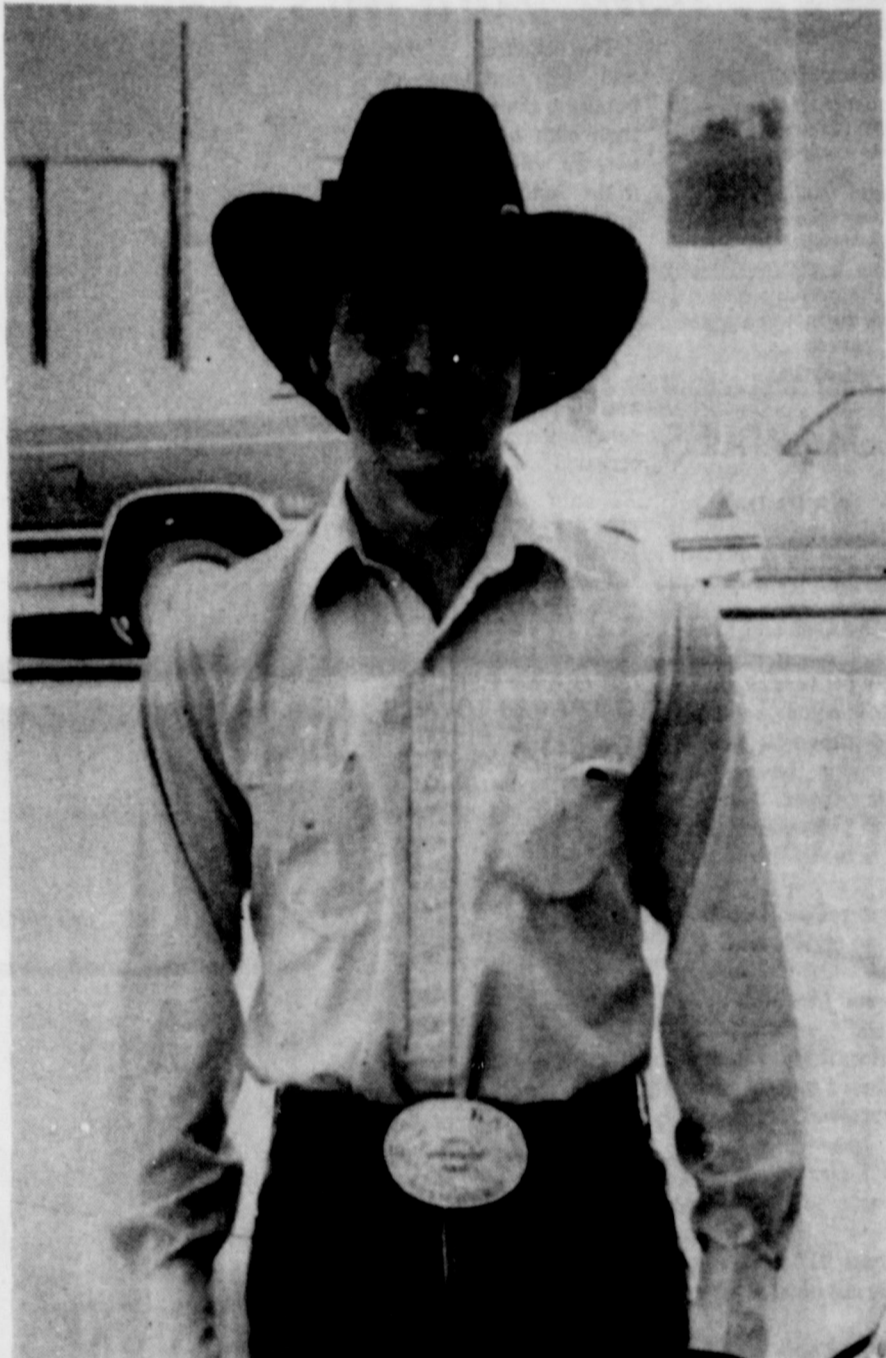
One of the disadvantages of working late on Tuesday nights is that I quite often miss activities that I'd like to attend. During basketball season, I miss most of the home games because of that.

Randy Bentley of Leedy, Okla., won first with a time of 3.796; Wendell Schults of Pampa was second with a time of 3.864. Billingsley's time in the third go-around was 5.133.

Billingsley received a trophy buckle for his first-place win. He will travel to Seguin this week for competition in the

McLean Receives '908.72 From Comptroller Bullock

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$72 million in local sales tax payments to the 98 local-tax cities and four transit authorities, including the first check for collections of the new Fort Worth transit tax.

Bullock said the city checks totaled \$52 million of the \$72 million.

"So far this year,

we've sent these cities a

little over \$400 million,

which is more than 13 percent better than what they had gotten by this time last year," Bullock said.

McLean received \$908.72, down \$332.82 from last year's \$1,241.54. McLean has received \$11,232.08 to date.

Pampa received \$111,317.99, up from last year's check of

\$104,030.83.

Houston's check was the largest, \$8.9 million, for a total of \$72.7 million up five percent over last year. Dallas received \$5.8 million to push its total payment to \$48.3 million, a 15% increase.

Bullock also sent checks to Metropolitan Transit Authorities in Fort Worth, Dallas, Houston, and San

Antonio. Fort Worth's first check from the one-quarter percent local transit tax in that city was for \$331,306. The Dallas DART check was for \$8 million and the Houston MTA got \$10 million. San Antonio's VIA check was for \$1.7 million.

June payments reflect taxes on sales made in April and reported to the Comptroller by May 20.

senting our high school and our town. Good going Billie, stay after it! Our best wishes go with him this week as he goes to Seguin, Texas, for the state high school rodeo finals.

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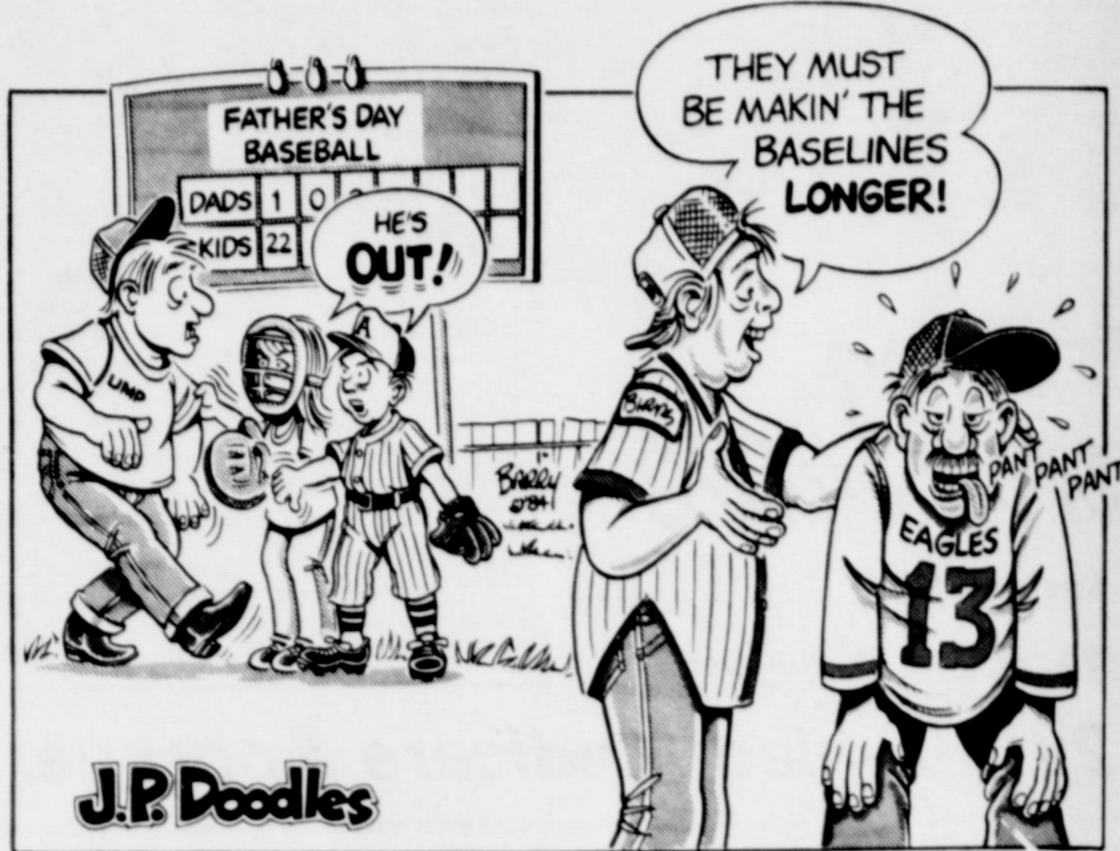

Cooking With ... The Cow Belles

The Texas CowBelles held their annual "Texas Beef Cook-Off" recently and sent us the winning recipes. We have found these recipes will soon become listed among our "family favorites", and so we decided to share the winners with you this year.

Taking first place in the contest was Mrs. Beverly Sebastian's "Garden-Garnished Steak'nBake".

1 pound ground round steak

3/4 cup chopped onion
1 tsp. garlic salt
1 tsp. Italian seasoning
2 cups sliced, fresh mushrooms
4 oz. chopped green chilies
1/2 cup water
4 medium potatoes, baked
1/4 cup margarine
2/3 cup to 1/2 cup milk
2 oz. jar diced pimiento, drained
3/4 cup each shredded Cheddar and Swiss with caraway cheese
Brown ground steak and onion in fry pan.

Sprinkle with garlic salt and Italian seasoning; pour off drippings. Push meat mixture to one side of fry pan. Add mushrooms; saute' five minutes, stirring constantly. Stir in green chilies and water; simmer about 15 minutes while preparing potatoes.

Cut potatoes in half lengthwise. Scoop potato out of shells into bowl; mash. Add margarine and milk. Beat until light and fluffy. Spoon back into shells. Make a well with back of spoon in center and fill with meat mixture. When ready to serve, reheat in Microwave or in 400 degree oven until heated through. Combine pimiento cheddar cheese, and Swiss cheese; sprinkle over potatoes. Place on serving platter. Garnish with fresh parsley (sprinkle some chopped parsley on top, if desired), and your choice garden fresh vegetables such as green onions, tomatoes, etc. Makes 4 servings - 8 halves.
