The Marines are now gone from Beirut, and we have received a barrage of criticism from foreigners and Americans stating a belief that we quit in the midst of difficulty and hardship, leaving our "allies" to

the bad guys. In my estimation, the Schools To Host Open House move was a proper one, as we had found ourselves in another of those impossible situations where anything we did

was sure to be unpopular with someone. In addition, our men were relegated to a position where they were surrounded by at least unfriendly forces, with little chance of adequately defending themselves.

It is always so easy to look back and say what we should have done, but I will repeat what I said when the situation first began, which was that we should have let the Israelis alone. In my own humble opinion, they would have effectively eliminated the PLO. made Syria happy to go back home and mind their own business, and probably would have made it possible for many of the Shiite and Druse Moslems to reap their heavenly rewards, which

Don't be surprised if after all the cease-fires, conferences, and shuttlediplomacy, the people who have been fighting for thousands of years continue fighting, and that the superefficient Israeli Army comes in and settles the whole situation by itself without aid of American, French, Italians or even the United Nations.
