Telephone Manager Says Groom Will Benefit With New System

General Telephone customers in Groom, Texas will benefit from electronic telephone service effective November 8, 1986, according to Jerry F. West,

Memphis operations manager.

"A switchover from a mechanical switching system to an electronic switching system (which processes all long distance and local calls for Groom) will bring the latest in telephone technology to customers in Groom. Cutover to this new switching system will take place at 12:01 a.m. on Saturday morning, Nov. 8. During the cutover, customers may experience a 15 minute interruption of service. The midnight hour was selected to minimize customer inconvenience as much as possible. It's the biggest service improvement change slated for Groom this year," said West, "and it's part of our commitment in providing the finest customer service possible."

Currently, Groom is being served by electromechanical switching equipment in the central office. "This will be

replaced with a 480 customer line electronic central office which will provide customers with faster, more cost-efficient service," he mentioned. After the conversion, customers will need to dial all seven digits when calling local numbers or their calls will not complete.

Customers will have the capability to dial their own operator assisted calls, such as collect, third number billing and person-to-person, long-distance calls from coin telephones, and long-distance credit card calls using GTE or AT&T credit cards.

"This sophisticated and versatile electronic system will give customers faster, more accurate and reliable direct dialed long-distance services as calls are routed through Amarillo switching center to destinations over the most efficient and direct route," West said.

"The change will give our customers access to the latest technologies in long-distance services while also providing the capability for making available the special services of the future,"

West said.

West said Groom customers will be able to dial their own operator assisted calls such as collect, third number billed and person-to-person by dialing 0 (zero) plus the area code if different from (806) plus the seven digit number of the distant city. The operator will come on the line temporarily to determine and perform the special assistance required. For credit card calls, the customer dials 0 plus the area code if different from (806) plus the distant number, and the operator will complete the call. Customers using credit card numbers can complete their billing procedure with the operator.

All these new dialing instructions will be in effect after the conversion on Nov. 8.

Customers who have private lines will no longer have an operator ask for their telephone number when they dial long distance. Equipment called "ANI" will do all the work for the customer. Party-line customers will experience no change in long distance calling procedures.

Groom Memorial Hospital Contents To Be Sold

The remaining contents of the Groom Memorial Hospital will be sold at public auction Saturday, November 8, 1986, at 10:00 a.m. The doors will open at 8:00 a.m. for inspection of the property to be sold. A large crowd is expected and funds from the sale of the contents will be used to make necessary repairs to the

building.

The building will be converted to a Community Center, Senior Citizen Center and Clinic beginning the middle of November after the contents are removed. Volunteer labor and donated funds are being accepted to complete the project.

The hospital was closed in 1980. All attempts to open

the hospital did not succeed. The Groom Economic Development Corporation accepted control of the building recently and is coordinating the remodeling project.

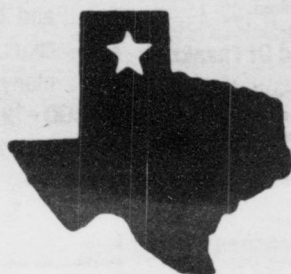

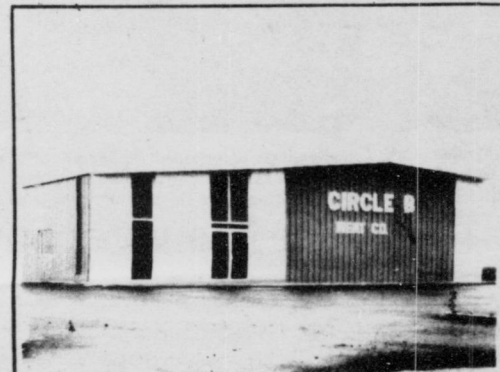

Groom Tigers Up Season Record To 8-2 Over Kress

The Tigers claimed another victory Friday to up their season record to 8-2, the best for them in many a year.

Tie Tigers added up 56 points to Kress' 14. Brent Thornton led the way for Groom with three touchdowns and 175 yards rushing. He scored on a 62-yard run and on a pass reception from quarterback Bruce Thornton.

Bruce also scored twice for the Tigers, with one coming on an 11-yard interception.

Stoney Crump and Jack Britten scored one each with Crump's coming off a 31-yard interception. Britten also totaled 130 yards rushing for the evening.

Coach Terry Coffee handed high praise to the Tigers. "We've had a good season both with the 8-2 record and record wise. Our offense has scored more points and yards than in any other year and our defense has held our opponents to less points and several games with minus yards rushing. As a matter of fact, a couple of our backs got a lot of good write-up this season and I'd like to dedicate the last game to our linemen."

Coffee said, "Coaches and linemen had better have strong backs, because we always hear fans telling us to open holes, you never hear them tell the back to hit those holes." The record this year shows that the linemen have opened a lot of holes.

"I can't say enough about the line."

The Tigers averaged 35 points game this season according to Coaches

records. The most years gained in a single game by a foe was 120 yards and several games the Tigers held their opponents to minus yardage.

Those tough Tigers Coach Coffee speaks so highly of are Daniel Lambert, Tony Homer, Travis Homer, Jason McCoy, James Miller, Michael Rose and Stoney Crump.

And those two backs, everyone's raved about all season, both are expected to end the season with over 1,000 yards rushing. Jack Britten has a season total of 960 yards in seven games and Brent Thornton 855 yards in eight games. Both are senior members of the team and will play their final game here Friday. Two senior linemen will also complete their season on Friday with Daniel Lambert described by coaches as a very consistent player on defense. Brian Collingsworth is also a senior defensive player on the

team.

The Tigers play Claude at home Friday night with game time set at 7:30 p.m.

Brent Thompson will miss his last two games. Thompson underwent knee surgery last week and will be out of

athletics for about five more weeks. Also sidelined during the season were Scott Fields and Brice Ruthardt. They will be out another six weeks.

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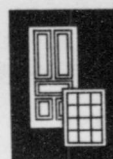
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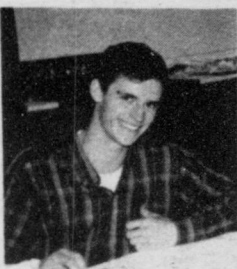

Weinheimer Member Of WTSU Crops Team



West Texas State University's Crops Team will participate in three competitions in the next few weeks in the Southwest Regional competition to be held at Stillwater, Ok.

WTSU will compete against Oklahoma State University, East Oklahoma State College and Howard College in the regionals.

Members of the WTSU Crops Team are Patrick Weinheimer, Jr., a sophomore plant science major from Groom; Dave Mann, a senior history major from Los Angeles; Bill Settle, a junior plant science major from Silverton; and Coby Kriegshauser, a sophomore

plant science major from Hereford.

The competition is in three phases: 1) Identification of 200 specimens of plants, seeds, weeds, crops, or diseases; 2) seed analysis; and 3) grain grading (grains for commercial use).

"Perfection is our goal" is written on the chalkboard in the room where the crops team prepares. According to Dr. Leonard Wilson, sponsor of the team, the competition is so stiff, even a few mistakes can be disastrous to the team's placing.

But WTSU's team has fared well in recent years. "We generally win the regional," Wilson said. And the American Royal and Chicago Board of Trade. "We've usually placed fourth or better every year. We've won four different times."

At the American Royal competition Nov. 18, team members will go on several educational tours including the Kansas City Board of Trade, Genreal Mills flour mill and Farmland Industries.

The Nov. 22 competition is sponsored by the Chicago Board of Trade and the American Seed Trade Association.

Tigers Offense Strong, Scores Four TD'S

The McLean Tigers put on a wild offensive show Friday night as they scored four touchdowns and almost upset the Phillips Blackhawks. Phillips ran up a 28-0 score during the first half and it looked like McLean was in for a long night. But in the second half, the Tiger offense came roaring back and scored four times.

The first touchdown came on a 4-yard run by Clint Herndon and was followed by a 1-yard run by Jim Anderson. The big play of the game came when Huey Green caught an 84-yard pass from Clint Herndon. The final Tiger score came on a 1-yard run by Jim Anderson, who also scored on a 2-point conversion play. Phillips was able to score only once during the second half and the final score was 35-28 in favor of Phillips.

The Tigers mounted an

offense totaling 329 yards. Huey Green led the attack with 104 in pass receptions and 125 yards rushing. Clint Herndon rushed 16 times for 70 yards and Jim Anderson had 50 yards on 12 carries. The Tigers had 17 first downs.

Head Coach Bill Phillips said, "I was real pleased with the way the guys played in the second half. They ran the offense the way it should be run."

Honors for Offensive Play-

er of the Week went to Huey Green, Clint Herndon and Jim Anderson. Huey Green was also named Defensive Player of the Week and the Big Hit Award went to Tony Hambright and Jim Anderson. Coach Phillips said the Win Award went to the entire team because of the way they played in the second half.

The final game of the year will be tomorrow night as the Tigers host Sunray. Game time will be 7:30 p.m.

Harvest Carnival Well Attended

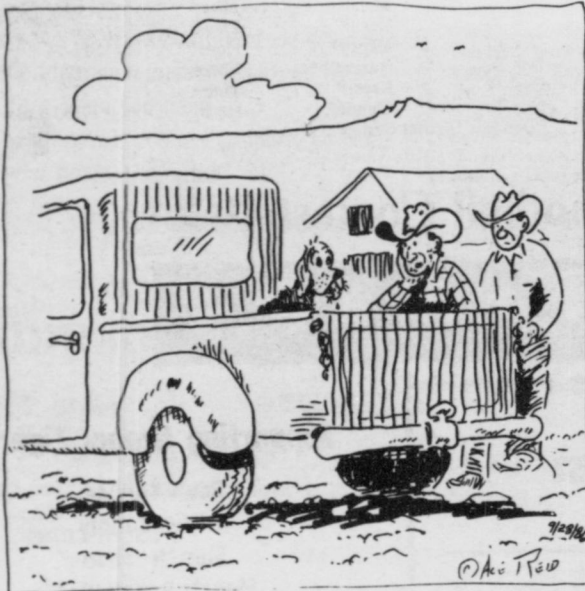
