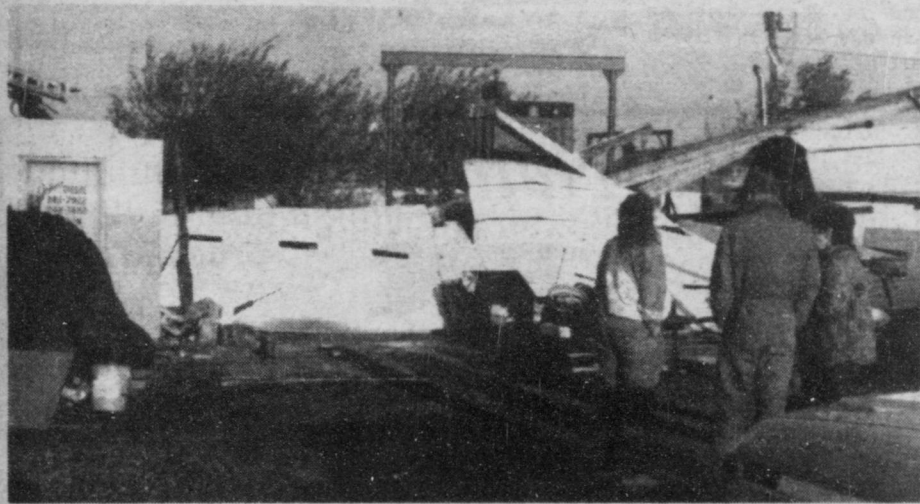

## Town Damaged By Storm



## Alfred Homer To Keep Groom Mayoral Seat

Local elections were decided by registered voters Saturday. The election poll for school and city elections were held at the Superintendent's office at Groom Independent School.

In the city election, the only contested race was between incumbent Alfred Homer and candidate John Alan Homen for the seat of mayor. Alfred Homer was elected for his fifth term with 174 votes. His opponent John Alan Homen received 77 votes. Incumbents Ronny Fields and Jerry Thorton were elected to serve a second term uncontested.

In the highly sought race for school board trustees of Groom Independent School Ken Burger received the most votes of 233, followed by incumbent Dennis Babcock with 188 votes and for the third seat was Adella Kotara with 159 votes. Not chosen by the voters to serve again was incumbents Hop Britten with 88 votes and Bill B. England with 83. Tony Treadwell, a new name on

the scene received 155 votes which ended with a close race between him and Kotara with 159 votes.

Groom's neighboring school, Grandview/Hopkins; Troy Ritter was elected to serve with 26 votes and write in candidate Greg Acker was elected to serve with 25 votes. Other candidates in the election included Gary Babcock with 15 votes, Melvin Wills with 12 votes and Larry Stephens with 8.

Election judges were Flora Glynn Hammers, Barbara Fraser and Lavesta Barnett.

## John's Diesel Destroyed By Storm

High winds and rain are being blamed for damages of property and trees in Groom and the area last Thursday night as the storm blew in from the northwest.

The storm was blamed for the collapse of John's Diesel Service, according to Rick Prather, a member of the Groom Volunteer Fire Department who was monitoring the storm, the cinder block building was hit by the storm just after 6 p.m.

"It was just blown apart," Prather said. "It fell all to pieces." The building was unoccupied at the time of the collapse.

High winds also blew down a 60 foot sign at Texas Red's Truck Stop and blew a diesel tank across Interstate 40 and into the back yard of

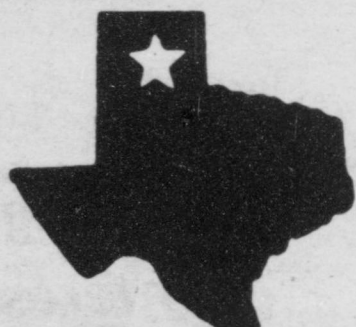

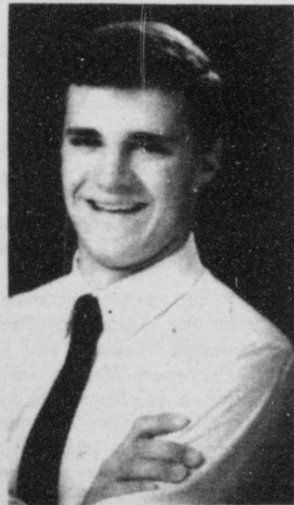

### Tigers & Tigerettes Place At State Track Meet

The Groom Tigers and Tigerettes knew the feeling, that you can't always get what you want, Saturday. What they wanted was a pair of matching team titles to make history as the first-ever six-man state track champions. Both were only a moment away from getting it.

For the Tigerettes, that moment came early on during a failed exchange in the prelims of the 800-relay. For the Tigers, a one-second difference in the 1600 -relay made all the difference in the world.

"When the girls dropped the baton, they lost some drive and went a little bit flat for the rest of the day," said Coach Jimmy Branch, whose boys and girls teams both compiled 36 points to end up with identical fourth place finishes.

The Tigerettes dropped the baton on the first hand-off to miss out on a potential 20-points, which would have placed them a narrow four points behind Rochester, the girls' state champions.

The Tigers were in a similar position entering the 1600-relay, a combination of a first-place finish by Groom and a third-place finish by Loraine would have given the Tigers the state co-championship. Instead, the clocked 3:34.67, one second behind state champion Loraine, to fall to fourth place.

"If we'd had one more place in an event, we could have won it," said Stoney Crump, the third leg of Groom's 1600 relay.

It was apparently a day for wanting just a little bit more. Daniel Hinson-Groom's only UIL State Qualifier and Saturday's lone gold medalist from the area-won the discus with a toss of 152-3. But even he wasn't quite satisfied.

"I wanted to throw 160," said Hinson, who has launched a personal best of 155-10 this season. "I won't settle for anything less in Austin."

Hinson also picked up fifth place in the shotput with a throw of 43-9.

Groom's boys and girls 1600-relays were the only other silver medalists of the day.

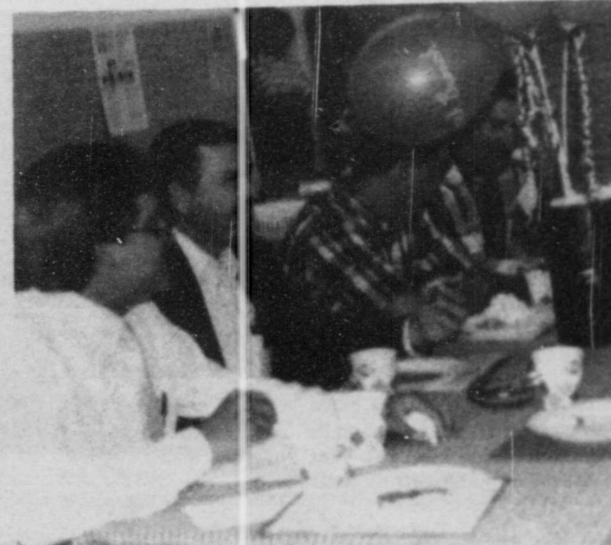
Karen Bohr had a busy day competing in five events. In addition to running the 400-and 1600 relays, she was fourth in

Regular exercise seems to stop bone loss and may even increase bone density, a study at Tufts University found. Postmenopausal women who walked briskly 45 minutes a day, four times a week, had a 3 percent increase in density in a year; sedentary control group lost 10 percent.

Some orthodontists are getting an early start on straightening teeth and jaw. Researchers at the University of Pennsylvania say early care may ward off later problems and shorten teen time in braces.

### County Voice Opposition To Pending Legislation

Carson County Commissioners tended a rather light agenda in their Monday, May 8th, meeting.

On discussion centered on Sec. 2.02 of House Bill 2335

and Sec. 3.05 of Senate bill 1139, concerning Texas Department of Correction (TDC) funding. Those parts of the legislation propose to make counties liable for 150

percent of the costs of housing their prisoners in TDC when the state facility reaches 95 percent of its capacity.

Sheriff Timmons gave the County's TDC prisoner allocation and later said that although that allotment had never been reached, enacting the requirements of the proposed legislation could put a serious financial burden on the County if future numbers increased.

In opposition to the proposed legislation, Judge Roselius and all four commissioners signed a letter to be sent to Rep. Dick Waterfield and Senator Teel Bivins stating; "We are encouraged by the commitment of the legislative leadership to construct 11,000 new prison beds and to institute stricter parole and probation standards. We support these measures wholeheartedly and appreciate the Legislature's recognition of the need to promote and ensure public safety.

"However, there is a provision in the package that is of great concern to all county officials in Texas. The provision to expressly eliminate any duty of the State to accept the transfer of prisoners when the prison system has reached 95 per-

cent capacity is unacceptable to counties. We can never support such radical, permanent shift of a major state responsibility to county government.

"We urge you to work with us to remove this statutory limit on the number of convicted felons that a county may send to TDC from the criminal justice package. Any legislation that limits the State's obligation to house convicted felons based on prison capacity must and will be opposed by all locally elected officials."

"Texas First", a proposal by Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. to accelerate their system of updating service, was endorsed by the Court. A resolution was signed to be sent to the Texas Public Utility Commission urging full, careful and speedy consideration to the plan.

Commissioner Strawn announced that a session on State certification of county employees for insecticide application will be held at 9:00 a.m. May 18 in the County Ag Building.

Approval was given to Commissioner Britten to advertise for bids on a used mowing tractor for Precinct 1, with or without a trade-in.

Commissioners will meet again at 10:00 a.m. on May 15.

Power lines and telephone lines were knocked down

during the storm. Groom was without electricity from 6:00 p.m. until approximately 12:30 a.m.

A spokesman for the National Weather Service office at Amarillo said the storm stretched across most of the Texas Panhandle. "These warnings were out for just about everybody," he said.

According to preliminary National Weather Service reports, 13 warnings were issued during the storm, which developed north of Clayton, N.M., around 3 p.m. and moved to the southeast.

A tornado warning was issued for Moore County and severe thunderstorm warnings were issued for Dallam, eastern Hartley, eastern Oldham, Potter, Carson, eastern Deaf Smith, Randall, Armstrong, Swisher, Brisco, Donley, Hall, southern Wheeler and Childress counties of the Texas Panhandle.

Winds of 50 to 60 mph were common throughout the area, a weather spokesman said. According to the spokesman numerous trees were uprooted, power lines were down, structures damaged and roofs blown off throughout the region.

Friday and Saturday's beautiful weather proved to be a nice day for clean-up. Girl Scouts and many Groom men volunteered their service in cleaning up broken trees and debris.

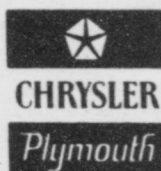
