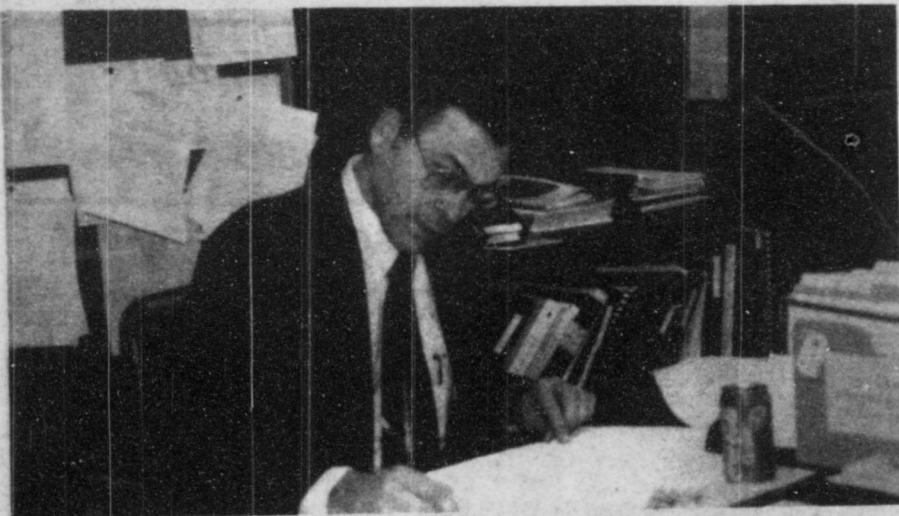
Groom Cubs Host Higgins

Report Harvest

Notes

Local farmers are either busy finishing up planting their wheat or cutting corn or milo. Who ever said it was easy being a farmer, hasn't lived through this time of year trying to do three jobs at the same time.

Groom Wheat Growers reported that their customers are about through with corn harvest. The average load went at a test weight of 56 pounds and the moisture rate went 20 and above.

The price of corn is running \$4.00 per bushel.

Wheeler -Evans reported that they felt they were almost through here in town. The average test weight went around 57 to 57.5. Janelle Sustaie also reported that milo has been brought in by some, and is testing dry. The average test weight is around 59 lb.

Attebury Grain at Lark reported that corn and milo harvest is just getting underway for their part of the county.

Tony Treadwell at RGM reported that corn harvest is over for them with the average test weight totaling: 8000 to 9000 lbs. on dryland. Milo harvest is just getting under way with the loads brought in so far testing around 14 moisture rate and 61 pound test weight.

scoring on four of their first five possessions. But then disaster struck.

points.

Groom again marched all the way down the field where Stoney Crump scored from six yards out. A Failed kick left the Tigers in a 14-12 deficit.

Fields opened the scoring in the second quarter with a one-yard run and a point-after kick. For the third time of the night, Groom drove the length of the field, landing this time at the four-yard line, where Stoney Crump pulled down a TD pass from Michael Rose.

Just before halftime, Rose launched another six-pointer, this one for 45 yards to Kevin Kerlee, giving Groom the lead for the first time of the night.

Next came the rain and Fields 30-yard field goal,

"At the half, we knew we had the game well in hand," said Branch. "But when the opportunity came for them, they did what they had to do.

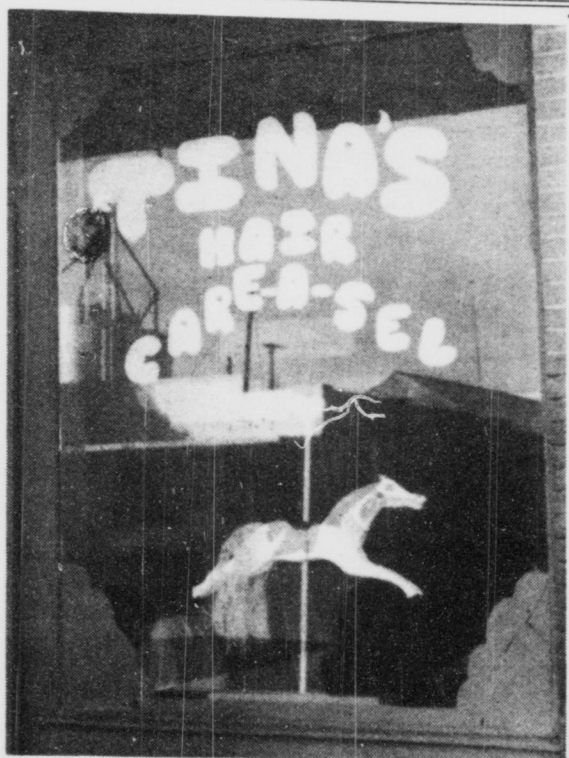

The election will be held at 7:00 p.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a Soil and water Conservation District Director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years of age or older.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a Soil and Water Conservation District Director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age or older and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil and Water Conservation District Directors serve four year terms of office.

Current members of the Board of Directors of the Gray County SWCD are Earl Smith, Chairman, Pampa; Troy Ritter, Vice-Chairman, Grandview; David Bowers, Secretary, Pampa; Tony Smitherman, Member, McLean; and Jim Shaw, Member, Alanreed.

The purpose of the Gray County SWCD, with headquarters in Pampa is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The District Board of Directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purpose.

All conservation programs managed by the District are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.
