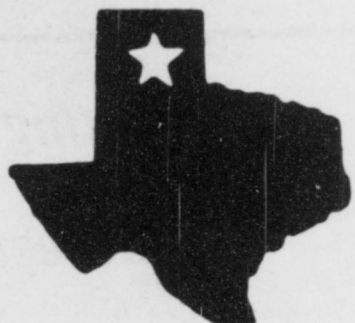

Newman's first full time pastorate was at First Baptist Church, Groom, where he served for two years. He then became educational director and associate pastor of the First Baptist Church of Amarillo. At age 30, after the death of his first wife, Julia, of cancer, he and his three small children moved to Waco, where he enrolled as a freshman at Baylor.

His survivors include his wife, Estelle Newman of San Angelo; three daughters, Pat Garner of Arlington, Charlotte Harris of Charlestown, W.Va., and Bobbie Kaye Strickland of Glen Rose; one son, Guy Newman Jr. of Euless; three sisters, Mary Womack of Brownwood, Juanita Dance and Susie Murphrey, both of Dallas; one brother, Wes Newman of Lewisville; 14 grandchildren; and a number of nieces and nephews.

For 1987. A biographical sketch of her will appear in the 1987 volume of "Outstanding Young Women Of America", a nationally respected awards publication.

Ledbetter was given the honor in recognition of her outstanding civic and professional achievements. The annual awards volume will serve as a permanent record of her achievements. It is printed once each year to be available to libraries, schools and the families of the award winners.

Two 4-Hers Going To District

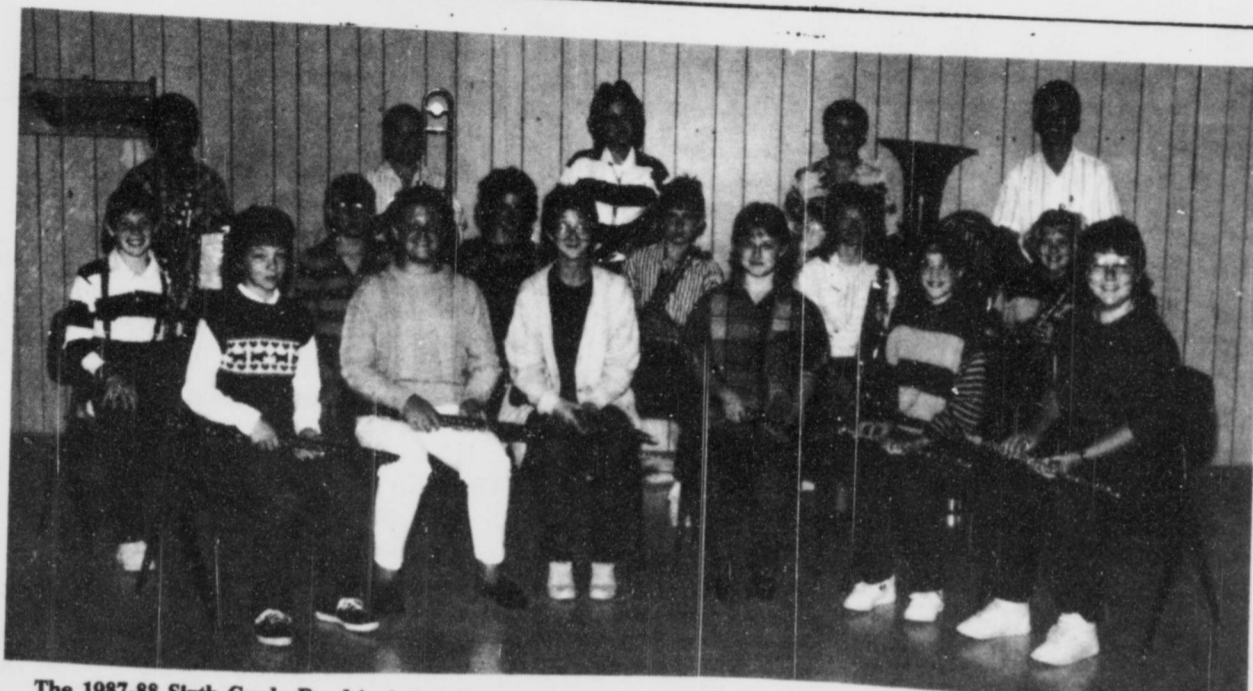

Two Attending FFA Convention

Five thousand Texas FFA members and guests are attending the 60th Annual Convention of the Texas Association of Future Farmers of America at the San Antonio Convention Center. The convention started yesterday and will conclude tomorrow.

Representing the McLean FFA Chapter are Lee Ayn Jordan and Chapter Advisor Bill Layman.

The FFA is composed of students who are studying Agricultural Sciences in the public schools in preparation for a variety of careers in Agriculture and Agribusiness. Agricultural Science is well known for providing learning experiences to students through the FFA with the theme this year "FFA-Agriculture's New Spirit." The ultimate objective is to produce future leaders for American agriculture with its vital role of producing food and fiber. Texas now has more than 900 FFA chapters with over 53,000 active members and more than 500,000 former members.

During the convention, over 2,000 award winners will be recognized with more than 1,500 members receiving the Lone Star Farmer Degree, the highest level of recognition by the state association. Educational scholarships totaling more than \$525,000 will be presented to many of the members in attendance.

Walter York, Executive Secretary, reports that deserving adults who have supported the FFA and its activities will be recognized by the presentation of Honorary State Farmer Degrees, Distinguished Service Awards, VIP Awards, and the Blue and Gold Award.

Outstanding nationally known motivational speakers scheduled during the three-day convention include Stan White, Stephenville, Texas, and John Crudele, Ames, Iowa. In addition, Kelli Evans, National President, Lincoln, Neb., will address the convention on Thursday night during the Stars Over Texas Award Program. Toby Miller, State President from Whitharral will preside at the general sessions. These sessions will include the election of the 1988-89 state president from the state officer candidates nominated by the 10 area associations. From 10 area nominees, voting delegates will also select the state FFA sweetheart to represent the state association during 1988-89. Those in attendance will hear and recognize the Outstanding Public Speaker who will represent Texas at the National FFA Convention in Kansas City, Missouri.

Conservation Election Coming August 13th

On April 21, the McLean News ran an article about a group of local farmers and ranchers who were concerned about both the quantity and quality of the rural water supply in Gray County. At that time, the group had expressed an interest in joining the Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District Number 3, an agency whose purpose is to monitor water levels and quality in its jurisdiction. District No. 3 includes parts of Potter, Carson, Armstrong and Gray Counties.

After a meeting on April 27 with Gary Walker, manager of District No. 3, the group was informed that annexation of the part of Gray County that includes McLean and Alanreed could only take place after the following steps were taken:

1). at least 50 property owners in the area to be annexed would have to sign a petition which states that they are interested in joining the district; 2). a public hearing would have to be held to allow for comments on the proposed annexation; 3). a vote by both the district's Board of Directors would be held to decide whether or not annexation would be an advantage to both the district and to the proposed area of annexation; 4). the voters in both the proposed area of annexation and those currently

already living in the district would decide by majority vote on whether or not the annexation should take place.

Three of the four steps mentioned above have already been taken. Petitions were circulated and the signatures of 61 property owners were collected. A public hearing was held on June 20 and the District No. 3 Board of Directors have given their approval to the proposed annexation.

The final step, a vote by both the residents of the proposed area of annexation, which includes McLean and Alanreed, and the voters who are already members of the district, has been scheduled for Aug. 13 at a place which will be announced later. All registered voters may participate.

If either the voters in the proposed area of annexation or the voters already in the district, vote against the annexation, it will not occur. On the same day, voters in Roberts County will also be deciding whether or not they want to belong to the district.

To refresh the memories of local readers, the Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District No. 3 is only one of several such groups set up in the late 1950's to meet the concerns of people who believe that our water resources need to be moni-

tored, protected and preserved.

Although set up by the state legislature, the district is not a governmental agency. It is run by a Board of Directors who are elected by and are responsible to the voters who reside in the district. It supports itself by an ad valorem tax which amounts to \$.0055 per \$100 valuation. This means that, for example, a person with \$20,000 worth of property would pay only \$1.10 per year in taxes. Someone with \$50,000 in property would pay \$2.75 and someone with a \$1,000,000 ranch would only pay \$55.00 per year to be part of the water district.

The district serves two primary functions. First, it makes frequent measurements of the water level in the district to make sure that supplies are not running out. It also monitors the use of district water to ensure that everyone has fair access to the supply.

Second, it tests the quality of the water to make sure that pollutants from a variety of sources are not contaminating the water being used for livestock, irrigation, etc. If a source of pollution is found, the district can take steps to deal with the sources of contamination.

In a recent Water District newsletter, District Manager Gary Walker said, "We measure around 220 wells in

the area. These measurements are used in constructing water depletion maps for land owners, as information for lending institutions making loans on land, and for information about the groundwater within the district."

He added, "We have a mobile field lab that we use to run efficiency tests on irrigation wells. We have draw down tapes, flow meters, and surge equipment to loan the farmers. We also sell and help install moisture blocks throughout the district."

Walker says that joining the district would be a good thing for the McLean-Alanreed area. "A recent study showed," he said, "that Gray County is considered a critical ground water area. Based on projections, it has been determined that by the year 2020, Gray County will face critical shortages of water. The state is looking at this problem and will probably eventually mandate that southeastern Gray County join a water district. I believe it is better for area residents to join in a district of their choice, which is also under their local control, rather than to wait for a state to order them to join a district in which they may or may not have any control."

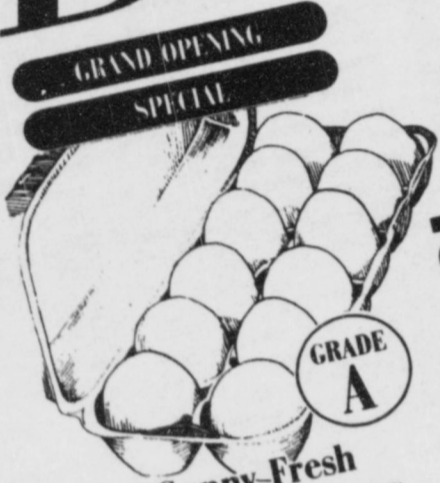
