Carson County Agriculture Extension Agents Named

COUNTY EXTENSION AGENTS in Agriculture and Home Economics were hired by Carson County Commissioners in a called session Monday morning, March 6.

Danny J. Nusser comes to Carson County from Hale County where he has served as the agent since 1984. He and his wife Kelly have been married since 1983 and are parents of a 3-year-old daughter, Emily. His job in Carson County will begin March 27th and the family plans to move just as soon as housing becomes available.

Donna G. Gatlin will assume her duties in Carson County on April 17. She comes from Abilene where she has been serving as Assistant Agent since January 1988. She and her husband Gary also plan to move to Carson County as soon as housing can be found.

Mr. Nusser is a native of Alva, Oklahoma. He earned his BS degree from Oklahoma State University in 1983 and his ME in Agriculture Education from Texas Tech University in 1988. Prior to his employment in Hale County, his professional experience includes employment with a meat packing plant in Alva, the OSU Dairy Research Barn in Stillwater, Nusser Custom Combining in Alva and as a lawn specialist with Chemlawn Corp. in Dallas. He lists his personal interests in water and snow skiing, basketball, football, golf and travel.

Mrs. Gatlin is a Gorman High School graduate and earned her BS in Home Economics from Tarleton State University in 1986. She has worked in the undergraduate admissions office at Tarleton, in customer service and insurance with Johnson County Electric Cooperative, and as chief accountant at the Johnson Co. auditor's office, before her employment in the Taylor County Extension Service at Abilene.

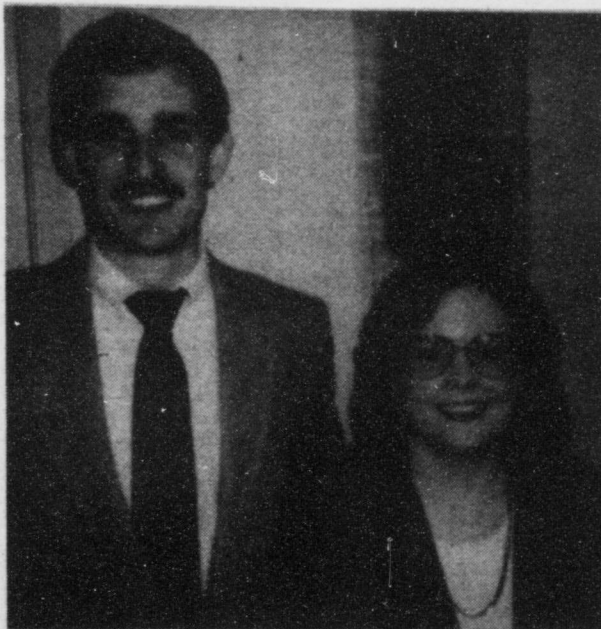
Named most valuable player was Keith Miller of Claude. Coach Jay Lamb of Groom was named Coach of the Year for District 3-1A.

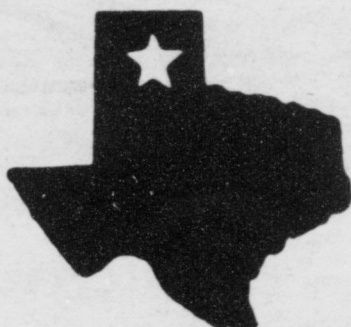

Pat Weinheimer Employed As Stand-In For Movie Production

The final scene of the well-known film adventurer, Indiana Jones will be to ride off into the sunset near the Palo Duro Canyon. Filming for the scene for the movie "Indiana Jones: The Last Crusade" took place Tuesday, February 21, at Tom Christian's Figure 3 Ranch south of Claude.

The ranch, famous for its sunrises and sunsets, is the usual site for tourist who want to get a taste of what life is like on the range at the Cowboy Morning Breakfast.

The scene was shot without stars Harrison Ford and Sean Connery who were scripted to ride off into a Jordanian sunset, but Hollywood producer and director

George Lucas, whose film credits include "American Graffiti," "Star Wars," "The Empire Strikes Back," and "Raiders of the Lost Ark," was on hand for the filming at the ranch.

The film "Indiana Jones: The Last Crusade," scheduled to be released on May 24, of this year, will be the last in the Indiana Jones adventure trilogy.

The film crew spent a lot of money for local wranglers, caterers, and rented cars and trucks. Jackie Adams, Jimmy Oles and Rit Christian, of Claude, and Pat Weinheimer, of Groom, were employed as stand-ins for the movie production. The total cost of filming the scene was about \$100,000 including planning costs.

Claude is no stranger to Hollywood, having had several films, commercials and scenes shot locally and on surrounding area ranches. Two of the more famous ones were "Hud" and "Sunshine Christmas."

It could even be, that in a Public Dialogue, their could be discovered a way to reduce or even eliminate these budget cuts.

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Measle Outbreak Travels To Plainview

When an outbreak of rubeola (red measles) began in Houston last November officials at the Texas Department of Health (TDH) predicted that susceptible travelers might contact the disease and transport it to other cities. That prediction became fact, with several cases on college campuses traced to Christmas break in Houston.

Now, with the unusually large outbreak continuing in Houston, health officials have issued a new warning. TDH is concerned that many of the more than 50,000 people that were expected at Houston's livestock show and rodeo that was held February 16-26, could also contract and transport the disease statewide.

While the new cases are occurring in all age groups, most patients are toddlers and infants less than 15 months old, and young adults, often high school and college students. Health clinics on several college campuses, including Texas Tech University in Lubbock, have reported a growing number of students with measles, most of who were exposed to the virus during trips to Houston.

Robert D. Crider, director of TDH's Immunization Division, said that the Houston outbreak began last year with about 50 infants and children. Until that outbreak began, only 17 cases of measles had been reported throughout the state for the first 10 months

of 1988. But by the end of December, the year's total reached about 250. New cases continue to be reported at an alarming rate.

Crider said that the Houston area still is the source of most reports. "Between November, when the first of the Houston outbreak began, and early February, more than 900 cases of measles have been reported in Harris County alone," Crider said. "In all of 1987, there were only about 452 measles cases in the whole state."

Crider attributed the sharp rise in the number of cases to several factors, he explained, "Many people seem to have forgotten how contagious the measles virus is. It can infect any susceptible person who is exposed to it. By susceptible, I mean anyone who has not had the disease, or whose immunization was not successful--about 3-5 percent of those vaccinated. Measles is so contagious that until the advent of vaccines, few people reached adulthood without being hence the misconception that measles is a 'Childhood' disease."

He added that persons born before 1957 are likely to have been infected earlier with red measles and are generally not considered susceptible to the disease.

Since 1981 state law has required that all children entering public or private school must show proof of immunization for measles, or furnish a physician-vali-

dated history of measles illness. On physician's advice to parents, most children are routinely immunized at 15 months with measles-mumps-rubella vaccine. The result is that for some years, measles among young children dramatically declined. In 1983, for example, Texas reported only 37 cases.

A measles immunization clinic was held in Groom this past week, by the Texas Department of Health. The clinic was held in the Groom Clinic where many local residence received vaccinations. One case of measles has been reported in Groom, but at this time none others have reported to have contacted the disease.

The symptoms of red measles are fever, runny nose, cough, watery eyes, and a rash which first appears on the head and face, eventually spreading on the head and face, eventually spreading over the body. Crider stressed that red measles, rubeola, should not be confused with rubella, German measles, which can cause serious birth defects in the babies of infected mothers.

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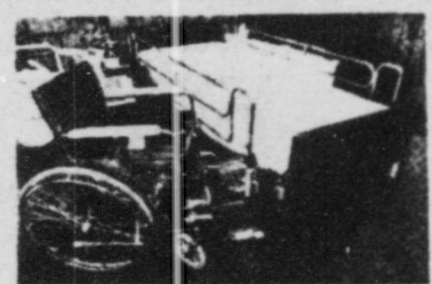
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Jason Eschle To Represent Groom In Chemistry Olympiad

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
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

McLean ISD Hires New School Superintendant

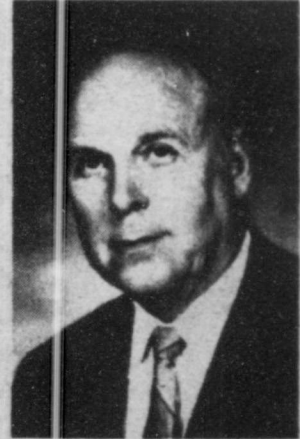
Rex Peeples has served the Groom Schools as Superintendent for the past nine years, but that will come to an end July 30, being the effective date of his resignation when he becomes

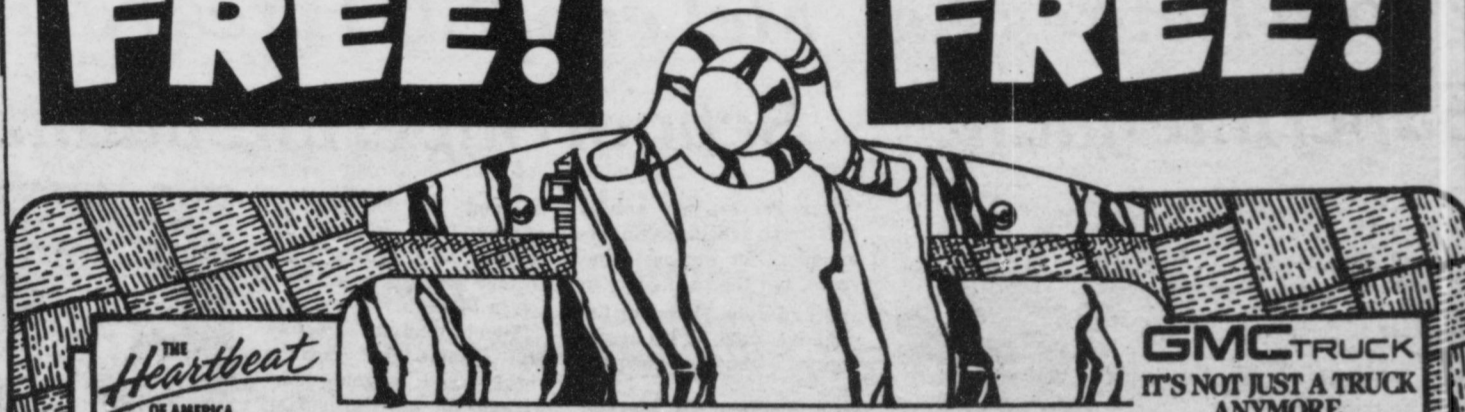

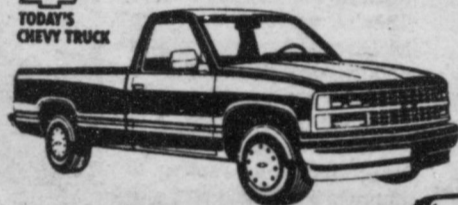

The amount of Nitrate (as nitrogen) in the water we supply was reported to be 11.95 milligrams per liter.

Adults and children over the age of 6 months need not be concerned about drinking water from the tap. An excess Nitrate intake by an infant under the age of 6 months may reduce its available oxygen supply and possibly produce "blue baby" symptoms. Parents are advised to find other sources of drinking water, such as bottled water, for their infants under 6 months of age. All doctors and hospitals in the area have been notified of this situation.

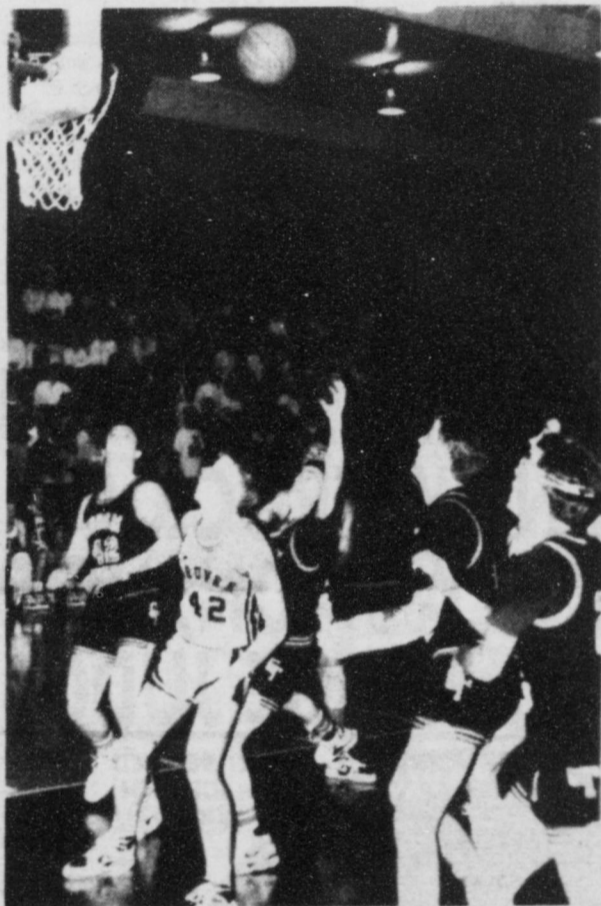

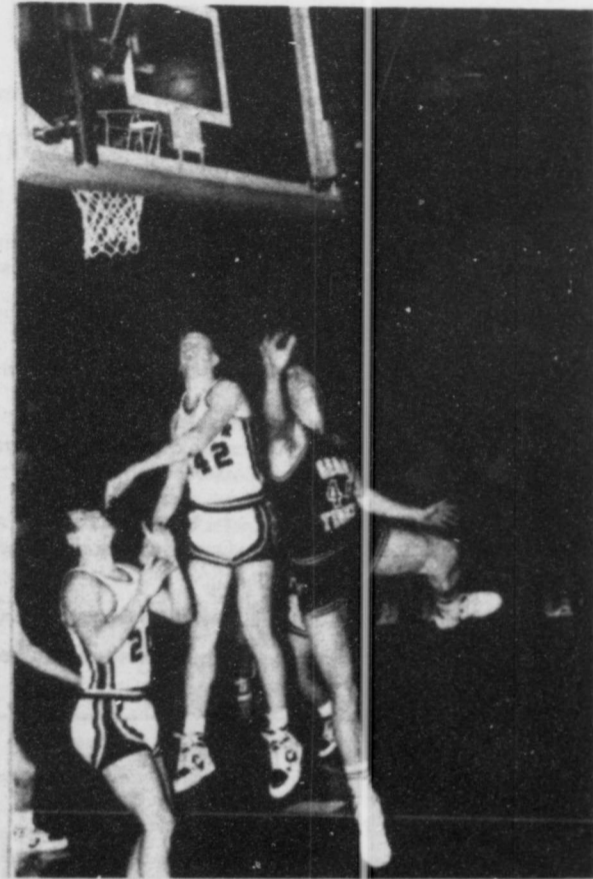

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Famed Christian singer to perform in Amarillo

Contemporary Christian singer Dallas Holm will be performing in concert at the San Jacinto Baptist Church in Amarillo on Thursday evening, April 6.

Included on the album is a new, studio version of "I'll Rise Again," which was originally recorded before a live audience.

The song takes the performer full circle in his musical career, merging his "old days" as a performer at crusades aimed at non-Christians with his new commitment to help with day-to-day growth and development of Christ's followers.

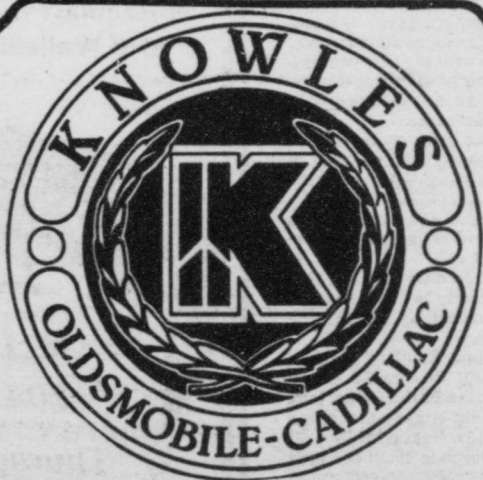

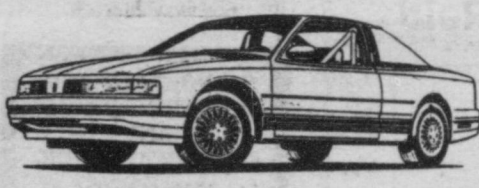
