Historical Marker Unveiling Marks 100th Anniversary Of Boydston

A Historical Marker was recently placed on Highway 70, near old Jericho. The marker was erected in memory of "Mr. and Mrs. Henry Boydston" who in the year of 1889 settled on their homestead and the Boydston community in time followed. The community included a cemetery, school and post office.

In 1890 the Boydston couple were saddened by the loss of an infant son, with the help of three sympathetic cowboys, Mr. Boydston buried the infant in the southwest corner of his farm. Later he deeded two

acres of land to Donley County for cemetery purposes. It became a community burial ground. There are approximately 20 graves at the sight.

At 1:00 p.m. on April 16, those wishing to attend the special services are asked to meet at the Historical Marker sight on Highway 70. Following the dedication a journey to the cemetery will be held at 1:15 p.m. and the conclusion will be at 1:45 p.m., when the crowd meets

at the Groom Community Center for a program, visiting and refreshments.

Speakers for the festivities will be Billie Cristol, Donley County Judge, Ex-official of the Donley County Historical Commission; Dr. Zell Sorelle, chairman of Donley County Historical Commission. There will also be representatives from the Department of Highways and Transportation.

The public is urged to attend.

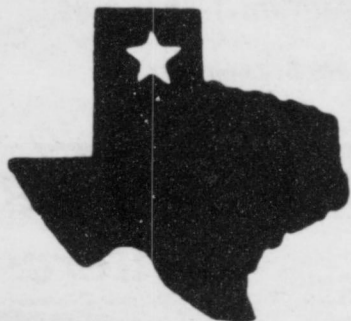

Helen F. Wagoner, 79, a former area resident was killed in a two vehicle accident near Hamlin Friday, March 24.

Helen Wagoner of Pampa was traveling south on U.S. 83, 1.6 miles north of Hamlin, when the 1984 Pontiac she was driving reportedly sideswiped a 1977 Ford truck pulling a trailer, a Department of Public Safety spokesman in Abilene said.

Mrs. Wagoner was pronounced dead at the scene by Jones County Justice of the Peace John Howard.

Private graveside services were at 1:00 p.m. Monday, March 27, in Fairview Cemetery with the Rev. Max Browning, pastor of the United Methodist Church of Pampa officiating. Memorial services were at 2:00 p.m. Monday in the First United Methodist Church with the Rev. Browning officiating. Arrangements were by Carmichael-Whately Funeral Directors.

Mrs. Wagoner was born in Normal, Ill. She moved to Pampa in 1951 from the Grandview community. She married W.A. "Bill" Wagoner in 1936 at Bloomington, Ill. He died in 1972. She was a member of the First United Methodist Church, and the Friendship Sunday School class. She was the secretary of the Knife and Fork Club.

Survivors included two sons, James W. Wagoner of Denver, Colo., and Rev. John W. Wagoner of Merkel, Texas. The family requests memorials to be made to Pampa First United Methodist Church or Merkel First United Methodist Church. 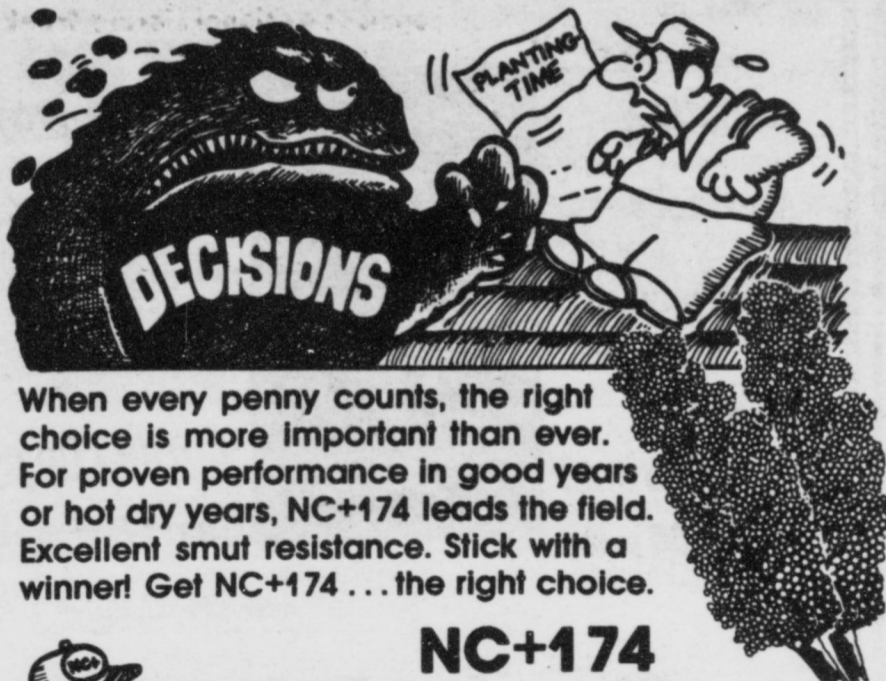

Tigerettes Place First At Six Man Coaches Invitational Meet

Groom Tigers and Tigerettes traveled to Plainview for the first Six Man Coaches Invitational Track Meet. Competing in the competition were 12 teams consisting of athletes from: Groom, Cotten Center, Lazbuddie, Bovina, McLean, New Home, Miami, Silverton, 3-Way, Patton Springs and Whitharral.

The Tigerettes came home carrying a first place trophy for their sincere efforts. Groom won this title by earning 158 points. They were followed by Cotten Center with 68 points.

Tigers placed second with 69 points. Bovina won first with a total points of 94.

In the girls competition Groom scored 158, Cotten Center 68, Lazbuddie 65, Bovina 55, McLean 52, New Home 45, Miami 40, Silverton 23, 3-Way 17, and Patton Springs 12.

Boy's teams totals were as follows: Bovina 94, Groom, 69, McLean 60, Lazbuddie 53, Lefors 53, New Home 39, Miami 36, Cotten Center 30, Silverton 22, Patton Springs 14, Whitharral 13, and 3-Way 6.

In the 3200 race Kristi Case placed second. Groom's 400 relay came in first and set a meet record. Relay

members were: Lesa Sweatt, Karen Bohr, Shannon Fields and Heather Patterson. In the 100 yard dash Karen Bohr placed second. In the 800 yard relay Groom once again placed first, making a meet record. Team members were: Lesa Sweatt, Jenni English, Shannon Fields and Heather Patterson. Karen Bohr placed first in the 400 yard dash. Heather Brown placed fifth in the mile run. In the mile relay Shannon Fields, Katonia Meaker, Kristi Case came in second.

In the field events the girls also fared well. Jenni English came in first setting a meet record in the discus competition. 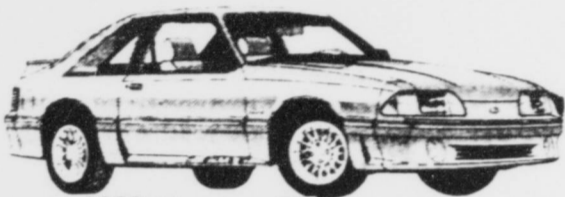

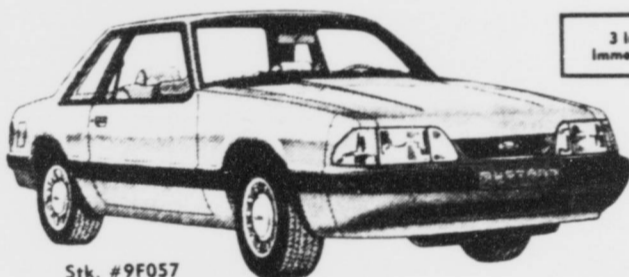

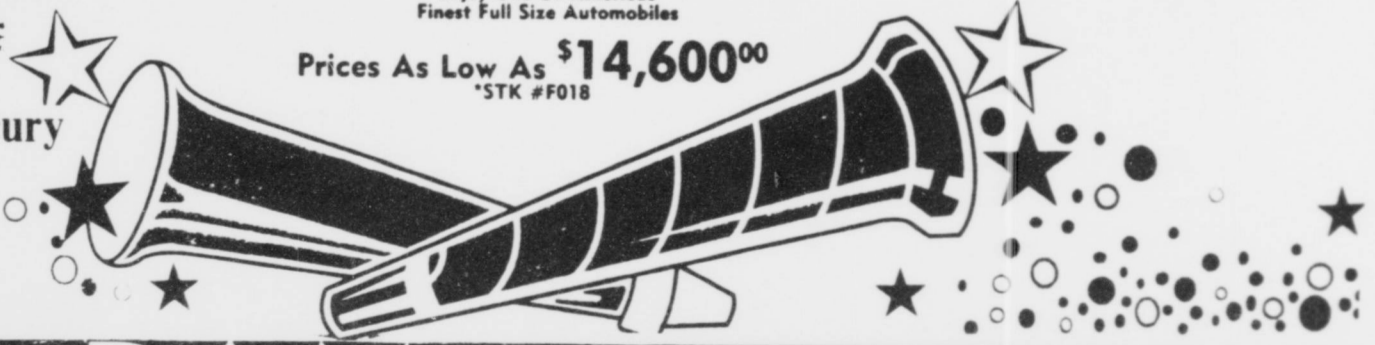

Regular exercise seems to stop bone loss and may even increase bone density, a study at Tufts University found. Postmenopausal women who walked briskly 45 minutes a day, four times a week, had a 3 percent increase in density in a year; sedentary control group lost 10 percent.

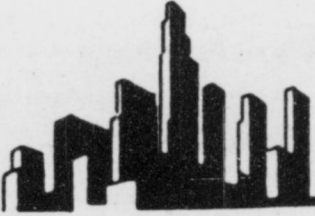

Understanding Your Body

Sleep is a mirror of moods. Sleep problems can be either the cause or consequence of mental stress.

In fact, one key indicator of good physical and mental health may be the absence of sleep problems.

Researchers are now finding an underlying biological relationship between sleep and our moods. Some suggest that changes in our body's internal clock may be at least partly responsible for some severe mood disturbances.

We already know that almost half of those who suffer from serious insomnia also have high levels of psychological stress. Twenty-one percent of serious insomniacs who took part in a major U.S. sleep survey reported patterns of symptoms consistent with major depression—a prevalence three times higher than in those with less serious sleep problems.

Researchers know that depression and sleep disturbances often appear together. Some psychiatrists report that depriving certain patients of all or selected parts of a night's sleep sometimes helps ease depression.

However, patients with panic disorder, a severe form of anxiety, seem to get worse if they are deprived of sleep. These findings provide evidence that panic and major depressive disorders have discernible biological underpinnings.

For more than 30 years, clinical investigators have speculated that some or all of the symptoms of the depressive disorders, including manic-depressive illness, may be associated with abnormalities in the timing or phase control of the circadian system, the body's biological clock.

For example, many of the characteristic abnormalities of sleep in depression—early morning awakening, short total sleep time and early appearance of dreaming—are consistent with a "phase advance" of the circadian clock.

That is, when a depressed patient goes to sleep at midnight, the body's internal regulating mechanisms look like those of a normal person at 6 a.m.

In addition, there is some evidence that certain circadian rhythms, such as body temperature, have shallower peaks and valleys in patients with depression.

Poor sleep is a symptom of certain types of anxiety disorders, including generalized anxiety disorder and post-traumatic stress disorder. Medicines commonly prescribed for both sleep and anxiety disorders may be effective in part because of their action on the central circadian pacemaker. This pacemaker appears to be located in a small area of the brain called the suprachiasmatic nucleus. Anti-anxiety and sleep medicines work by helping the body's natural calming mechanism that is present in this area of the brain.

These specific biological associations between sleep and mood tell clinicians that it is important to look beyond the subjective complaint of insomnia for possible underlying causes. With proper treatment, both mood and sleep disturbances can be solved.

Headache: Five Signs To Watch Out For

How do you know when a headache is a cause for concern? A recent program by family doctors has produced some guidelines that may help you determine when it's time to see a physician. Signs to watch out for are:

- Daily headaches.
- Progressive worsening of the headaches.
- Use of pain relievers on a daily basis.
- Loss of time from work or social activities.
- Headaches caused by physical activity.

Daily headaches can be triggered by a variety of causes, many of which are not serious and can be controlled effectively with simple pain relievers such as aspirin or acetaminophen (your family physician will suggest the medication that's best for you).

If you're a chronic headache sufferer and experience a change in your usual headache, it may be a sign of a new condition that warrants investigation by a doctor.

Stress and depression may also cause daily headaches. Talking to your doctor about problems on the job or at home can help you find healthier ways to deal with tension-

causing situations.

Some headaches are aggravated or triggered by physical activity; others, such as migraines, occur periodically. Migraine headache pain can be severe, and is sometimes accompanied by upset stomach and vomiting. Your family doctor can prescribe medication to reduce the frequency and duration of migraine headaches.

Most headache problems can be treated simply and safely. Early evaluation, however, is all-important.

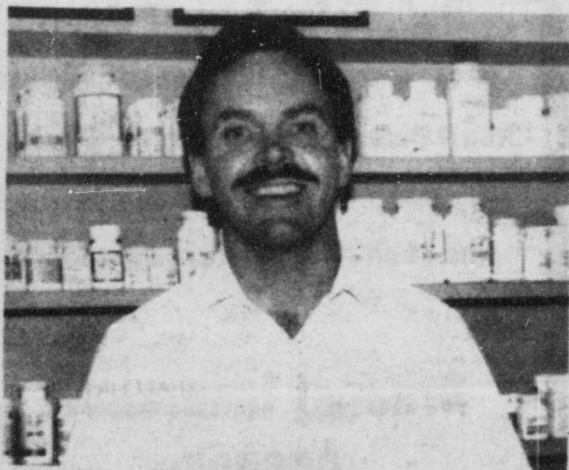
