## Museum Presents Tribute To Ralph Randel

Carson County Square House Museum is offering patrons and friends a second performance of "Primary Colors-Music, Paints, Pictures". The recital by Mila Gibson Burkhard and an exhibit of art by Pan Eimon featuring the creative photography of Shoji Iwase. will be presented on Sunday, Oct. 6 at 3:00 p.m.

Originated by the Amarillo College Division of Fine Arts, this unique recital and exhibit played to a packed concert hall on May 22. It will be presented at the Square House in response to public interest and in celebration of the life of Ralph

Randel, friend, businessman arts supporter and museum benefactor. The Oct. 16 event is free and the public is cordially invited.

As a tribute to Randel, Gibson-Burkhard will sing one of his favorite songs, "When it Comes to the End of a Perfect Day." Painter, Eimon, created a new

canvas for the Museum honoring Randel.

Jo Randel, founder of the Square House Museum and Dr. Dale Roller, Amarillo College, will be joined by officers of both the museum and the college in welcoming guests to the reception which will follow the presentation.

## Sales Tax Rebates On The Rise

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said that a surge in sales tax rebates to several large metropolitan areas in Texas reflects increasing statewide economic growth and stability.

Checks totaling \$64.8 million were mailed to 914 Texas cities that collect an optional local sales tax at either one percent or one and one-half percent, showing a growth of 17 percent in sales tax rebates this month over October 1987. Bullock said. Armstrong, Carson and Gray Counties all showed increases this past quarter of the year.

According to Bullock's report Groom received a check for \$1,869.63, an increase of 30.76 percent. Claude's check amounted to \$2,185.19, an increase of 23.42 percent, while McLean received a check for \$1,672.64, an increase of 13.33 percent.

## Groom School Board

### Prepares For Asbestos Removal

The Groom Independent School Board met on Tuesday, September 13, in the school administrative offices at 7:00 p.m.

Steve Butler was in attendance to discuss his recommendations, as Asbestos Management Analyst, for management of district asbestos and review of costs. Mr. Butler reviewed the proposal that would be sent to the State for approval. The board decided to set their priorities, first the boiler room would be done, followed by the auditorium ceiling, third the tunnel beneath the school would be sealed and last but not the least the heating system would be replaced. The estimated cost will be \$200,000 over a four year period.

Gwen Calhoun of Shamrock was employed as the co-op librarian. She will be in the school library two days a month.

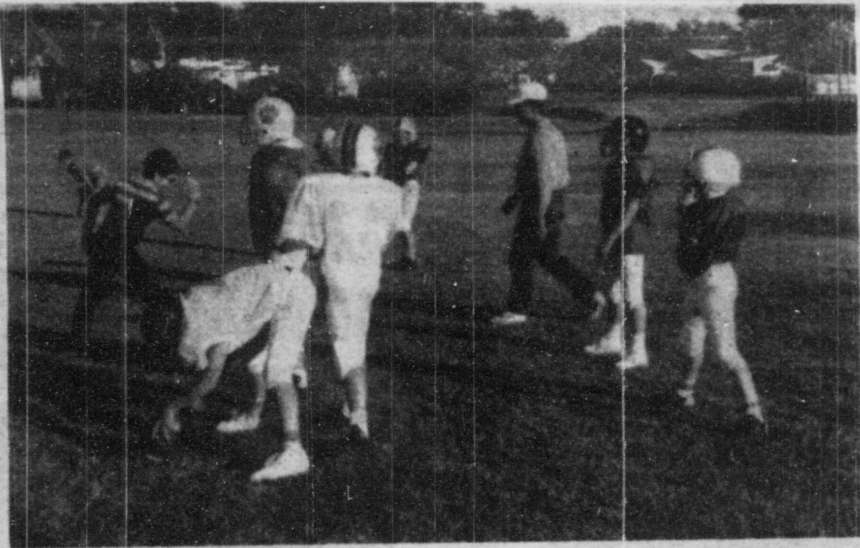
The adoption of Grandview Hopkins Resolution regarding transfer students was approved.

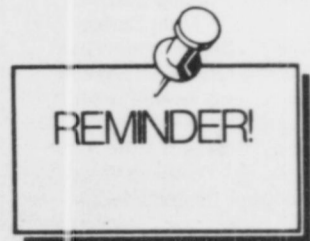

## Commissioners Discuss Firefighting Services

The Gray County Commissioners met Tuesday October 4th to discuss fire protection services within the county. Although no decision was reached, the commissioners did agree on a plan to help settle the matter.

Fire protection within the county became an issue in August when a proposed increase of 20,000 dollars per year for firefighting was presented by the Pampa Fire Department. County commissioners refused to pay the increase, but said they would continue paying the previous rate of 85,000 dollars per year.

The City officials refused the offer, saying the raise was needed to offset their expenses for fire fighting in the county.

There have been two proposed options for the county to decide upon. It was suggested in August that the county could form a county-wide volunteer fire department

and Precinct 4 Commissioner Ted Simmons of McLean proposed forming a rural fire protection district to provide fire fighting services within the county.

The fire protection district would be governed by a five-member fire commission whose members would initially be appointed but then would be elected for staggered terms. This commission could set a tax rate of up to 3 cents per 100 dollar valuation as necessary for funding according to Rudy Davila, a city-county specialist.

The only effect this would have on the McLean and Lefors volunteer forces would be in the way the county pays them and the way they would budget.

A decision on the matter will be made before midnight on December 1 when the county's current contract with the Pampa Fire Department expires.

## Sales Tax Rebates On The Rise

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said that a surge in sales tax rebates to several large metropolitan areas in Texas reflects increasing statewide economic growth and stability.

Checks totaling \$64.8 million were mailed to 914 Texas cities that collect an optional local sales tax at either one percent or one and one-half percent, showing a growth of 17 percent in sales tax rebates this month over October 1987. Bullock said. Armstrong, Carson and Gray Counties all showed increases this past quarter of the year.

According to Bullock's report Groom received a check for \$1,869.63, an increase of 30.76 percent. Claude's check amounted to \$2,185.19, an increase of 23.42 percent, while McLean received a check for \$1,672.64, an increase of 13.53 percent.

## Groom School Board Prepares For Asbestos Removal

Gwen Calhoun of Shamrock was employed as the co-op librarian. She will be in the school library two days a month.

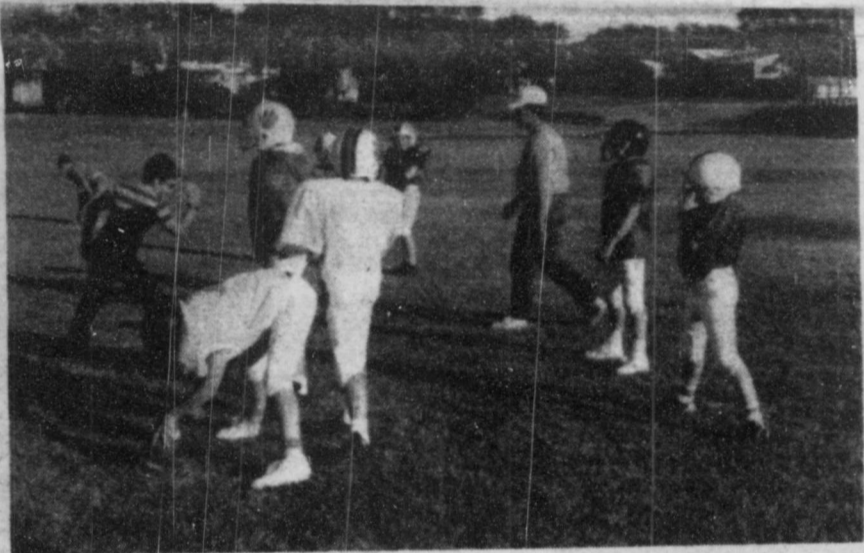
The adoption of Grandview Hopkins Resolution regarding transfer students was approved.



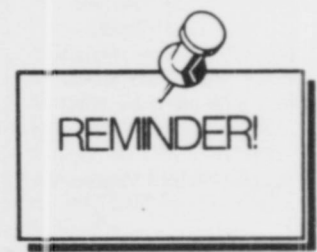

## Commissioners Discuss Firefighting Services

The Gray County Commissioners met Tuesday October 4th to discuss fire protection services within the county. Although no decision was reached, the commissioners did agree on a plan to help settle the matter.

Fire protection within the county became an issue in August when a proposed increase of 20,000 dollars per year for firefighting was presented by the Pampa Fire Department. County commissioners refused to pay the increase, but said they would continue paying the previous rate of 85,000 dollars per year.

The City officials refused the offer, saying the raise was needed to offset their expenses for fire fighting in the county.

There have been two proposed options for the county to decide upon. It was suggested in August that the county could form a county-wide volunteer fire department

and Precinct 4 Commissioner Ted Simmons of McLean proposed forming a rural fire protection district to provide fire fighting services within the county.

The fire protection district would be governed by a five-member fire commission whose members would initially be appointed but then would be elected for staggered terms. This commission could set a tax rate of up to 3 cents per 100 dollar valuation as necessary for funding according to Rudy Davila, a city-county specialist.

The only effect this would have on the McLean and Lefors volunteer forces would be in the way the county pays them and the way they would budget.

A decision on the matter will be made before midnight on December 1 when the county's current contract with the Pampa Fire Department expires.

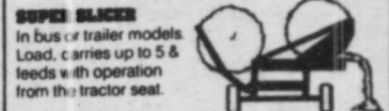

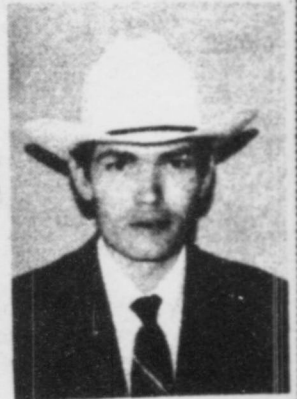

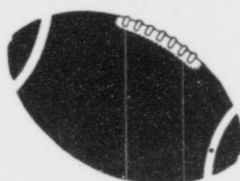
