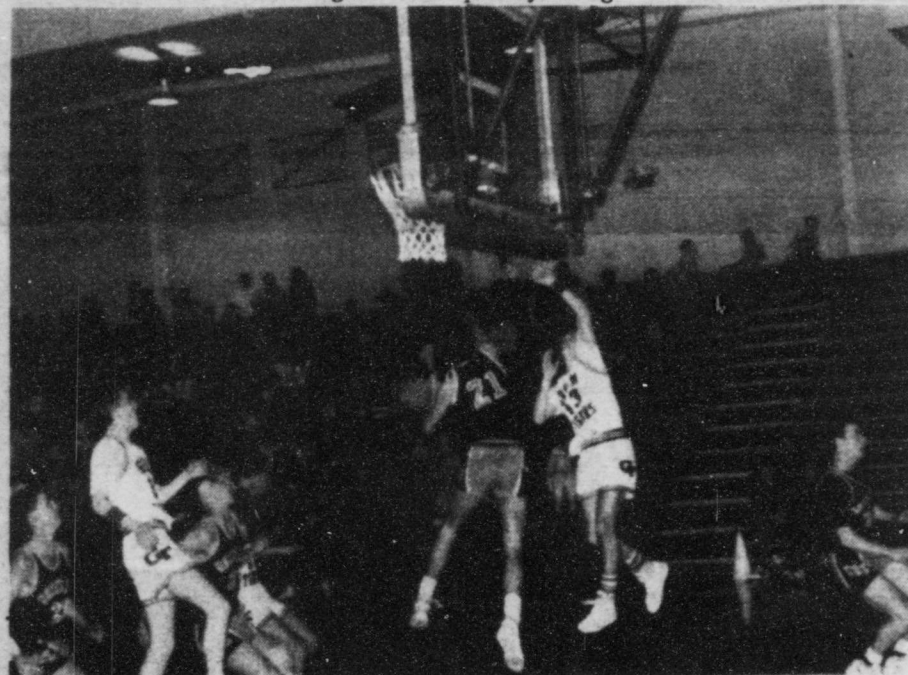

Tigers Beat Wheeler For Bi-District Title

The Groom Tigers opened District 3-1A play in January, they had set their sights on five very specific goals. The first was to finish the district basketball schedule undefeated, second was to clinch the district title and third was to represent District 3-1A in the playoffs, fourth-to out-

score their opponents by an average of 10 points per game; and fifth, winning more than 20 games this season.

The Tigers had high ambitions since the Tigers had not won an outright conference championship since 1966. Despite the odds their goal was obtained. By

February 7, the date of the Tiger's final regular-season game, they had accomplished each task, right down the line.

The Tigers defeated White Deer, 47-45, on February 3, to clinch the district crown, but it took every second of the 32-See Basketball, page 5

Rex Peeples Submits Resignation To Board

Superintendent Rex Peeples, during the course of budget reduction talks with the Board of Trustees, initiated a plan whereby savings could be effected. Peeples submitted his resignation as Superintendent of Schools effective the 31st of July. The Board accepted his resignation and offered the position of Superintendent to Kenneth Sweatt who is currently employed Principal. The Board then offered the Principalship to Judy Babcock, who is presently employed as Home Economics and Language teacher with secondary duties in counseling and administration.

"Your district is very fortunate in having within the system well qualified personnel to assume these duties at this time. Both Mr. Sweatt and Mrs. Babcock have the training and the experience to serve the district in a superior manner."

In resigning, Peeples added that he has enjoyed his tenure as superintendent here and wished the district the best of luck in the future.

"When I was interviewed by the Board prior to moving to Groom, then President of the Board Roman Friemel emphasized that the Groom community wants a top-notch school here. I believe that we do have that kind of superior institution and that we have the records and the honors to support that belief."

"This administrative alignment will save the district approximately \$35,000.00, but it will also mean that Mrs. Babcock will have to maintain some teaching duties until further personnel assignments are complete. I believe that the Groom School personnel will work together to accomplish all the objectives outlined," concluded Peeples.

The board of Trustees voted to investigate further any options available in complying with regulations regarding underground gasoline storage.

The 1989-90 school calendar was revised

slightly, changing a teacher workday scheduled for January 22 to January 15 and moving the end of Easter holiday from April 18 to April 17 and the beginning of the holiday from April 13 to April 12.

In other action, the Board voted to advertise for sale a seventy-five foot (one and one-half city lots) parcel of land north of the Baptist church and south of the school's rental property at 111 Ware street.

The special meeting was concluded with general discussions between members of the board, school personnel and community visitors regarding the \$100,000 reduction in budgeted expenses deemed necessary for the continued financial security of the district.

Superintendent Peeples will remain with the district through the end of July. At the current time, the family has no specific plans for the future but hopes to remain in this area.

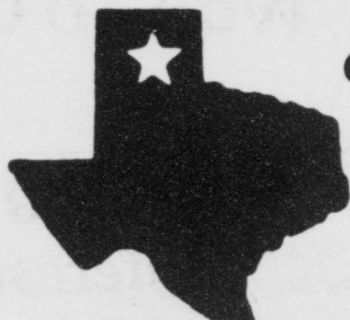

Special Workshop Planned For Elevators and Employees

Operators and employees of grain elevators on the Texas High Plains, in eastern New Mexico and the Oklahoma Panhandle can get the latest information to help them more effectively comply with federal standards by attending a special workshop in Amarillo March 10.

The workshop will be from 8:45 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. at the Texas A & M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Blvd. West. It is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service with cooperation of the Tri-State Chapter, Grain Elevator and Processing Society.

There is no registration fee, but those planning to attend should notify Dr. Carl Patrick, Extension Service entomologist at the Amarillo center, telephone (806) 359-5401.

Changes in standards for grain grading, which have an impact on maintaining grain quality, went into effect last year. The workshop will address those issues and other concerns of the industry, said Dr. Pat Morrison, Extension Service entomologist at Lubbock, a member of the planning committee.

The program has been approved by the Texas Department of Agriculture for three continuing education units toward the five required for recertification by commercial and noncommercial pesticide applicators. However, the program

is designed for and is open to anyone in the grain industry, Morrison stressed. Dean Rea, of Rea Commodities, Inc., Canyon, will open the workshop with an overview of the industry.

Changes in the grain standards and their effect on wheat quality will be explained by Jim Frahm. He is director of planning and evaluation for U.S. Wheat Associates, Washington, D.C.

New regulations for metal phosphide fumigants and principles of their use will be discussed by Don Shaheen. He is vice president and technical director of Degech America, Inc., Weyers Cave, Va.

Stored grain protectants will be discussed by Terry Pitts, entomology manager, research and development, with Gustafson, Inc., Plano. Dr. Roy Parker, Extension Service entomologist at Corpus Christi, will report on the experience with grain protectants in Texas.

Dr. Ron Noyes, Extension Service agricultural engineer at Oklahoma State University, Stillwater, Okla., will explain aeration and turning. Another OSU Extension specialist, Dr. Gerritt Cuperus, IPM coordinator, will discuss principles of integrated pest management.

Occupational Safety and Health Agency issues will be covered by Dwight Fenton, corporate environmental compliance officer with Unity Equity Co-op Exchange, Enid, Okla.

State To Refund Money

State Treasurer Ann W. Richards said Monday that more than 110,000 Texans have \$60 million in lost or forgotten money coming to them this year.

The 110,000 are named in the 1989 version of the Texas Treasury Unclaimed Money Fund List which will be published statewide on Sunday, March 5 in 19 newspapers.

"Each year we try to locate as many people as we can and return this money to them," Mrs. Richards said. "Last year about \$22 million was given back to rightful owners."

All listed accounts, other than those from safe deposit boxes, are worth at least \$10 with the largest account worth more than \$177,000. All safe deposit boxes are listed regardless of the value of the contents.

Generally, accounts on the list are from checking and savings accounts, utility deposits, oil royalties, and corporate stocks.

Most accounts must be dormant from three to five years before they are turned over to the state.

"There is no set time to make a claim on these accounts," Treasurer Richards said. "Money turned over to the State Treasury can be claimed at any time in the future by the original owner or his or her heirs."

Persons who find their names on the list can call the Texas State Treasury on its toll-free telephone line at 1-800-654-3463 or they can write the State Treasury at PO Box 17728, Austin,

Texas 78745. The toll free line opens at noon on March 5.

During the first few weeks the list is published, the toll free line is often tied up by the volume of calls. The lines, however, are kept open for an extended period and there is no time limit for making a claim.

The Unclaimed Money Fund List was first published shortly after Mrs. Richards first took office in 1983 and she has made collecting and returning unclaimed money one of her top priorities.

Since she took office in 1983, the Treasury has collected more than \$209 million in unclaimed funds, which is almost 83 percent of all such funds over collected in the State of Texas. About 95 percent of all funds returned in the 27-year history of the program have been returned during the six years of the Richards Administration.

Money that is not claimed by owners is used by the state for education and general state services such as highways and law enforcement. Last year, for example, \$30 million in non-tax revenue was turned over to the Foundation School fund and the General Revenue Fund.

An immediate effect of that new direction was a commanding, 93-67 victory over Kelton in a warm-up game. It was Groom's highest offensive output of the season and only the third loss this year for Kelton.

On Friday night the Tigers didn't finesse their way into the area round of the state basketball playoffs. But they did hold their ground long enough to down the Wheeler Mustangs, 53-45, in Friday's Class 1A Bi-District showdown at Tex Hann Fieldhouse.

What Groom's turnover-prone offense lacked, its solid defense made up for in clinching an area playoff berth against Gruver, which galloped to a commanding 72-48 victory over Adrian in other bi-district action Friday night.

Defensively the Tigers were in tune, causing 17 Wheeler turnovers, holding the Mustangs to only 45 points.

"I was real pleased with our defense," Lamb said. "We got a lot of turnovers from them. This bi-district win was a big hurdle for us, because the last two years, it's been one game and out. Hopefully we'll loosen up a little against Gruver."

Groom's best offensive performance came from senior Michael Rose, who scored a game-high 20 points, including five three-point shots. His second try put the Tigers ahead, 11-4, in the first quarter and his next two kept Groom ahead

by a nose in the tight third quarter.

Wheeler's own less-than-sterling offensive output made it similarly dependent upon defense. After trailing, 13-8, at the end of the first period, the Mustangs caused seven second-quarter Groom turnovers and outscored the Tigers 10-7 to pull within two, 20-18 by intermission. At that point, Wheeler's Cory Cornett, who contributed nine points, led all scorers with seven.

"We came into the game wanting to keep the score in the 50s, and defensively we tried to slow them down," Wheeler coach Mike Newland said. "I felt like we accomplished that, but Groom is quick—they force you to go where you don't want to. We just didn't have quite enough at the end to do it."

It was nip-and-tuck throughout the third quarter. Wheeler notching the score at 20 in the opening seconds, then tied it again at 28 when Cornett hit a jumper at the 3:40 mark. But Groom went on a 14-6 run to claim a 42-34 advantage early in the final period.

With five minutes to go, Wheeler launched what

would be its last-gasp effort to wrest control of the game. Batton drove the lane for two points, and Kyle Sword, Wheeler's second-leading scorer with 12 points, added four more to close the gap to 42-40.

Groom's Jay Britten added seven of his ten points in the fourth quarter, including a layup between three defenders that entered Wheeler's six point run. Then trailing 44-40, Batton was called for charging, which seemingly let the air out of Wheeler's balloon with just over two minutes left. Groom outscored the Mustangs, 9-3, in the remaining time to advance to the area round of the playoffs.

"That was a crucial point in the game," said Newland, whose Mustangs finished the season with a 16-16 overall mark. "Batton was called on an offensive foul just when our inside game was working. We could have moved within two points, but instead they scored and we were down by six."

Groom is traveling to Burger as the Groom News is going to press, to play Gruver at 7:00 p.m. in the Tex Hann Fieldhouse.

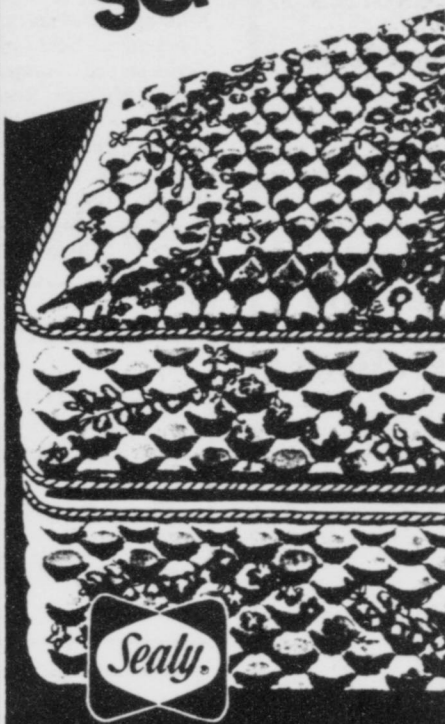

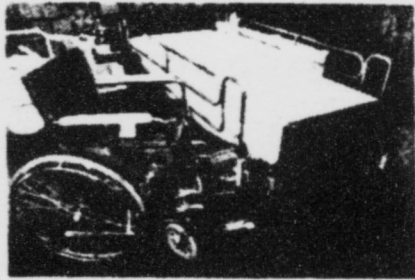

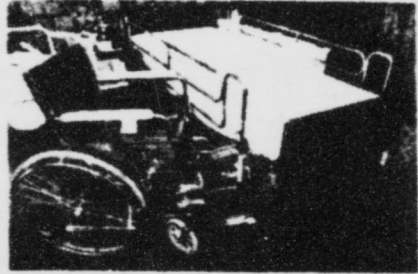

possible, immediate phone consultation with a treatment center should be made.

Are there lasting effects? Recovery is related to the severity of the swelling of the brain. Some children recover completely. Others may sustain brain damage, extending from slight to severe brain dysfunction. All children surviving Reye's Syndrome should be evaluated using quantitative psychologic and neuropsychologic test measures.

What is the role of Aspirin? Epidemiologic research has shown an association between the development of Reye's Syndrome and the use of aspirin for treating the symptoms of influenza-like illnesses, chicken pox, and colds. The U.S. Surgeon General, the Food and Drug Administration and Centers for Disease Control recommend that aspirin and combination products containing aspirin not be given to children under 18 years of age during episodes of fever-causing illnesses. Salicylate is another word for aspirin; some drug labels may use the word salicylate instead of the word aspirin. Products containing either of

these substances should not be given to children during episodes of these illnesses.

Is it possible to develop Reye's Syndrome without taking aspirin? Yes, Reye's Syndrome can develop without taking aspirin. However, the chances of developing Reye's Syndrome can be

reduced by not giving aspirin to children and teenagers during fever-causing illnesses. Parents of young people who take their own medication should be extremely alert and cautious and warn them of the risk of taking aspirin.

Regular exercise seems to stop bone loss and may even increase bone density, a study at Tufts University found. Postmenopausal women who walked briskly 45 minutes a day, four times a week, had a 3 percent increase in density in a year; sedentary control group lost 10 percent.

Some orthodontists are getting an early start on straightening teeth and jaw. Researchers at the University of Pennsylvania say early care may ward off later problems and shorten teen time in braces.

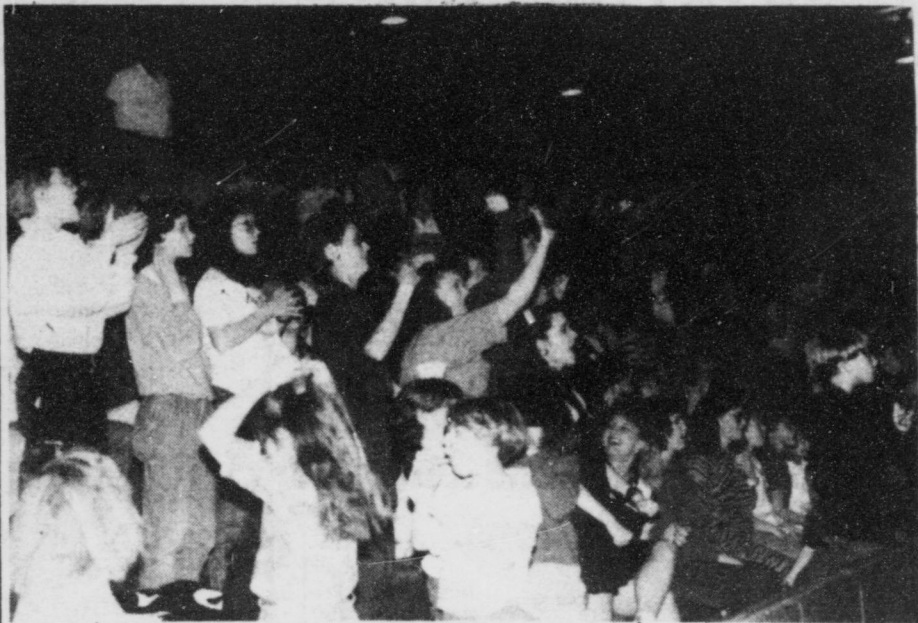
