Ross Nix Buried Here Monday

Ross Nix, 83, died Friday June 23, 1989 in Pampa. Services were at 10:00 a.m. Monday, June 26 in the United Methodist Church in Groom with Rev. E.M. Weathers officiating and Rev. Ron Albright assisting. Burial was in Groom Cemetery with graveside rites by Masonic Lodge #1170.

Ross was born in Quanah, Texas on June 28, 1905 and moved with his family to Shamrock in 1911. He came to Groom in 1928 working as a carpenter. Ross married Cleo Franklin November 19, 1932, he lived here 61 years.

He served as Water Superintendent for Groom from 1965 until he retired in 1973. Ross joined the Groom Volunteer Fire Department in 1943 and was appointed Fire Marshal in 1972. He served faithfully for 46 years. Ross joined the Shamrock Masonic Lodge in 1926. He was a past master of Groom Lodge #1170 having been an active member of the Masons for 63 years. DPS Predicts 52 Persons To Die

The Director of the Department of Public Safety has challenged Texas drivers to show that the DPS traffic death estimate for the long July 4 period is far too high

high.

"The DPS Statistical Service bureau has indicated that as many as 52 persons could be killed on Texas roadways during these hours," Colonel Joe Milner said. "But the number will be lower if more drivers will slow down, avoid drinking alcohol and use a well-known safety precaution seat belts."

Col. Milner mentioned that the July 4 period will include the weekend before Independence Day.

"The DPS Public Information office will conduct the traffic fatality count for 102 hours, beginning at 6:00 p.m. Friday, June 30 and continuing until midnight on Tuesday, July 4," he said. "AS before, we'll be keeping this count with the assistance of local law enforcement agencies along with DPS troopers and communications personnel."

The final count for the 1988 July 4 period, which was 78 hours in length, totaled 32 fatalities.



Farmers Offered s2.50 for non men s3.00 for One Last Chance wish to a welcome.

Farmers with highly erodible fields have at least one more chance to offer to bid the land into the conservation reserve before the deadline for getting a plan on the land. Ed Blackwell, District Conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service at Panhandle, said the ninth signup for CRP under the Food and Security Act of 1985 will be from July 17 to August 4, 1989. Farmers with erodible land need to have a locally approved conservation plan by December 31, 1989 to continue to receive USDA farm program benefits. Farmers need to chech with the local SCS office before December 31, 1989 to see if they are in compliance with the Food and Security Act.

If the land is accepted into the reserve, farmers receive an annual rental payment for 10 years. The land must be established to permanent grass. Farmers can receive a 50 percent cost-share rate for establishing the grass. "This is one alternative that farmers have to comply with the new law," said Blackwell. "If the land is not put into the CPR, some of it may need to terraced of it has visible water erosion or gullies. If it has no gullies, leaving protective crop residues on the land can be the conservation plan." Blackwell said.

Citizens of Groom, BEWARE: This office has experience with tree trimmers, landscapers, ROOFERS, and other con-artists that say one thing and do another as well as leaving people with problems for money well spent.

Now that you have been devastated by hail, high winds, and heavy rains, don't let yourselves be further damaged by those who would take advantage of your misfortunes.


Lots of people will be coming into Groom from just about everywhere to ask to fix your roofs. Most will be good people that will do what they say and do you a good job for the money you spend, but there will be others looking for fast money and either incapable or not interested in doing a good job.

There are a few basic guidelines that one should follow when hiring repairmen, and some are:

- 1. Remember that not everyone is capable of doing you a good job no matter how hard they try because they simply are not capable of doing so. Such is not to say that an inexperienced roofer cannot do a good jo, just that common sense dictates that experience is better than inexperience. You need to prevent allowing your roof to be the one that the roofer is learning on.
- 2. Check out the credentials of the man you want to hire. Talk first with your insurance agent. He or she is going to be working a large number of claims in your area and likely will know something about the man you want to hire, and if not they will advise you so. Also, remember that your insurance company has an interest in your roof because if it is not done right it may not re-insure your new roof.
- 3. Price cutters always show up. Hemember that a deal that looks real good when compared to the standard price may in the long run be too good to be true. You may be buying inferior workmanship and materials at the cut price.
- 4. DON'T PAY IN ADVANCE! If a man has been in business for just about any time at all and enjoys a good reputation he will not heed to be paid in advance to be materials. Such could be a sign of being new in the business, being inexperienced, having bad credit, or that they are bad noney managers. The advance you pay on your job may be paying for the materials on the job the man just finished because he is behind with his finances. AND WHEN YOU PAY IN ADVANCE THEY MAY TAKE YOUR MONEY AND RIN!
- 5. When the job is done and payment has been requested, have your insurance agent or knowledgeable and personal friend check out the job to make sure it has been done right before paying.
- 6. Also, remember that any kind of warranty you receive on your job will not be any good to you if you are not able to find the man or if he is financially incapable of re-doing the job under warranty when called upon to do so.

Injured In Accident

Three people were hospitalized following a three vehicle collision at Highway 60-207 intersection on Wednesday June 21 in Panhandle. The mid-morning accident happened when a car traveling north on 207 pulled into the path of a west bound ambulance on Highway 60. On impact, the ambulance careened to the right and struck a stopped pickup in the south bound right lane on the north side of the intersection.

"There's no doubt in my mind that quick action by the ambulance driver was what kept this from being a fatal accident," said Police Chief Flemmins, his summation was made on skid marks made as the ambulance swerved to the right from its center lane traveled and avoided hitting the car broad side and in fact hitting the pickup kept the ambulance from dead centering a high line pole.

The car was occupied by two Groom men, Bobby Corbin, a Carson County reserve deputy, and former deputy Jerry Gaines. Corbin who was issued a citation for failure to yield right away at a stop sign. Corbin had stopped in the left lane of north bound traffic, beside a combine-carrying truck in



the right lane. As the truck turned east on Highway 60, its size blocked both east bound traffic lanes and blocked Corbins vision of oncoming traffic.

The ambulance was in route from Wheeler, transporting a heart attack victim to an Amarillo Hospital. Mary Kay Christener, an EMT was at the wheel. Louis Stas, a paramedic who is also the publisher of the Wheeler Times, was riding in the back with the patient, 63 year old Wayne Edwards.

Occupants of the pickup were Joe and Barbra Sullivan, of Panhandle. Mr. Sullivan was in the drivers seat. The Sullivan's were examined by their personal doctor and found to have nothing more than bruised bodies from the sudden jolt.

However, they were advised th have x-rays made. The Panhandle ambulance was called to the scene and transported Edwards and Gaines to Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center. Gaines was hospitalized for treatment of head lacerations and Edwards was treated for his heart condition and suffered no accident Returns From Cruise related injuries. The Claude Returns From Cruise ambulance was summoned for assistance and took Corbin to Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center. The Wheeler couple stayed at the scene until Wheeler County Sheriff Jimmy Adams and a deputy arrived by car to take them to their home town doctor for examinations. Ms. Crissener was hospitalized in Parkview Hospital for observation and treatment

for three broken ribs and suffered a sprained ankle.
