McLean Area Enduring Hot Weather

The past several days have been hot and dry in the McLean area. Many grass fires have been reported in and around McLean and Alanreed area.

Temperatures have reached to mid 90's and 100 degree mark the past week. Heat exposure is one of the dangers of hot weather.

All stressed the importance of drinking fluids before, during and after physical activity in hot weather to prevent dehydration. However, each had their own secret method to beat the summer heat:

Cool Advice

When it get really hot, Roger Evans, meteorologist at KGAN-TV in Cedar Rapids, IA, coasts down a hill on his bike to create a cool breeze. "It's almost like creating your own wind chill factor," he said.

Evans also works longer hours at the air conditioned television station to keep cool.

When Greg Solulje, meteorologist at the Central Weather Service in Wheeling, IL, must relay unbearably hot weather reports to broadcast weather

forecasters, he is often told to go "jump in a lake"... which he actually does to beat the heat.

Other weathermen take a more down-home approach: "My air conditioner frequently breaks down during the summer, and I don't like sitting in my hot house waiting for the repairman to fix it," said Gifford Ely, meteorologist at the National Weather Service office in Fort Worth, TX.

"So I wet an old T-shirt in ice water, put it on and sit on the back porch. It's like taking a dip in the lake," Ely explained.

Ed Phillips, meteorologist at KPNX-TV in Phoenix, AZ, finds relief in wearing a minimal amount of light weight clothing and sitting by the pool.

Jumping in a pool or sitting by an air conditioner are effective ways to beat the heat, but they can't beat dehydration--a danger associated with excessive sweat loss. Medical experts stress the importance of replacing body fluids lost through sweat, the body's main cooling mechanism.

"You can never drink too many fluids in hot weather," says Robert Anziner, M.D., president of the American College of Emergency Physicians. "Thirst isn't a reliable indicator of dehydration, so it's best to drink before, during and after any physical activity."

Optimally-formulated sports drinks, such as Gatorade Thirst Quencher, speed fluid absorption in the body, provide energy for use by working muscles, help maintain proper fluid electrolyte balance and encourage voluntary consumption through lightly-flavored taste.

Meteorologists, the first to know of dangerous weather temperatures, are aware of the importance of keeping cool during the hot summer months. Heat illness, including heat cramps, heat exhaustion and heat stroke, can occur as a result of dehydration and elevated body temperature from increased physical activity during hot, humid days. It is important for everyone to take extra steps to avoid being beaten by the heat.

teams to the contractors. No overtime, no coffee breaks, no paid vacations, just hard work at minimum pay.

Early travelers had to be careful of the livestock on the road, as it remained warm through the cool nights and Old 66 was open range with very little fencing. Every roadside tree or parking area had campfire sites and most travelers slept where night found them. This was really roughing it, compared to our present times. Reliving those old trips or remembering the folks telling about them is one of the mystiques luring people back to Old 66.

As you travel the Old 66 route from McLean to Groom, if you look close to each side, you can see the old caliche pits that were used to make the base for the pavement. "Birds-eye caliche" was good as it was harder and packed better than other types of caliche. Just imagine hauling that in wooden wagons that had a board in the bottom that knocked out to dump it. Road graders were pulled by horses, cement mixed on the site and the only tractors used were to pull rock plows.

Texas/Soviet Baseball Series Announced

Congressman Bill Sarpalius and Amarillo Texans General Manager Mike Moore announced on July 6th that the Amarillo Texans will face the Soviet Union National Baseball Team in Amarillo July 17th and 18th for a three-game exhibition series.

This will be one of two stops for the Soviet team in the United States other than the Goodwill Games in Seattle, Washington.

The East-West match-up has been confirmed by the American Federation of Baseball and was arranged

through the efforts of the Amarillo Texan Management and Congressman Sarpalius.

"We are tickled the Soviet Team is coming to Amarillo," Moore said. "This promises to be an exciting series between our boys and some of the best baseball players the Soviets have to offer."

Congressman Sarpalius said the games are a wonderful diplomatic and economic opportunity for the U.S. and the Soviet Union.

"The Soviet team playing in the U.S. is a strong

example of 'glasnost' of openness to ideas and exchange between our two nations and we're honored they chose Amarillo for this historic series," the Congressman said.

"Baseball always has been a great American sport and we're happy to share it with the Soviets," Sarpalius said.

The cost of the Soviet team's travel to Amarillo will be borne by Amarillo Businessmen Tom Upchurch, Paul Engler of Cactus Feeders, Amarillo National Bank, Mike Moore and others.

Several Amarillo corporations and businesses including McDonald's, Pizza Hut, Coca-Cola, Pepsi, Luskey's Western Wear and the American Quarter Horse Association are sponsoring activities related to the Soviet team's visit.

The Soviet players will be lodged at West Texas State University in Canyon.

Details of the visit will be made available as they are confirmed.

Education Finance Bill Passed

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday released an analysis of the education finance bill passed by the Legislature to equalize funding between the state's richest and poorest school districts.

"This bill will not solve all the problems of Texas' schools," Bullock said in the July issue of Fiscal Notes. "We don't know yet whether it will fully satisfy the courts. But it's a long-awaited step in the right direction."

Senate Bill 1, the 1990 Education Finance Act, is designed to establish funding equity in public education within a five-year phase-in period. SB 1 provides for sufficient increases in state funding so that both poor and wealthy school districts have substantially the same ability to raise the same amount of revenue per pupil at the same tax rate, Bullock said.

The Legislature has appropriated \$528 million in new state spending to pay for education reforms in fiscal 1991. Bullock said that total new spending in 1992-93 will increase to an estimated \$1.4 billion and will total at least \$4.2 billion over the five years of the phase-in.

Under the bill's plan, each school district will have access to an average of \$3,811 per student in 1991. This average will rise to \$4,000 by 1995.

"If our schools aren't as good as we can make them, we're not going to be able to compete," Bullock said. "The success of the reforms and programs included in the new education bill will determine what kind of economy Texas will have over the next few decades."

A detailed analysis of the 1990 Education Finance Act is included in this month's special edition of Fiscal Notes, a Comptroller publication.

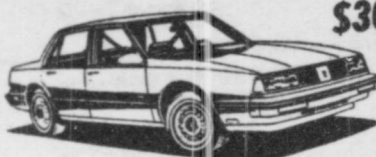

BEEF PRODUCERS CHECKOFF COMPLIANCE

Questions on how the beef checkoff program operates are answered in a newly released brochure available from the Texas Beef Industry Council.

The easy-to-read brochure entitled "Understanding the Beef Checkoff" helps beef producers meet their legal responsibilities under the Beef Promotion and Research Act of 1985. This act authorizes TBIC to collect \$1 per head every time bovines are sold. "Time has shown that the beef checkoff is an effective, positive way to fund promotion, education and research of beef," Anne I. Anderson, TBIC executive director, said. "Our goal is to make collection of the checkoff dollar as effective and positive. We produced 'Understanding the Beef Checkoff' specifically to help producers gain more understanding about their checkoff program."

The pocket-sized, eight-page brochure explains the buyer's and the seller's responsibilities whenever any bovine animal is sold. It provides step-by-step information on how checkoff dollar collectors can complete the monthly report and remittance form for TBIC.

The brochure discusses who qualifies non-producer status and many other important details that may confuse veal, dairy and beef cattle producers.
