Committee's reorganization plan to help make Texas schools better and more efficient would limit 219 of 254 counties to one school district each. General rule is that all operating 12-grade systems would be either countywide in size or contain at least 2,600 students in average daily attend-

Exception would be sparce area districts stretching over a county of more with less than 1,600 pupils and 24 special-purpose units like that operated in connection with military bases.





### EATING ON THE ROAD

Well, the time of year has arved again when businessmen, pecially salesmen, probably Il not travel much, if at all, ntil after New Years.

Retailers, after all, are too busy o see salesmen during the Christmas rush. And while other kinds of business go on regardless of the approach of the holidays, the tendency for most of us is to slow up a bit and enjoy ourselves.

So, perhaps it's a good time to take a good look at how your husband eats when he's on the road. Have you ever checked?

Many Husbands Overeat

I hate to be a kill-joy. But many husbands undoubtedly overeat, both at home and on the road especially on the road on an expense account. And it's not necessarily their fault. If you are entertaining, or being entertained, it is difficult to be restrained if others insist on "living it up."

Trouble is, it ups the waistline, but good! So, does your husband need to reduce? That's our starting point.

If not, there's no need to worry, unless, of course, you know for sure his diet is far from balanced. If that is the case you've got to get him on the four food groups, choosing a wide variety of foods rom the meat group, the milk roup, vegetables and fruits, and

### Selective Process

He doesn't need so much carbohydrate and fat. So the hot sandwiches immersed in gravy, and the french fries better be handled with discretion. Salads are better. A salad, incidentally, can be almost the whole meal at lunch if he wishes. They come adorned for example, with ham, turkey, cheese which give protein. Be moderate with the dressing.

### **Especially With Clients**

At dinner with clients, there's no need always to add a baked potato to that steak. Have a green vegetable instead. Nor is there reason for the steak to always be so large. There are smaller cuts, and the fat can be trimmed off. And watch that habit of eating endless rolls while waiting for other food. And easy on the desserts.







Some guys catch lunkers as if fish didn't come in any other hard to catch the ones that are dwarfs by comparison, and then feel pretty lucky.

To a successful "lunker hunter" luck plays a minor role, say the fishing authorities at Mercury outboards. Seeking out the big fish is a deliberate undertaking, requiring both a knowledge of fish and an unswerving devotion to the proposition that one trophy of braggin' size is worth a hun-dred of his lesser brethren.

While lunker-catching proficiency doesn't come overnight, there is one basic rule the aspiring might keep in mind; "locate the lairs."

Lunkers, like gold, are where i find them. This can be in most unpredictable quarusually offshore where no tible signs give a clue to a

notspot beneath the surface. To find such locations, they are usually quite small, calls for extensive prospecting through a great deal of barren Slow trolling on the bottom or drift casting is the

When a fish strikes, mark the exact spot immediately for future reference. This means taking cross sightings on land objects so that you can find it again. A single hole may yield more lunkers on the next few casts, next day, or a year

The main thing is to know exactly where the location is, for if conditions are favorable for one lunker, invariably others move in

Another aspect of lunker hunting commonly neglected is the tendence of large fish to b u m p a bait half-heartedly without getting hooked. If a few casts prove futile, advise the Mercury lads, mark the location and leave with a min ation and leave with a min-imum of disturbance. Return later for another try.
