### State Capital NEWS

**Appointments**  
John Connolly named J. E. Duff of Burnet to the State Office of Control, the purchasing and bookkeeping agency for state government. McDuff succeeds an Member E. E. McAdams of Austin. His term extends to August 31, 1973.

William F. Farah of El Paso named Mack M. Stripling of Nacogdoches and J. M. Stripling Sr. of Dallas for membership on the industry-hunting Industrial Commission. Stripling fills the unexpired term of Duff, extended only until February 15 and Stripling succeeds William F. Farah of El Paso for a term expiring February 15, 1973.

B. Finley Jr. of Encinal named Porter Halbert of Bronson and Steele Wright of Nacogdoches and Norman Moser of Dallas, also on the Industrial Commission. Terms run to September 7, 1973.

Hazel Richardson, Bryan Public Library librarian, will serve on the Texas State Board of Library Examiners, succeeds Mrs. H. L. McLaughlin of Antonio.

**Attorney General Rules**  
A paragraph in a tax bill eliminated the extension of non-profit corporations providing homes for elderly franchise tax on debt. Gen. Crawford Martin said he had no opinion.

Establishment of a retirement for the president of Midland University does not constitute a supplement to salary and does not make the official ineligible for a \$1500 raise provided in an appropriation bill. The Texas Legislature last session passed a local-option legislation, filed after Nov. 5, containing signatures of 25 percent of voters for governor at the election on that date.

On January 15 to 18, or a boy 15 to 18 is a first-time offender tried in a court that is less than a juvenile court, and is sent to jail until he has his fine or served it out in lieu of possession, purchase or consumption of alcoholic beverages.

Also filed suit for an injunction against an Austin auto mission repair company, alleged deceptive trade practices practiced by the Consumer Credit District court hearing is set for January 9 in Austin.

### PHONE CO. INCREASES LOCAL RATES

The News was reminded that a rate increase was granted to Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. by the City Council recently.

After months of pursuing the increase for Bell Telephone the City Council finally agreed to a rate increase of 25c a month on residence phones and a 50c increase for all business phones. This increase took effect January 1, 1969. This increase will be on the bills coming out this month. The City Council and the Mayor in granting this increase checked and found it was in line with telephone rates in neighboring communities.

**Scale: Check**  
Leslie Darsey called my attention to the fact that he needs a state man to check his scales. This gave me the idea of calling the matter to the attention of everyone in the McLean community. We could get a state man up to check all the scales in the area. I am told the cost is very reasonable where several sets can be checked in the same vicinity. This should run \$10. per set of scales or less.

If you would like to have your scales checked, would you please call Leslie. His phone number is 779-3148. When we get a few names I will contact the State Field Inspector and have him check them out. Do this today.

**Wheat Pasture**  
The zero degree weather has clipped the wheat pasture back pretty close. We look for some rather large runs to begin at Amarillo in the near future. However, we can't see much drop in the price of stocker cattle unless big runs at Amarillo and a drop in fat cattle prices occur at the same time.

There is a great deal of optimism in the market. Fat cattle buyers are having a hard time finding finished cattle I am told. This is especially true of fat steers in the 1,000 to 1,100 pound weight. There are reports that major packers are advance buying cattle in Nebraska, Kansas and Colorado, through March and April.

Most feedlots over the Panhandle report active demand for steers in these heavier weights. Many of them are selling steers as short feed because of the active demand. John Womack, a broker with Merrill Lynch, and a cattle feeder at the Randall County Feed Lot recently sold some choice Ookie steers for \$28.15.

### COMMISSION ANNOUNCE SCHOOL PLAN

Just before the New Year dawned the Governor's Committee on Public School Education unfolded details of a controversial plan to shake up school district boundaries and dramatically revise finance formulas.

Indications are that it will have rough sledding in the Legislature. Committee's reorganization plan to help make Texas schools better and more efficient would limit 219 of 254 counties to one school district each. General rule is that all operating 12-grade systems would be either countywide in size or contain at least 2,600 students in average daily attendance.

Exception would be sparse area districts stretching over a county of more with less than 1,600 pupils and 24 special-purpose units like that operated in connection with military bases.

Governor's Committee recommended that the Legislature adopt its proposed district maps for further study by special local county wide study committees charged with approving the new pattern or recommending something better to suit their own area needs. State Board of Education would compile the final reorganization plan by June 1, 1971.

Projected plan would slash the number of school districts from 1,218 to 354. All but 19 of 662 districts which now have less than 500 pupils would be eliminated. There would be 25 multi-district counties (those of larger population) with from two to 13 districts. All of the latter would have fewer districts than they now have.

Committee's proposals for figuring local districts' adjusted share of a basic foundation school program will also prove controversial, particularly in rural areas. Local share is calculated on the actual property taxpaying ability in each district.

In many counties the number of districts would be reduced drastically. They include the following:  
Bowling from 14 to 2; Cameron 14 to 3; McLennan 20 to 4; Williamson 12 to 2; Grayson 14 to 2; Collin 16 to 3; Denton 11 to 2; Tom Green 9 to 1; Hunt, Taylor, Henderson, Cherokee and Nacogdoches 10 to 1; Rusk 9 to 1; El Paso 9 to 3; Nueces 17 to 4; Hidalgo 19 to 8; Kamin and Lamar 11 to 1; Cameron 14 to 3; Johnson 12 to 2, and Ellis 11 to 2.

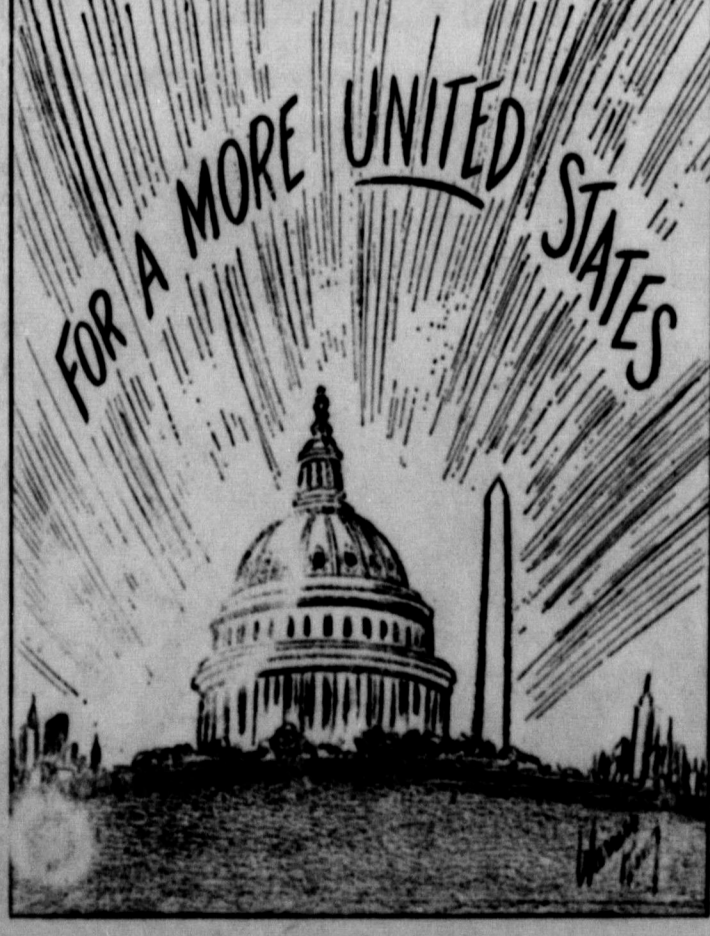

## TAX SAM SEZ:

TOPIC: WITHHOLDING TAXES

For a number of years the withholding tax system has worked well. Wage earner find that it is a lot easier to pay their tax throughout the year than to try to save enough to make a big payment at the end of the year. Changes such as this year's surtax charge perturb many taxpayers when they think of coming down to April 15 and having to pay additional tax.

While most employers do an excellent job of withholding income and social security taxes for and paying these taxes to Uncle Sam, this is a small group who misunderstand the law. These employers feel that they are not required to withhold on a student working during the summer, or a housewife who will work at Christmas, since the employee will not earn \$600 and will not be required to file an income tax return. IRS points out that this is wrong, since the housewife would ordinarily be liable for tax on community income here in Texas, and that the student might well have income from other source that would require him to file and pay taxes - or in either case they could work somewhere else during the year.

### LUNKER HUNTING

Some guys catch lunkers as if fish didn't come in any other size, while most of us work hard to catch the ones that are dwarfs by comparison, and then feel pretty lucky.

To a successful "lunker hunter" luck plays a minor role, say the fishing authorities at Mercury outboards. Seeking out the big fish is a deliberate undertaking, requiring both a knowledge of fish and an unwavering devotion to the proposition that one trophy of braggin' size is worth a hundred of his lesser brethren.

While lunker-catching proficiency doesn't come overnight, there is one basic rule the aspiring might keep in mind: "locate the lairs."

Lunkers, like gold, are where you find them. This can be in most unpredictable quarters, usually offshore where no visible signs give a clue to a hotspot beneath the surface.

To find such locations, they are usually quite small, calls for extensive prospecting through a great deal of barren water. Slow trolling on the bottom or drift casting is the best bet.

When a fish strikes, mark the exact spot immediately for future reference. This means taking cross sightings on land objects so that you can find it again. A single hole may yield more lunkers on the next few casts, next day, or a year hence.

The main thing is to know exactly where the location is, for if conditions are favorable for one lunker, invariably others move in.

Another aspect of lunker hunting commonly neglected is the tendency of large fish to bump a bait half-heartedly without getting hooked. If a fish prove futile, advise the Mercury lunkers, mark the location and leave with a minimum of disturbance. Return later for another try.

Big fish don't come easy. With patience and an enthusiasm that overlooks long fruitless hours and sometimes the ridicule of shoreline casters, the prospecting pays off. That first lunker, and knowing where it came from, will be ample reward.
