## State Capital NEWS

Newspaper readers throughout the state soon will be seeing long news items of the type about important bills as Secretary of State John Hill begins to advertise six proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on Nov. 6.

Between additional amendments will be on the 1968 ballot. Eight of the 20 amendments of interest mainly to special interests (legislators or state agencies). Eight others would affect local governments with powers or duties. Only four amendments directly affect most citizens.

Amendments to be voted on next year will appear on the ballot in this order:

**1. House Joint Resolution** to permit counties to put tax money in a single general fund rather than dividing it in specified amounts for separate funds for various purposes as is now required.

**2. HJR 37**, allowing cities and other governmental units to hospital districts to levy taxes for participation in mental health and mental retardation community centers.

**3. HJR 17**, reviving the Texas land program and authorizing a total of \$400,000,000 bonds to finance continued land purchase of farm and ranch land by veterans, including those who have served in Southeast Asia during present hostilities.

**4. HJR 6**, authorizing counties to pay medical, doctor and hospital bills of county law enforcement officers injured in the line of duty.

**5. HJR 12**, authorizing a \$100,000 state revenue bond for the development of parks and recreational facilities. Bonds are expected to be sold by a small admission fee.

**6. HJR 27**, permitting county officers and employees to hold non-elective positions under state or U. S. governments where there is no conflict of interest and where the state interest benefits.

That's all for '67. The interest in these amendments doubtless will center on the park bond proposal and the mental health amendment.

Hospital mental health and mental retardation groups will emphasize the importance of Amendment No. 2 to the new community center approach of bringing mental patients close to home.

Calling the 1967 election for August 13 and a Saturday, doubtless to assure a high voter turnout for the land bond amendment. A substantial campaign to urge its passage is being taken.

Gov. John Connally is the fiscal backer of the parks and recreational lands and facilities sites. This would move the triple present state park system and open a variety of facilities for outdoor recreation.

Any opposition to the amendments to date has been based on \$1 a car park-entry fee, which is proposed by Connally to finance the vast program; and increased complaints that facilities included in the governor's plan do not adequately serve some areas of the state.

It is expected to spearhead an issue fall campaign—supported by parks, recreational and outdoor groups—to put over the amendments.

The veterans land amendment would add another \$200,000,000 state bonds previously authorized.

The fall itinerary includes visits to ports in Mediterranean Europe, middle eastern and far eastern Asia.

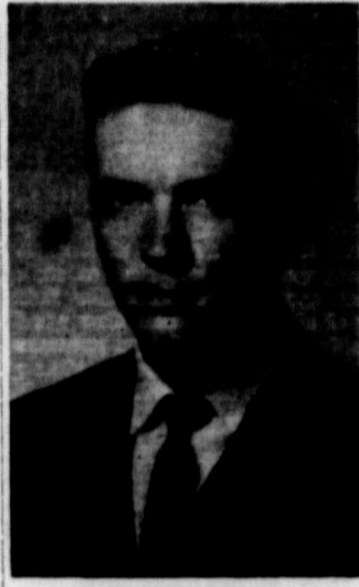

There is a growing interest in using tricot fabric for children's wear, says Jimmie Lou Wainwright, Gray County home demonstration agent.

Formerly used in sleepwear and underwear, the potential of tricot is now being more fully exploited in outerwear.

There are many reasons why designers consider tricot a natural for children's clothes. The fabric is a warp knot made from fine filament and textured yarns—nylon, triacetate, polyester or spandex. It has great affinity for colors and prints. Tricot has excellent wash-and-wear properties, controllable stability, is lightweight, run-proof and drapes well.

The relative looseness of fabric construction and yarn mobility, as well as fabric elasticity, results in wear resistance substantially better than a similar weight of woven fabric.
