State Capital NEWS

State and hospital officials are behind the far-reaching new program which will begin operation as scheduled on September 1.

The program will bring medical benefits to 350,000 Texas. It is authorized by federal law which provides for the latter, to medicare to old folks.

The Department of Public Health, which will administer the program, estimates benefits during the first year of operation will total \$125,000,000. Federal will match a \$26,700,000 outlay on a four-to-one ratio.

Eligible for benefits are Texas public welfare assistance, blind, families with dependent children and the totally and permanently disabled, or eligible for such assistance as patients at state mental hospitals. (Coverage is automatic for the latter, no application as such required.)

Services include in-patient care, out-patient hospital care, nursing home care, diagnostic work such as laboratory and x-ray costs, dental and nursing home charges.

Eligible welfare enrollees will be identified by cards from the Department of Public Welfare. Cards can be presented to the care as limited by details of the federal act (Title 19).

New Texas Occupational Safety Board will interview applicants for the \$17,500 per year year chief engineer's post on September 7.

UNDESIRABLE FISH GET HEARD - Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission will hold a hearing Thursday, August 17, to map out regulations for introduction, sale or release of undesirable tropical fish or fish.

Staff members will present a list of undesirable tropical fish, including 11 species and several members of the snakeheaded fish genera. Included among "undesirables": the Aruana, three species of Piranha, the electric eel and electric catfish, Garpike, Pavon or Peacock bass, two species of South American catfish and the fresh water stingray. Snakeheaded fish have teeth, a big mouth and appetite to match and have been known to attack humans.

DRAFT QUOTA SET - Texas' 156 draft boards have received a quota of 1,180 men for September, reports Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state selective service director.

Quota compares with 1,421 for August, 974 for July, 975 for June, 886 for May and 675 for April.

Draft boards will forward approximately 4,000 men in September, all for the Army.

ATTORNEY GENERAL speaks - Flamingo Isles Municipal Utility District can engage in navigation and reclamation projects along the Texas coast if approved by Texas Water Rights Commission, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

In another opinion, Martin concluded that "de-dedication" of a two-acre Dallas cemetery tract, its sale to a bank as trustee of a perpetual care endowment fund and subsequent lease to a licensed funeral establishment is legal.

PAID TOO MUCH? - Sabine River Authority employees working on Toledo Bend Project are paid too much money, according to Texas and Louisiana state auditors.

More than \$46,900,000 has been spent on the two states on the giant multiple purpose dam and reservoir at Toledo Bend. Salaries since 1962 have totaled \$623,017, audit report noted.

GOOSE ISLAND PROJECTS UNDERWAY - Contract to dredge and make a 5,500-foot boat access channel at Goose Island State Recreation Park, 10 miles northeast of Rockport, has been awarded by the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Final plans now are being drawn for a 1,620-foot lighter fishing pier on Goose Island's eastern tip. Channel will extend eastward from the boat ramp near the headquarters building in the park and connect with St. Charles Bay Channel.

McLean area residents interested in serving with the Peace Corps in developing nations are invited to take the Peace Corps Placement Test at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday, August 19 at Room 322, Post Office in Amarillo.

The test measures general aptitude and ability to learn a foreign language, not education or achievement. It is given to determine where and how an applicant will be happiest and best utilized overseas. The test requires no preparation and is non-competitive; an applicant can neither pass nor fail. The test takes approximately one hour and a half.

Persons interested in serving with the Peace Corps must fill out an application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before the test. Application forms are available from local post offices or from the Peace Corps in Washington, D. C. 20525.

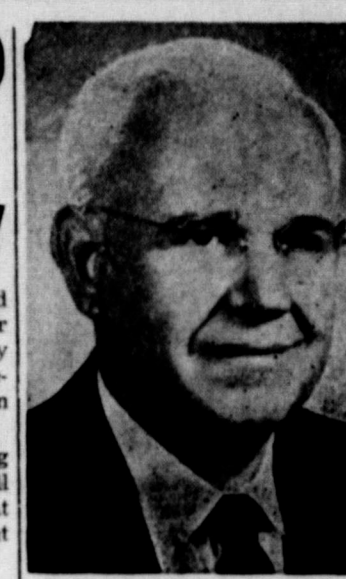

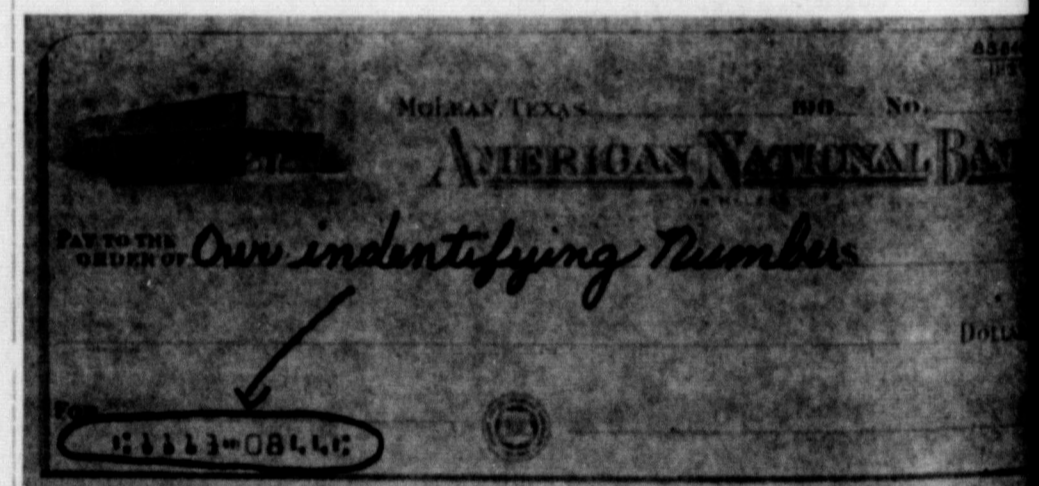

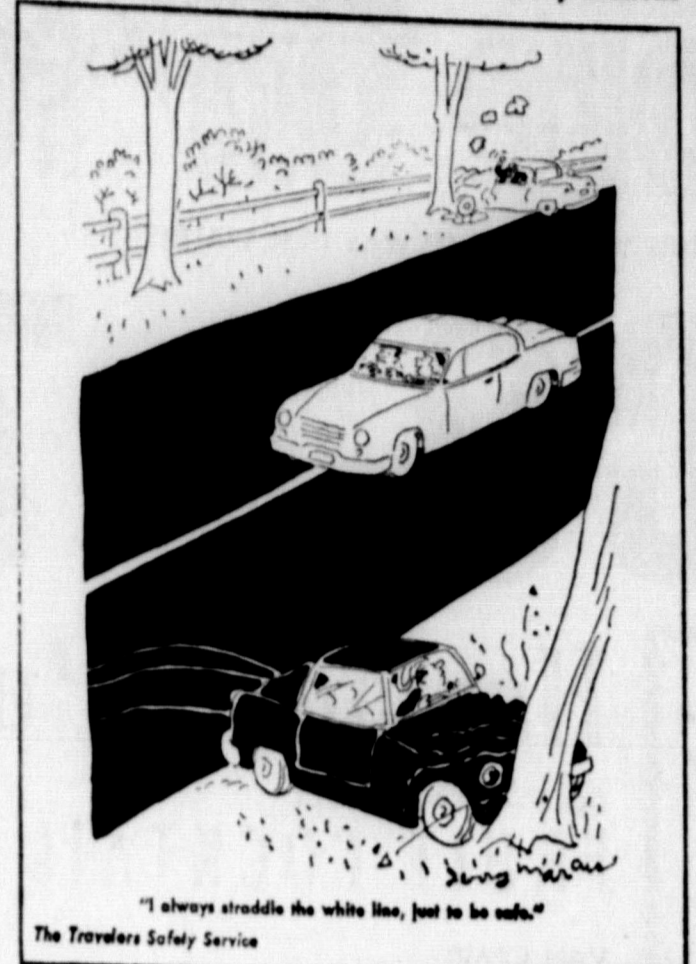

Fromm said, "Clutches of young pheasant chicks following their mothers vary in size from day-old youngsters to month-old birds indicating that the nesting season has been long and productive throughout the summer."

TAX SAM SEZ.

Internal Revenue folks point out that thousands of American housewives are tax violators.
These ladies consider themselves community leaders and law-abiding citizens, but fall into the trap of becoming tax law violators by failing to file a household employee's tax return on their maid. There is also a large group who forget to file a household employee's return on the high school boy next door who mows the lawn. If you employ household or yard help, you should get a copy of Circular H from Internal Revenue and see whether you owe social security tax on these employees or not.
Taxpayers Ask IRS
Q—I have arranged to have the proceeds of my National Service Life Insurance paid to my wife under option one in a lump sum. In a discussion of this matter the other night, the question arose as to what would happen if my wife and I were killed in an automobile accident.
A—in the event both the insured and the beneficiary were killed in a common disaster, a determination would have to be made as to who died first. If this cannot be determined, it is assumed that the insured died carrying extra tackle. Also handy to have around the camp first. In this case the proceeds would be paid to the estate of the principal beneficiary. It is possible to avoid this kind of situation by providing in the designation of beneficiary the requirement that he or she survive the insured by a specific number of days, not to exceed 30. If the principal beneficiary does not survive the insured by the number of days indicated, the proceeds of the policy will be paid to the contingent beneficiary or the estate of the insured.

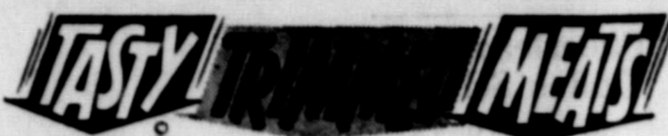

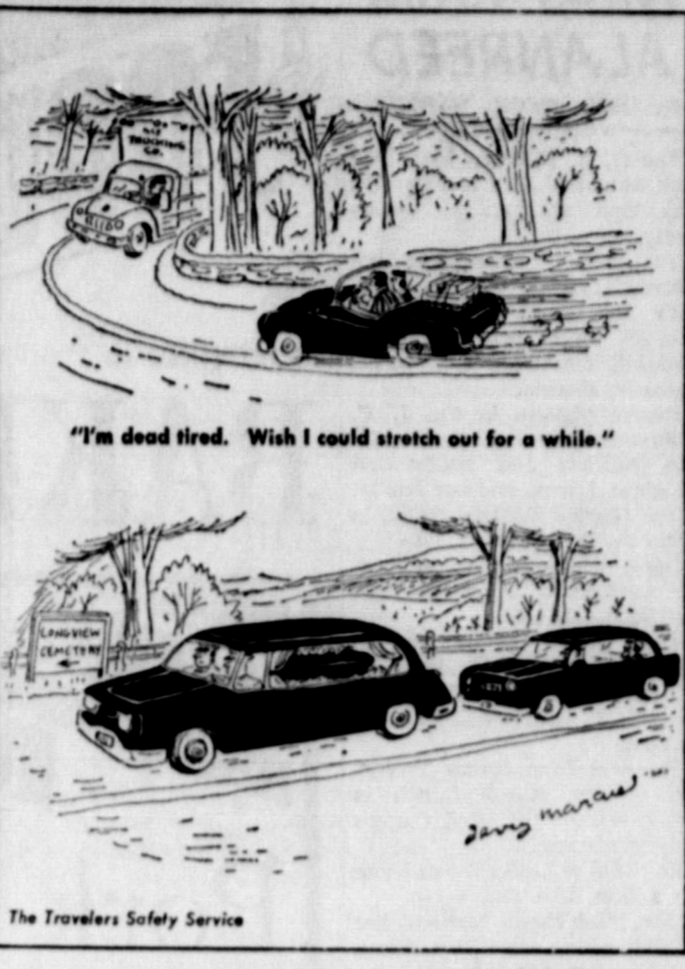

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III to be known as Section 52e, reading as follows:

"Section 52e. Each county in the State of Texas is hereby authorized to pay all medical expenses, all doctor bills and all hospital bills for Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this state at a election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended as follows:

Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall draw no pay a warrant upon the Treasury in any person for salary compensation as agent, or appointee, who holds the same time any other office or position of honor, or profit, under this Constitution. Provided, this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted members of the National Guard, Air National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and the Officers Reserve of the United States, nor to retired members of the Air Force, Navy, and Air Corps, and retired members of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps. It is further provided, that hereafter only if authorized by the Legislature general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, a non-elective State officer or employee may hold non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of the State of Texas and are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold

any other office or position of profit under this state, or the United States."

SAFE FOODS FOR PICNICS AND CAMPING

Eating is a natural and necessary part of picnics and overnight camping. It should be tasty, easy to handle and prepare, and it should be safe. Otherwise all the fun is spoiled.

For the brief daytime or early evening picnic in a nearby park, forest preserve or state park, or at the beach, the problem is relatively simple. You don't go far or stay long, so your food has little chance of spoiling. Even so, there are some warnings worth heeding.

Since most picnics take place in warm, if not hot, weather, you will naturally avoid foods which spoil readily, or you will take steps to keep them refrigerated. One of the lightweight insulated picnic chests which holds ice below and foods in a tray above is a great convenience; my wife and I carried such a chest on a long auto trip a year or so ago, and ate our lunches by the roadside — a great improvement over catch-as-catch-can foraging in inferior restaurants. We were able to buy ice cubes everywhere, and we lost nothing by spoiling.

Freezing Help
For short jaunts lasting a few hours or a day, sandwiches can be made in advance, bagged in plastic and frozen; they will thaw just about in time to be eaten. Cakes and bakery goods with cream or custard filling should be avoided in hot weather unless they can be frozen and eaten immediately upon defrosting.

Flies, ants, spiders and other pests spoil picnics for many fastidious persons. A good protection for food at picnics is a somelike cover of net on a wire frame, available commercially or easily made by a handyman at home; it discourages prowling squirrels and other wildlife, too.

Insulated Containers
Insulated bottles for coffee or milk, and wide-mouthed jars to keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold, are a must for successful picnicking. Addicts to frequent picnic jaunts will find the fully equipped picnic baskets, with cups, plates and "tools" for four, an ever-ready convenience as well as a safety factor.

For longer trips, milk should be purchased along the way, but care should be taken to see that it is pasteurized and has been kept cold. The label of a well-known dairy is an added safeguard. Where water supplies are dubious, bottled soft drinks or club soda may be substituted; a large insulated jug or a pottery jug which keeps liquids cool, can be refilled at stations where safe water is assured.

Foods to be cooked may be carried raw if refrigerated; otherwise canned foods or dry mixes should be used. Fresh produce may often be purchased along the way to vary the menu; we once revelled in blueberry pancakes in a remote Canadian forest, keeping a wary eye out for bears in the blueberry patch. Try it some time!

He was able to hit the high for the day and for the last thirty days as well. It is most difficult to hedge a profit into a 600-700 pound native steer on today's market for any month. We have a situation at present quite different from that of the last 18 months. The distant months are now selling lower than the near by months. This eliminates the advance buying of stocker steers and hedging on months that will fit the date when your cattle come out of the feed lot.

All of these things affect the price you will get for your calves this fall. I would highly recommend that you write for several free publications that will help you keep up with trends. Write the "Crop and Livestock Reporting Service," USDA, P.O. Box 70, Austin, Texas 78767, and ask for all reports that pertain to livestock marketing. Write the US Dept. of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250 and ask for the quarterly livestock and meat situation report. Write the "Texas Department of Agriculture," Drawer BB Capital Station, Austin, Texas 78711 and ask for the Texas Livestock Market News." It comes out weekly and it filled with excellent market news information.

NEWS County Agricultural Agent Texas A. & M. College Extension Service

By FOSTER WHALEY

County buying of steers and calves for fall delivery had a spurt about two weeks ago. Things are rather quiet at present. We have had unconfirmed reports of some 32 cent steer calves.

At the present most buyers are taking a wait and see attitude.

A new report has been released that more or less confirms the 32 state report received in mid July. In my opinion both reports were very favorable. The new report didn't seem to have a great deal of bearing on the futures market. It did show that cattle on feed in six selected cattle feeding states was down one percent from the same period one year earlier.

Recently the futures market has shown some significant strength. No doubt the very active fat cattle market is chiefly responsible for the futures market showing the recent strength.
