Patterson Resigns From School

Groom ISD school board trustees met in regular session last week with all members present. Also attending were superintendent Ben Ingham, business manager, Joyce Hutsell, principal Fred Lunsford and Steve Hutsell, teacher.

The technology committee submitted a request for needed computer equipment for the 1995-96 school year.

The board approved TASB localized update number 49, which deals with many issues such as textbook adoption, school report card reporting, student testing, pest control, labor rules and student record management.

Board members discussed scholarship award as stated

in the school policy. No action was taken.

Nancy Patterson, head of the cafeteria department, submitted a letter of resignation. The board accepted.

Trustees went into executive session at 9:30 pm returning into open session at 9:52 pm to discuss personnel assignments and reassignments. No changes were made at this time.

Discussion was held concerning Groom FFA and those students who attend stock shows. The schedule submitted by sponsor Charles Burk was discussed. The board voted to remove Oklahoma City and Beaver from the list as well as all overnight trips with the exception of one major show which has been

designated Houston Stock Show. FFA exhibitors to pay their own food and lodging expenses, as well as, entry fees and equipment. The measure was unanimously approved.

The TAAS results for 1994-95 were approved.

A discussion was held concerning new salary schedules and employee insurance needs. No action was taken.

Carson County Historical Commission Receives Award

The Annual Meeting of the Carson County Historical Commission was held Monday, June 12, at the Square House Museum in Panhandle.

The financial report for 1994-1995 was reviewed and approved. It was reported that the historical commission had again received the Distinguished Service Award from the Texas Historical Commission at the Preservation Conference in Austin in April for its 1994 program of work.

Mogie McCray, commission chairman, reviewed projects for the year. Two new historical markers, the "Conway Community Church" on September 17, 1994 and the "Hotel at White Deer" on May 20, 1995, had been dedicated. Two markers, the "Burnett No. 2 Discovery Oil Well" and the "First Rotary Drilling Rig in the Texas Panhandle", had been replaced in July. Four markers in White Deer had been refinished by White Deer High School students.

Inscriptions for new and replaced markers had been given to all school and county libraries to complete the list of marker inscriptions in the county at the libraries.

Surveys of cemeteries in Carson County are being made. The Panhandle Cemetery and the White Deer Cemetery are completed. The Groom Cemetery and the White Deer Sacred Heart Cemetery are being updated. KFDD-TV of Amarillo had interviewed Howard Lane at the Panhandle Cemetery in April during a series of programs on cemeteries in the area.

Other programs for the year included archeology, oral history, veterans, tourism and cooperation with the Square House Museum.

As yet, there are no known recipients for the Texas Land Heritage Program. To be eligible a family must have been actively engaged in farming or ranching on the same piece of land for 100 years.

Name Change Required

Carson Co. Sheriff's Report

The Carson County Jail is currently housing ten prisoners. Prisoners were transported to Carson County this week for Failure to Pay Child Support, Felony DWI and County Warrants. A prisoner held for Colorado authorities was picked up by transport officers for return to Colorado after waiving extradition from Texas.

Deputy Ray Davis was called to investigate the crash of a small aircraft near Groom. No injuries were reported, but there was substantial damage to the aircraft.

Chief Deputy Lovell Kennard and other department personnel were called to Interstate 40 near Conway to assist with the landing of the Medivac I helicopter. The patient was transported to Amarillo and had apparently suffered a heart attack while staying at a

local motel. Our officers were called to assist firefighters at two grass fires and one structure fire in Carson County. One fire currently under investigation for determination of origination.

Carson County deputies assisted Potter and Wheeler County authorities in the investigation of a kidnapping/sexual assault which is alleged to have taken place in Potter County near the Carson County line. The victim was found in Wheeler County.

Our department is investigating the burglary of a business on U.S. 60 which occurred early Monday morning. Entry was gained by breaking out the front door glass. Deputy Larry Mendez is conducting a follow-up investigation on information gathered from possible witnesses to the offense.

Emergency Haying And Grazing Approved For Carson County

Carson County has been approved for emergency haying and grazing of CU for Pay (0/85) and ACR acres. THIS APPROVAL DOES NOT INCLUDE CRP ACRES. Producers who wish to hay or graze these acres must certify these acres and sign the register at the ASCS office stating their intended use. Approved cover crops may be hayed or grazed on these acres and used for the producer's own livestock or livestock owned by someone else.

Producers should not remove cover to the extent that the land is not adequately protected from wind and water erosion. Producer can not harvest the approved cover for grain or seed.

Disaster Affected Wheat
Remember to contact the ASCS office before you destroy any wheat that you certified as wheat for grain. You will need to revise your certification to show disposition of the crop. The office will also need a copy of the appraisal sheet for the crop that you destroy.

If you are going to harvest the wheat and expect it to produce a yield low enough to trigger an insurance indemnity then you need to request a pre-harvest appraisal 15 days prior to harvest. This applies only to wheat producers who are insured with the ASCS office.

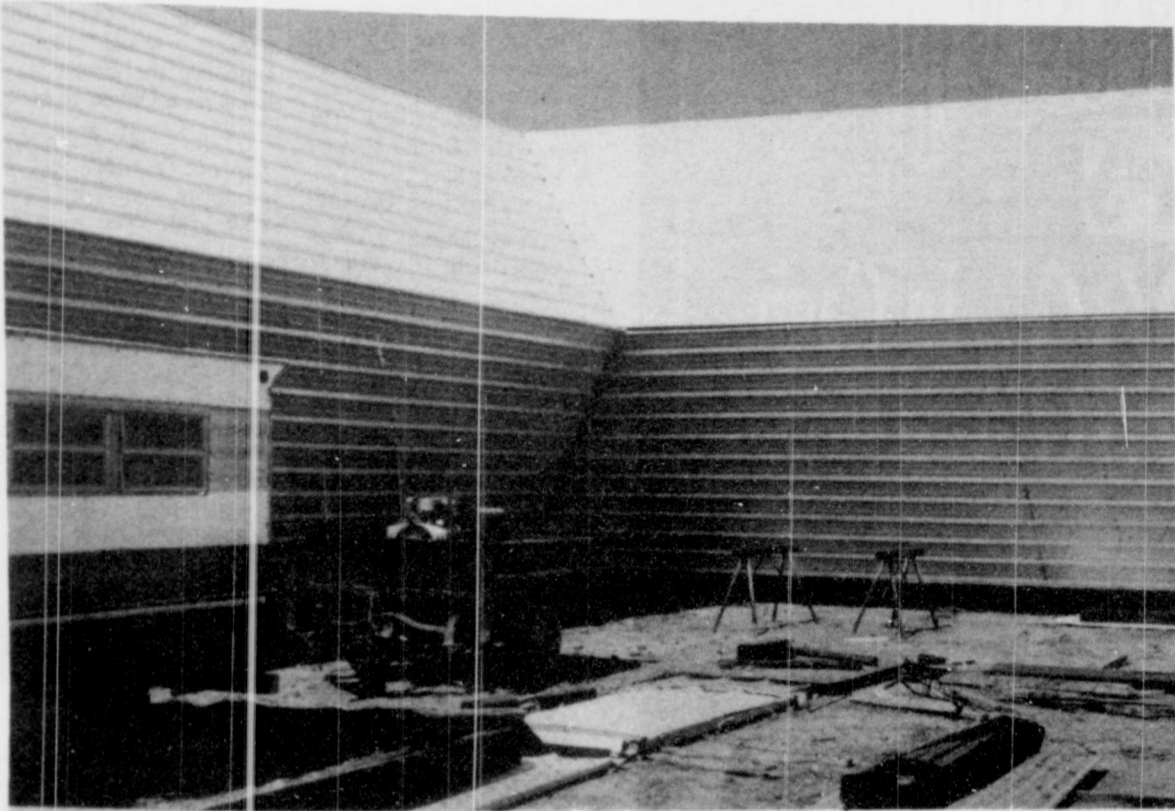

District To Retain Instruments In Hopes of Future Program

On June 13, 1995, at 7:00 pm, the McLean Independent School District Board of Education held its regular meeting in the business office.

Board members in attendance were president Jake Hess II, Jay Dee Fish, Billie Ward, Eugene Galley, Bob Glass and Neal Odom. Also present were MISD superintendent John Griffin, MISD secretary Lezlie Stewart, coach Jerry Miller, high school principal Rick Reeser, high school cheerleading sponsor Jaque Riley, Kelly McClellan, and McLean News representative Billie Jean McClellan.

After the opening prayer the minutes of the May 9 regular board meeting and the June 2 special meeting were approved.

The first item of business considered was the approval of Service Center contracts. The Service Center provides materials and services required to satisfy the Texas Education Authority's requirements in specific

areas, including Computer Services, Contracted Services for Chapter 1 ESEA and Chapter 2 Block Grant Coop, Cooperative Bidding (no charge to MISD), Curriculum/Staff Development Services, Drug Free School and Communities, Gifted and Talented, Management Leadership, Media, Micro Computer Purchasing (no charge), RCD-BE (required administrative software), School Board Training (no charge), Special Education materials, State Compensatory (Technical Assistance), and Title II Math and Sciences.

All schools in Region 6, 65 schools in all, use the Service Center, in one form or another. Individual school districts do not have the personnel or ability to provide all materials and services mandated by the State.

The Board unanimously approved this item, but all voiced concern that the amount required for the coming year had risen by

approximately 30%, to nearly \$90,000, with the largest increase in computer services.

Mr. Griffin expressed hope that the amounts required to be spent could be more in the Board's control with passage of the TASB Home Rule School Proposal. In his words, "Then, if they don't send us the money, we don't have to do it."

Mr. Griffin reported on the copier proposals under consideration. He ranked them in order of preference as Xerox, Lanier and Sharp. MISD will not purchase the copier, but will sign a cost-per-copy lease with a 30-day cancellation clause, allowing the District to change vendors if there is dissatisfaction. The copiers will have user-ID capability, meaning that each user will have to enter the appropriate code for the machine to function. This will cut down on the use of the machines by unauthorized individuals and lessen the number of copies made, thereby decreasing

cost to the District. Neal Odom moved to accept the recommendation to lease Xerox machines; Bob Glass seconded. The vote was unanimous.

The Board then considered whether or not to sell the band instruments, as it had been two years since the band program ended. Bob Glass pointed out that no major deterioration would occur in a short time span and that some school districts, such as Spearman, had retained their instruments and had been able to re-institute the program at minimum expense. Billie Ward expressed the Board's desire to retain the instruments and to check on the status of the uniforms, in the hope that the school might one day be able to have a band again. No action was taken other than a recommendation by the Board that both instruments and uniforms be stored in such a way as to facilitate future use.

School Board

The District's current bill for back taxes, discovered that Jay O'Brien had never been billed for back taxes totalling \$552. Mr. O'Brien was contacted and expressed a willingness to pay the taxes and asked that any penalties be waived, as he had never been billed. Neal Odom moved to accept Mr. O'Brien's offer to pay the taxes and waive the penalties. The vote was unanimous. During the discussion on this matter it was noted that during the last few months of working the books over \$10,000 in taxes was billed and

Reeser spoke to the board regarding an attempt to bring college-credit courses in mathematics, calculus and pre-calculus, to the high school. A minimum of seven students would have to enroll in order to use Clarendon College's coop credit program. Since there are only four students (Heather Hess, Ben Reeser, Randall Greer and Shana Dent) who are interested, other ways of offering the courses were considered.

The first alternative discussed is to have Tex Buckhaults teach these classes like college classes; each of the two classes meeting every other day with 25 minutes of instruction and 20 minutes of individual student assistance. The second alternative is to use a

calculus program from one of the satellite networks, with Mr. Buckhaults teaching the pre-calculus course for no college credit. The three potential satellite companies would cost (for two students): \$1,040; \$4,250, plus a teacher; or \$5125, plus an aide.

The Board discussed the importance of offering such programs to students who would benefit, but noted that the cost appeared to be prohibitive, in light of the small number of students involved. The recommendation was made to pursue the use of Clarendon College, with a possible minimum enrollment waiver, or having Tex Buckhaults teach the classes, if his heavy schedule would permit.

The District has some old unused IBM computers. Mr. Griffin asked the board to approve their sale by consignment to a computer store. The Board agreed that consignment would be more profitable than trying to sell the computers from the District offices. Neal Odom moved to allow Bench Mark Computers to sell on a consignment basis; Jay Dee Fish seconded. The vote was unanimous.

Memphis Bank and Trust was selected as MISD's depository bank, as it was the only financial institution submitting a proposal that would insure funds over \$1 million by matching dollar-for-dollar. It was noted that the District's accounts occasionally exceed that amount during peak tax

collection periods. The motion to accept was made by Gene Galley; seconded by Bob Glass. Approval was unanimous.

Board president Jake Hess II asked for a report from Mr. Griffin on the recently completed records management project. This project required long hours of thoughtful hard work on the part of the staff. All of the many files retained by the school, both stored and active, were sorted and then either retained and reorganized, stored or destroyed, based on State record retention guidelines.

Mr. Hess also asked for a report on the high school painting project and replacement of the high school lockers, approved in the Board's special meeting held on June 2. Mr. Griffin stated that the painting is complete on the second floor, and in process on the rest of the building. The lockers are to be replaced on September 9 and 10, for a total cost of \$14,000.

The Board then reviewed the check report, financial statement and cafeteria report. Neal Odom requested that the Board be provided a comparison of revenue to budget in real and property taxes. Billie Ward made the motion; Gene Galley seconded; approval was unanimous.

The Board went into executive session to consider employment issues. No action was taken. The meeting adjourned.

School Board

In the District's current effort to bill for back taxes, it was discovered that Jay O'Brien had never been billed for back taxes totalling \$552. Mr. O'Brien was contacted and expressed a willingness to pay the taxes and asked that any penalties be waived, as he had never been billed. Neal Odom moved to accept Mr. O'Brien's offer to pay the total amount and waive the penalties; Billie Ward seconded. The vote was unanimous. During the discussion on this matter it was noted that during the past few months of working with the books over \$10,000 in back taxes was discovered, billed and collected.

Rick Reeser spoke to the Board regarding an attempt to bring college-credit courses in mathematics, calculus and pre-calculus, to the high school. A minimum of seven students would have to enroll in order to use Clarendon College's coop credit program. Since there are only four students (Heather Hess, Ben Reeser, Randall Greer and Shana Dent) who are interested, other ways of offering the courses were considered.

The first alternative discussed is to have Tex Buckhaults teach these classes like college classes; each of the two classes meeting every other day with 25 minutes of instruction and 20 minutes of individual student assistance. The second alternative is to use a

calculus program from one of the satellite networks, with Mr. Buckhaults teaching the pre-calculus course for no college credit. The three potential satellite companies would cost (for two students): \$1,040; \$4,250, plus a teacher; or \$5125, plus an aide.

The Board discussed the importance of offering such programs to students who would benefit, but noted that the cost appeared to be prohibitive, in light of the small number of students involved. The recommendation was made to pursue the use of Clarendon College, with a possible minimum enrollment waiver, or having Tex Buckhaults teach the classes, if his heavy schedule would permit.

The District has some old unused IBM computers. Mr. Griffin asked the board to approve their sale by consignment to a computer store. The Board agreed that consignment would be more profitable than trying to sell the computers from the District offices. Neal Odom moved to allow Bench Mark Computers to sell on a consignment basis; Jay Dee Fish seconded. The vote was unanimous.

Memphis Bank and Trust was selected as MISD's depository bank, as it was the only financial institution submitting a proposal that would insure funds over \$1 million by matching dollar-for-dollar. It was noted that the District's accounts occasionally exceed that amount during peak tax

collection periods. The motion to accept was made by Gene Galley; seconded by Bob Glass. Approval was unanimous.

Board president Jake Hess II asked for a report from Mr. Griffin on the recently completed records management project. This project required long hours of thoughtful hard work on the part of the staff. All of the many files retained by the school, both stored and active, were sorted and then either retained and reorganized, stored or destroyed, based on State record retention guidelines.

Mr. Hess also asked for a report on the high school painting project and replacement of the high school lockers, approved in the Board's special meeting held on June 2. Mr. Griffin stated that the painting is complete on the second floor, and in process on the rest of the building. The lockers are to be replaced on September 9 and 10, for a total cost of \$14,000.

The Board then reviewed the check report, financial statement and cafeteria report. Neal Odom requested that the Board be provided a comparison of revenue to budget in real and property taxes. Billie Ward made the motion; Gene Galley seconded; approval was unanimous.

The Board went into executive session to consider employment issues. No action was taken. The meeting adjourned.


