## Groom Varsity -- Teams Advance To Playoffs

Basketball teams culminated their regular season with three victories Friday night.

Groom Varsity girls won the District Championship and Varsity boys earned Runner-Up status with their wins. Both teams will advance to the Bi-District contest.

The Groom Varsity girls played a very close game. The score volleyed back and forth with Groom taking the early lead but letting Eooker pull ahead by one point at the end of the third quarter. Kay Case led the scoring with 23 points. Sandie Conrad added 12. Mary Hutsell, Jessica Friemel and Sheridan Koetting each added 5. Angie Conrad put up another 2. The Ettes hit 14

The final score was 52-47.

The Ettes will play the Bi-District game in Pampa at 6:30 p.m. on Friday, February 16th. They will play the winner of the Allison-Higgins game.

The Tigers easily outdistanced the Kiowas, 62-47. Staying an average of 11 points ahead, the Varsity boys hit 19 of 30 free throws for 63%.

Justin Ritter led the scoring with 12 points. Nick Ashford and Brad Sustaire each had 11 points. Brandon Crump had 9, Jeremy Chavado 7, Stanley Homer 5, Daniel Treadwell 4, David Munoz 3 and Jimmy Chavado 1.

## Nazareth Is Out Of District, Lakeview Comes In For Basketball District; Fred Lunsford Resigns

The Groom ISD Board of Trustees met in regular session Monday night with all members present. Also attending the meeting were Kirk Couch, Steve Hutsell and Jerry Crowell.

Steve Hutsell led a discussion concerning a report from the Technology Committee. Plans are underway to update several computer labs. A bid will be forthcoming from a company.

An update from UIL reported the change in the 6-man football and basketball district. Nazareth

has been eliminated from the district and replaced with Lakeview for basketball games. The non-conference games will be set at a coaches meeting to be held in late February.

The football district will be: Groom, Briscoe, Ft. Elliott, Follett, Higgins and Miami.

The basketball district will be Hedley, Silverton, Lakeview and Groom.

The board passed a resolution to call for a May election. Gary Davis and Tony Treadwell both have terms that are expiring.

Fred Lunsford, principal of Groom ISD for the last two years submitted a letter of resignation. Lunsford plans to retire at the end of the 1995-96 school year.

Members went into executive session to discuss personnel.

The Board approved the new state salary schedule

Business Manager, Joyce Hutsell presented the financial report which was approved.

The Board adjourned until the next regular meeting in March.

## City Tax Exemption Approved By Council For Residents Over 65

### Public Hearing Held For New Water Well

The Groom City Council met in regular session last week, with all members present. Also attending were, Sybil Harrell; Dwight Brandt, city engineer; Karen Babcock, Panhandle Regional Planning Committee; Boy Scouts Joe Britten, Nick Ashford, and Terry Eatmon.

A public hearing was held concerning the Texas

Community Development Program grant. Babcock and Brandt led the discussion on the different projects that the grant money could be used for if the city decided to submit applications. The city felt that at this time a water well was of the greatest need. They will hold a public hearing to check for public interest.

The city intends to sink a test hole on property within the city limits. If the water is of good quality the council will enter into an agreement to pay the property owner \$1,000. They will then sell water to the person for \$1.29 per thousand gallons until the person has spent \$15,000. After that the water price would return to the regular rate.

All bills were paid on a unanimous vote. The Council was brought up to date on the status of the old clinic building. Kelley Glazner will not be renting the building. The

electricity is on and the heating to each area can be determined. The roof will be fixed sometime by the end of this month.

Boy Scout member Joe Britten updated the Council on his neighborhood watch project. Sheriff Loren Brand will be conducting some meetings. He also had cost of the signs. The Boy Scout fund will have about \$450.00 to contribute to the project.

Bids were opened by Mayor Greg Lamb on the

'67 Ford and '80 Chevrolet pickups. Highest bids went to Monte Craig \$611.00 for the '67 Ford and to Gary Koontz \$550.00 for the '80 Chevrolet.

A \$9,000.00 tax exemption for residents over 65 on the 1996 tax roll was accepted by the Council.

May 4, 1996 was set as election day. Flora Glenn Hammers will serve as election judge and Debbie Anthony as absentee clerk.

The meeting was adjourned.

**Narcotics Task Force, District Attorney Make Drug Arrests In Memphis**

On Tuesday, February 6, agents from the Panhandle Regional Narcotics Trafficking Task Force and The United States Marshal Service, assisted by the Memphis Police Department, began serving arrest warrants on individuals charged under sealed indictments returned by the Hall County Grand Jury on the previous day.

These indictments and arrests were the result of an undercover narcotics investigation that began in June, 1995 by the Task Force at the request of

100th District Attorney Randall Sims.

After being in office approximately six months, the information Sims was receiving indicated drug dealers were going to Hall County to obtain their narcotics to take back to their home town to sell. Having had dealings with the members of the Task Force for over ten years, Sims took that information to them.

"Previously obtained information indicated that in order for an undercover operation to be successful in

that area, complete confidentiality had to be maintained," Sims said. "Therefore, it was agreed that absolutely no local authorities were to be informed of this investigation. That decision was made in June and was made for the safety of the officers involved to insure the success of the efforts being made. Since that time, two separate Hall County Grand Juries have concurred in that decision."

The men who were arrested Tuesday and their respective charges are:

- Roberto Gonzales - Delivery of a Controlled Substance, two counts, one 1st degree felony, one 2nd degree felony; additional charges: Possession of Controlled Substance (cocaine), 2nd degree felony; Possession of Marijuana, 3rd degree felony; possible federal felony (Possession of Firearm), holds mandatory minimum 5-year sentence if convicted;

- Troy Aguilar - Delivery of Controlled Substance (cocaine), 2nd degree felony;

- Terry Ledbetter - Delivery of Controlled

Substance (cocaine), state jail felony; additional - misdemeanor Possession of Marijuana;

- Andre Dupree Steptoe - Hall Co. warrant, Childress Co. warrant, misdemeanor Possession of Marijuana.

Sims said that there is a possible Money Laundering charge on Gonzales since

"we seized \$55,900 dollars."

"I cannot say enough about the efforts of these officers for the citizens of this district," Sims commented. "Their job is very dangerous and even more under the circumstance in which they were required to perform in

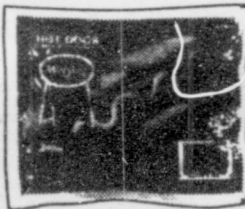

McLean City Council met in regular session last week. All members were present.

Members approved a resolution to hold the regular May 4 election. Mary Dwyer, Sid Lands and Wayne Bybee have terms that will be expiring this year. Bill Graham was appointed, once again, the election judge.

A discussion was held concerning the offering of tax abatement to any developer who expresses an interest in rebuilding the old Dairy Queen property on the west edge of town.

\$86,000 is the projected cost of reconnecting city sewer lines with the building. Stella Lee, city secretary, stated that this might be one way to cover the cost. All three taxing entities, county, school and city, would have to agree. The board plans to take action at the next meeting.

The council has approved pursuing charges against resident, Decie Pool for owning more than 50 cats within the city limits. This is a class C misdemeanor.

The city will purchase an emergency generator for

\$1,000 at the request of the fire chief, Cliff McDonald.

Assistant City Secretary, Toni Bohler was given approval to purchase a computer, monitor and printer for no more than \$3,500 to use for utility billing. Bohler will also attend a computer class at the high school at a cost of \$35.

City Utility superintendent, Fred Smith will purchase a more powerful gas line detector.

The city will also begin solicitation for basic city coverage.

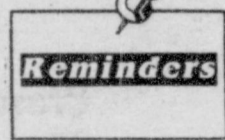
University Interscholastic League has announced the 1996-97 and 1997-98 football and basketball district alignments.

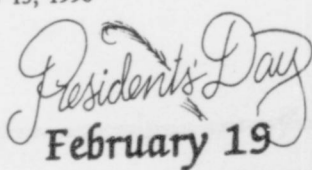


