Business To Build On Truck Stop Site

"I am very excited about the prospect of building this new business near Groom," he said. "I have a lot of plans and am very anxious to get started!"

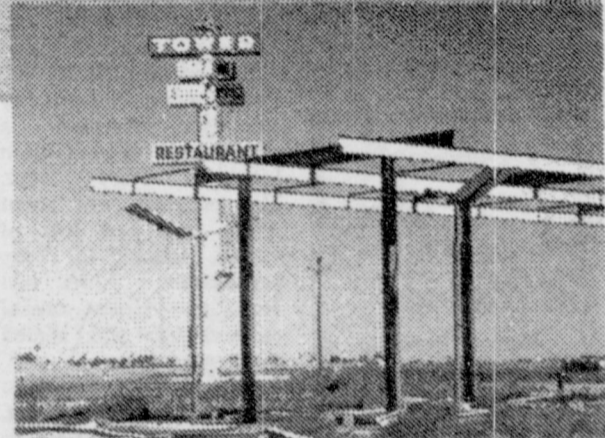
Ralph Britten was operating the truck stop

Neal is planning to begin clean-up of the property by the end of the month. His time frame for construction is uncertain at this point as he works on the many details. He commented that he expected to employ a minimum of 30 people when the operation opens for business.

Dry Land Wheat Harvest Bringing Very Good Yields

Wheat harvest has officially begun. Earl Britten brought in the first load, dry land wheat with a 13.2 moisture content and 60.5 test weight according to Tony Treadwell of Attebury Grain.

Claude has been cutting for about a week. Treadwell reported that they are seeing yields of 30-50 bushels per acre. Groom has been showing 30 or better, but Treadwell stated that it is still early. The Groom

Attebury Grain's first busy day of wheat cutting was on Thursday, June 11.

"The test weight and moisture content are looking better than in years past," stated Treadwell.

No Replacement For Coach Dudley Kelm Expected

The Groom School Board met in their regular monthly meeting and voted to accept the resignation of Dudley Kelm. Superintendent Ingham stated that he would not replace the coaching/teaching position vacated by Kelm, but a search would begin for an elementary teacher to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Mrs. Chisum.

In other business, the council approved a letter of engagement to Mr. Billy Baker, C.P.A., for the 1997-98 audit of Groom ISD.

The Groom ISD

portion of the Carson County Appraisal District budget was approved as printed.

Technology needs were discussed for the 1998-99 school year, but no action was taken.

Bills were approved for payment with budget amendments to allow for payment.

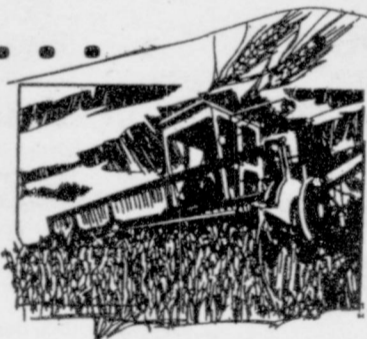

Teachers Pay, Stipend's Can Be Confusing

[Editor's Note: In an effort to create better understanding of the many facets of our public school system, Mr. Ingham has graciously agreed to discuss topics of interest in a periodic column. If there is a particular subject you wish to learn more about, please contact him or The News office.]

Teachers pay can be very confusing, but when one adds the local pay

increments it can be difficult to understand.

The state mandates a MINIMUM, 20 step pay scale, that can and usually does change each year. Each time the legislature meets, we have a new scale. Locally, we offer incentives to try to recruit and maintain the best teachers possible. Each school offers some sort of incentive, but it can vary drastically from

school to school.

In Groom, we pay every teacher that state base pay plus \$700 (per year) for a Bachelors degree and \$900 for a Masters degree. Every full time employee receives \$150 toward health insurance. Beyond that, the school board has established pay incentives for teachers who work extra hours beyond the classroom, i.e., coaches, band director, UIL sponsors, class sponsors, etc. A head coach in varsity football, girls basketball, and boys basketball receives an additional stipend of \$1500 for the additional responsibilities and time. A coach receives the following; state base + \$700 + \$3000 + \$1500 + housing.

For example: a head coach at step 5 on the state scale will earn... Base (\$25,160) + local (\$700) + Coaching (\$300) + Head Coach (\$1500) = Total (\$30,360) per year.

(All coaches have coaching responsibilities in every sport. Many evenings and weekends are invested by the coaches all year long) A teacher at step five would earn....

Base (\$25,160) + Local (\$700) + Approx. extra duty pay (\$350) = \$26,110.

All of the above base payments are board approved and are subject to board review annually.

The school owns four houses. These are currently being offered to the coaches and the principal as part of the incentive "package." The value of the rent is IRS taxable.

Coaches and several other professional employees are under dual contracts...that is...one for teaching and one for other duties. If a coach were to continue teaching, but not coaching, the coaching increments would be deducted from the salary.

Groom ISD has a long history of demanding and receiving excellence in education. That excellence comes at a price. The incentives this local board has established over many years have been an attempt to recruit and keep the best

teachers/coaches possible. Even with our incentives, there have been times that (in spite of all our efforts) we have been unable to get even one applicant for one coaching position or another.

We are very fortunate to have the individuals in place that we have. Their dedication and hard work have helped to produce many students who have advanced beyond district in athletics, music, and academics.

Grandview-Hopkins I.S.D. Schedules Bond Vote In June

Grandview-Hopkins Independent School District voters on Saturday, June 27, 1998, will vote for or against a proposition to allow the District to issue \$2 million in bonds while maintaining the current tax levy rate which would retire the obligation within a seven year period.

A correction to the previous article should read: The Grandview-Hopkins Independent School District has sent approximately \$3.3 million to other school districts and Austin because of the "Robin Hood" wealth equalization plan. If the Grandview-Hopkins School District's bond election was successful, the District would keep approximately \$160,000 annually in the District. The District would be able over a seven year period to keep \$1,120,000 in the District.

Early voting by personal appearance will begin at the Grandview-Hopkins administrative office on Farm to Market Road 293 off Highway 70 on June 10, 1998, and continue Mondays through Fridays from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. through June 23, 1998.

The election will be conducted Saturday, June 27, 1998, from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. at the same location with Cindy Babcock serving as presiding judge and Bernice Maddox as alternate presiding judge.

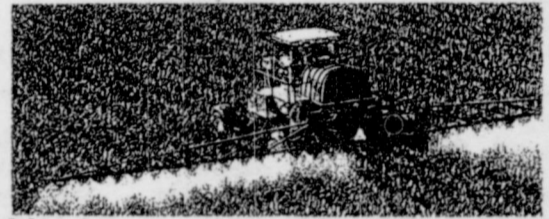
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Keep Grandma Away From The Chicken Pox

There have been several cases of Chicken-pox in the area lately.

Chicken-pox is the most common disease of childhood to cause a rash. Chicken-pox is caused by breathing in the droplets or touching an open lesion of someone who is infected. It is highly contagious.

Chicken-pox is caused by the varicella-zoster virus. The disease is characterized by successive waves of itchy vesicles on a red base which becomes like pimples that burst, crust over and sometimes scar. The crust falls off in 1-2 weeks.

Chicken-pox in children is usually mild and self-limited. Rarely is much

medical therapy needed, except for Benadryl to ease the itching. The child may or may not have slight fever and perhaps feel "yucky" a day or two before the rash flares up.

Chicken-pox in adults can be quite serious and can lead to death by several secondary causes. Adults usually have a headache, general aches, and pains, fever, headache, and lethargy a day or two before the rash. The rash is also much worse in adults.

In adults and immunocompromised people, such as those with HIV, treatment may consist of oral acyclovir, an antiviral agent for 5 to 7 days.

The varicella-zoster

virus never actually leaves the body. It remains "trapped" by the immune system and "hides" out in nerve roots. Older people, who are re-exposed to chicken-pox, may break out in shingles, which

follow a nerve root pattern. (Shingles, if you ever noticed, rarely crosses the mid-line). The major problem with shingles is that the pain associated with it can be severe and debilitating, and can last literally for

years. There is no cure for post-herpetic pain.

For the above reasons, children with chicken-pox must remain isolated. They must not be near adults who never had chicken-pox, and must stay away from older people who can get shingles.

Children are infective until the last crop of lesions crust over. Once the last "pimples" crust over the child can return to school and all other activities.

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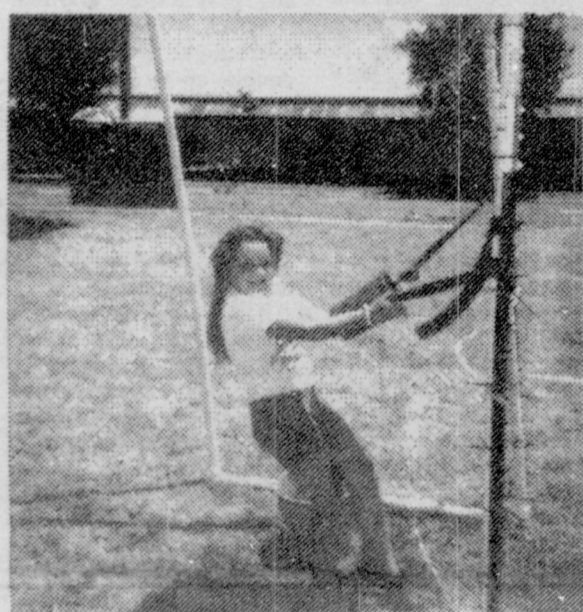

We hurried supper on Saturday evening so we could get a good parking place on the street to watch the Saturday night crowd.



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
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Gouge Eye Archery Jamboree
