## E.D.C. Discusses Graham Proposal, Open Meeting Laws, Sparling Proposal

The Economic Development Corporation met in regular session on July 20 at noon. With a busy agenda the board members enjoyed lunch at the same time. Members present were Martin Graham, Barbara Bode, Marvin Conners, Jane Herndon, and secretary Ginger Haynes. Others present were Fred Smith, Terri Adams and David Haynes.

The minutes were read and approved with a motion from Marvin Conners and second by Barbara Bode.

Fred Smith made a proposal for funding to open a takeout pizza shop. Martin Graham inquired if the area was commercially zoned for business. The item was tabled until Mr. Smith could get price lists and have the location checked out. The board told Mr. Smith that they would hold a special meeting if he could produce all the information needed.

Frank Sparling was not able to attend the meeting, however, Mr. Graham told the board what Mr. Sparling was planning for his business. Items such as a pressure washer for a car wash or possibly a refrigerator unit for his wife to open a business in the front of the building. The item was tabled until the next meeting when Mr.

Sparling could attend.

Terri Adams from the McLean News gave the board new laws that will go into effect on Aug. 30, 1999 regarding open meetings. She also asked for an agenda to be faxed to the news office before each meeting. Mrs. Haynes agreed to do this.

It was announced that the next EDC meeting would be August 19 at noon. The meeting adjourned at 1:03 p.m.

**Year 2000-Related Fraud Advisory**

Concerns about possible Year 2000 computer problems present opportunities for criminals to defraud customers of banks, thrifts, and credit unions. Be assured that the federal regulators have been working closely with your federally insured financial institution to ensure that it has taken steps to prepare for Year 2000. Financial institutions are making excellent progress, and we expect the industry will be prepared for the century date change. This alerts you to some fraudulent schemes involving the Year 2000 and advises you on how to avoid becoming a victim of these schemes:

- Individuals posing as representatives of credit card issuers have called cardholders and asked them to disclose confidential information, such as account numbers. Callers told credit card holders that their cards would not work after January 1, 2000, unless they attached a new magnetic strip to the back of the credit cards. Callers then asked for account numbers and other information so that they could mail the strip to the cardholders. In reality, callers were trying to trick cardholders into disclosing personal information like their account number, social security number, address, and other information that would allow them access to the card holder's account.
- Individuals posing as financial institution employees, auditors, or others have called customers and asked them to transfer money from existing accounts to "special Year 2000 safe accounts" while the institution corrects Year 2000 problems. Callers then ask for account numbers and authorization to transfer the money to one of these "special" accounts. In reality, the callers were attempting to gain enough information to steal the customer's money.

**Please note that no bank, thrift, credit union, or credit card issuer will call you to request your account numbers, personal identification numbers (PIN), or other account information for Year 2000-related purposes. They already have this information.**

To help protect yourself from becoming a victim of fraud, the regulators recommend that you:

- Never give out account information, credit card or social security numbers, or other personal information to someone you do not know, unless you initiate the contact. Remember that no financial institution will call you to ask for personal account information.
- Contact your financial institution to report any suspicious request for confidential account information. Don't hesitate to make these calls. If you're being approached, chances are others in your community or around the country are also being targeted.
- Be sure you receive and review your account statements on a timely basis. Fraud can involve attempts to change your address so your account statements are mailed to others.
- Check the accuracy of account statements when you receive them. Make sure that you have authorized all the charges made to your account and report any discrepancies.
- Contact your financial institution if you have any question about its Year 2000 readiness.

I. The unity of the New Testament is an important characteristic.

- C. The church practiced it, Acts 4:32; Joh 1:7; Phil. 1:27

II. All believers were one (same) in Christ

- A. They believed the same gospel, Mr. 16:15, 16; Rom. 1:16; Gal. 1:6ff
- B. They obeyed the same gospel, Acts 2:38-41; Rom. 6:3-18
- C. They were added to the same church, Acts 2:47; 1 Cor. 12:13
- D. They kept the same ordinances, 1 Cor. 11:2; Matt 28:20; Acts 2:42; 2 John 9
- F. They wore the same name, Acts 11:26; Pet. 4:14-16
- G. They were of the same mind, Acts 4:32; 1 Cor. 1:10; Phil. 1:27; 2:2-8
- H. They spoke the same thing, 1 Cor. 1:10; Gal. 1:6-9
- I. They walked by the same rule, Gal. 6:16; Phil. 3:16
- J. They had the same love for one another, Phil. 2:2

**Conclusion:** The Bible-prescribed method of unity is based upon the will of God for His people. Unity without God's standards is merely acceptance of error without question. Unity without sound Bible doctrine is apostasy. True unity springs from harmony with God's word.

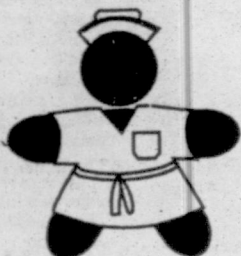



## Sheriff Discusses Dept. Changes With Court

The Carson County Commissioners Court met on July 26, 1999 with the following members and officers present: Judge Lewis Powers, Commissioners Mike Britten, Kenneth Ware, Jerry Strawn and Kevin Howell.

Votes were unanimous

unless otherwise stated.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved and all claims were scheduled to be paid.

The court voted not to increase the road and bridge fees imposed on registration charges by the county. The fee will

remain at \$5.00.

Carson County Clerk Sonya Millican's petition to the court to move a \$442.50 line item from office repairs to office supplies was approved. The clerk's budget was also changed to pay computer contracts from records preservation money collected by that office. The \$500 monthly charge from the records management account was approved, instead of taking it from general revenue funds.

Carson County Judge Lewis Powers presented the court with a fire service agreement from the City of Fritch. It was decided unanimously to pay the entity \$14,574 for the past six quarters and pay the new annual contract of \$9,716. The county had not been billed for the previous quarters due to the transition period of the Fritch City Council.

Carson County Sheriff Gary Robertson briefed the court on recent personnel changes, asked to amend the department's

budget and change the procedure of allowing overtime and compensation time. The sheriff's office will be filling two dispatcher positions and a jail administrator. Deputy Jason Gipson resigned effective July 3, 1999. Scott Daily was hired on July 15, 1999 as field deputy. The appointment of Robertson as sheriff created the vacancy of

jail administrator. Sheriff Robertson asked the commissioners to amend the budget by \$200 for computer upgrades. The sheriff also asked the court to eliminate the overtime compensation payment for all department personnel. He proposed to raise the current pay scale for the department and base it on the calculation of compensation time on a 28-day cycle and to allow for the annual payout of unused accumulated compensation time at the end of the fiscal year. The

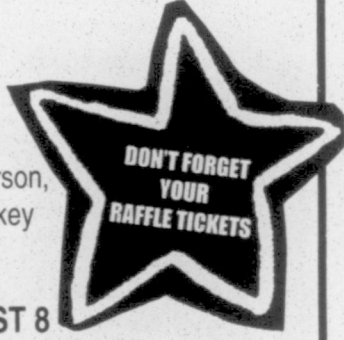
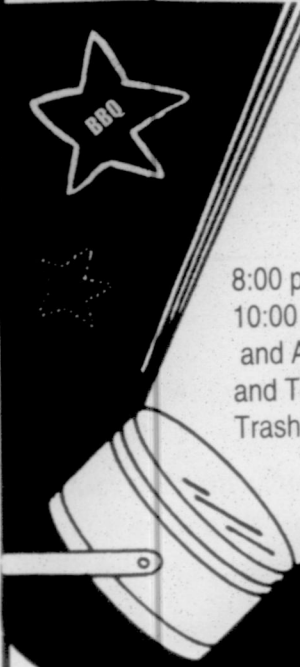

employee pay package also would include incentives for certification levels and longevity. The motion was approved unanimously to allow the new structure and these proposals that would reduce the payout of overtime an estimated \$7,000.

Judge Powers discussed salaries with the court to enable the departments to set their proposed plans for the upcoming budget

hearings. Commissioner Howell petitioned the court for road hand Dexter Cochran to be moved from a 24-A to a 24-D level salary and Ed Story from 23-B to a 24-D level. Commissioner Strawn asked the court to move Bud Stafford from a 24-A to a 24-D level and Danny Tarpley from a 22-B to a 23-B level. The court approved these increases unanimously.

The court discussed a proposed 5% pay raise across the board for the county. Commissioner

Strawn made the motion to allow a 3% raise to be included in the budget. Commissioner

Britten seconded the motion. The motion carried with Howell voting against the court.

The 3% raise would be added to the salaries of the road hands that were previously raised. There would be a 9% increase for Story, 6% increase for Cochran and Stafford and 7% increase for

Tarpley.

The court adjourned until August 9, 1999.
