
Clifford's wife, Linda, has been a firefighter for 16 years with the McLean Fire Department. She also works at Cantrell's.



Also, trucks hauling hazardous materials down I-40 pose a challenge in knowing how to put the fire out safely."

Linda summed it up perfectly when she said that the firefighting profession is being passed through the generations.


There will be an






