Calvert, Comptroller of Public Accounts, will be at the Valley Motel December 29 through December 31, 1971, from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. daily, for the purpose of renewing Special Farm User permits, and issuing 1972 decals for PLG operated licensed vehicles. The current decals expire on December 31, 1971.

Renewel notices have been mailed to those who currently hold a 1971 decal, and these attack. notices should be taken to the \$60.00 each, and must be placed 1960 to 4,525 persons in 1970.

A location should be selected from which animals can be watched without disturbing them, looking for restlessness, scratching, rubbing, licking, excessive tail switching and rough hair coat. Texas statutes require that all animals in an infested lot be dipped twice in an approved manner and solution at ten to fourteen day intervals. All animals in exposed lots must be dipped once. All dippings must be accomplished under the supervision of a representative





Austin, Texas -- Texas democrats were scheduled to get their first look last week at a draft of proposed new party rules which are stirring some friction among state party leaders.

State Democratic Executive Committee Chairman Roy Orr of DeSoto said the SDEC rules sub-committee will hold a public hearing on the proposals here January 12 at 10 a.m. Findings will then go to the full SDEC.

Some top-ranking party officers, including National Committee woman Mrs. Carrin Patman of Ganado, fear Orr has little enthusiasm for "reform" procedures recommended in the rules draft. Orr insists he has an open mind and wants a broadbased study. Last month, headded 12 new members to the original 10-member rules- drafting panel.

Among provisions in the new rules draft are these:

*Those who accept party office including positions as convention delegates must pledge to support all party nominees or face removal.

*Eighteen-year olds can participate in Democratic conventions.

Repeatedly, courts have held crop Mrs. Tommy Durham and dusters responsible for failing to daughter from Lubbock spent take reasonable precautions in their work. One pilot underestimated the carrying power of his spray equipment. Another pilot failed to give fair warning to a neighboring landowner. A third pilot disregarded the special characteristics of the chemical he was using. In each case, a court found enough evidence of negligence to impose legal liability on the company. In fact, some courts have imposed liability even if the pilot took all the usual safety precautions before spraying. They say that, simply by using such dangerous stuff, the company automatically takes full responsibility for the consequences. Occasionally the plane itself, rather than the chemical, will cause harm. In one case, the sudden gunning of a crop duster's motor threw a flock of turkeys into panic. They hurled them-selves against a fence, with many of them perishing. Was this also the company's fault? A court decided that it was indeed. The judge said the timidity of turkeys was so well known that the pilot should have known what to expect.


