





Comforts Filled With the Former Ma terial Are Much Lighter Than

For the last year or two the shops have shown an article of bedding which, though in use in many farm homes, had not been familiar on the counters. This is the wool-filled comfort, that is destined to take the place of the cotton-wadded comforters. Now however, as well as the completed

WOOL IN PLACE OF COTTON

Those Generally in Use.

comforts, there are to be had in many shops sheets of carded wool with which to make up these comforts at home, covering them with silk, satin, or patchwork.

The sheet wadding comes in three weights, all having the same dimensions-72 by 84 inches. The lightest contains one pound of wool. It is designed as filling for a crib quilt and to be folded over into half size. The next heavier weighs two pounds, while the heaviest weighs three pounds. Ready made wool comforts

can be bought at various prices, from about \$4 according to the thickness of the wool and the quality of the covering.

Many housekeepers now prefer wool-filled comforts to those filled with down, since the wool-filled comforts never "shed" as down puffs will after usage. They are especially desirable for children and for elderly persons, since they are warm but not heavy. A three-pound wool comfort weighs about half as much as a full sized woollen blanket.

Sateen makes an excellent covering for wool comforts. A flowered center, bordered with a plain color, is especially attractive. It can be knotted with silk or quilted in any fancied

pattern.

Method That Will Do Away With a

Great Deal of the Trouble That Sometimes Bothers Cooks.

Heavy whipped cream, if allowed to stand, is apt to become watery and thin at the bottom of the bowl, the sugar having the tendency to separate in the form of a weak sirup. This is especially true if the cream was not It is cruel to force nauseating, very heavy before being whipped. To remedy this, to every pint of whipped cream soak a scant tablespoonful of granulated gelatin in enough cold water to barely cover it, until it is soft. Then add a small half teacupful of boiling water and stir until the gelatin is completely dissolved, after which

add three-quarters of a cup of sugar and whatever flavoring you intend to for the cream. Turn this into a cold bowl and beat with an eggbeater until it is white like marshmallows and begins to become firm, and just as soon as it has reached this point, but before it has commenced to grow

stringy, beat it by spoonfuls into the cream, which has already been beaten stiff.

BAINFALL EFFECTS ON YIELD

There Are Many Practical Methods of Holding Spring Rains Which Are / Usually Abundant.

The amount of rainfall during July and Augus practically determines the size of the corn and root crops. If the rainfall is below normal or below the requirements of these crops, the yield is cut short, and is in some instances a failure. It is also a wellknown fact that even in years of insufficient rainfall, some farmers grow taste good, but work badly; ferment crops above the average.

As farmers, we cannot change the amount of rainfall by any methods that are practicable. But there are practical methods of holding the spring rains which are usually abunlant. Of these methods deep plowing. thorough harrowing and rolling before planting is by far the best and most practical. If cultivation is giv-

en at the right time and is thorough. the ground will be so deep, finely pulverized, not only on the surface, but

everal inches below the surface, that t will be capable of holding a large amount of water. The fine top soil will act as a mulch to prevent evaporation in hot weather. Farmers are coming to see the importance of having a thick grass and clover sod. which may be plowed in the fall or in the early spring, for their corn and potatoes.

The three-horse plow, the steel disk and the spring harrow will make a deep, mellow bed form the roots to him own a plano. spread out and run deep for their plant food and moisture needed to make the grain and the roots.

A rich, rotted sod is equal to a heavy dressing of rich rotted manure; this is the best method to follow, es pecially for corn and potatoes.

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

> Especially on fields which have grown alfalfa successfully seeding with a nurse crop gives good results. Fall plow if the land is not too hilly and washing is apt to occur. If spring plowed the soil should be rolled after seeding so as to make a compact seed bed, which is very essential for the alfalfa. A light harrowing after rolling is necessary to form a loose mulch which prevents rapid drying and evap oration.

A light seeding of not over one bushel of barley or oats per acre is highly important. Heavy seedings of the nurse crop are very dangerous and usually crowd the alfalfa so as to stunt its development and a poor stand results. If barley is used as a nurse crop it may be cut for grain. Oats ripen later and must be cut for hay so as not to check the growth of the alfalfa.



New York Building Has World's Strongest Rooms

These plates, which form the shell of the vaults, are five inches thick, except at the openings for the doors, where the armor is 18 inches thick. No bolts or rivets were used in the construction of these strong rooms, the plates interlocking into each other by means of wedge ends and channels. This means that the completed structure is, to ly see a lot of fine, downy hair-new all intents and purposes, one solid piece of metal, and any force applied to the joints has only the effect of tightening the grip of the wedges.

As a further precaution, a firewall af concrete, 12 feet thick, was laid around the vaults, except, of course, at the doors. Then, underneath, comes the foundation, which consists of ten feet of alternate layers of concrete and steel rails, laid flange to flange, built up from the solid rock.

Access to these strong rooms is gained through two round doors. They weigh 25 tons apiece, and are the largest and heaviest round doors ever made. Twenty tons of this weight are in one solid mass of material, seven and one-half feet in diameter, while the remaining five tons are accounted for in the bolt work and mechanism operating the lock. There are 24 round bolts in each door, weighing 100 pounds. An electric motor hung on the inside of the door gives the power to the gear.




