The cheapest and surest way to increase the yield of corn is to improve the quality of the seed.

Each spring finds a scarcity of seedso get enough for two years says the department, which insists that the shortage need not exist, and is a much more seri ous source of crop loss than is generally realized. The loss is due to carelessness, neglect, or delay, but most of all to what the department characterizes as among the greatest of draw backs to successful farmingprocrastination. The best seed is available in abundance at ripening time, when it should be selected from stalks standing where they grew because only then can seed be gathered with certainty from good yieldirg plants.



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

SWINE ON PASTURE

Some Interesting and Valuable Results Obtained at Minnesota' Experiment Station.

Feeding grain to swine on pasture has given some very interesting and valuable results at the Minnesota agricultural experiment station, as reported by R. C. Ashby, in charge of the swine work.

Mr. Ashby fed various rations to different lots of pigs, with some variation in cost, with considerable differences in the results obtained.

The largest profit was made by hogs self-fed on shelled corn and tankage, on rape pasture, at a feed cost of \$5.64 for 100 pounds of gain. The profit was \$217.79 per acre of pasture.

The different groups fed were as follows:

1. Three per cent of live weight in shelled corn, with alfalfa pasture. 2. Four per cent of live weight in shelled corn with alfalfa pasture.

3. Shelled corn self-fed, with alfalfa pasture. 4. Four per cent of live weight in shelled corn with two pounds of but-

termilk per pig daily, and alfalfa pas-5. Four per cent of shelled corn

with very light tankage ration and alfalfa pasture. 6. Three per cent of ground barley

with rape pasture. 7. Three per cent of shelled corn

with rape pasture.

8. Four per cent of shelled corn with rape pasture. 9. Shelled corn, self-fed, with rape

10. Shelled corn, seil-fed, tankage and rape pasture.

duction for every 56 pounds of grain fed in these various rations was as follows: 1, 15.46; 2, 15.16; 3, 14.25; 4, 15.92; 5, 15.62; 6, 17.44; 7, 16.49; 8, 17.35; 9, 16.34; 10, 16.83.

The prices used in counting up hese results were: Shelled corn, 85

cents a bushel; ground barley, 85 cents a bushel; tankage, \$55 a ton; buttermilk, 2 cents a gallon; hogs 10 cents a pound. The profit shown by rations 7 and 9 was reduced owing to the fact that one pig in each lot proved unthrifty and had to be removed.

It should be understood that the profits here are simply the gross profits over and above the cost of feeding. the net profit to be arrived at by deducting the cost of labor with interest and other overhead charges.

In any event, the showing is exceptionally good. Work of this kind should go far to offset sensational reports about certain hog-feeding work not connected in any way with the experiment station, except in the misinformation of those circulating the reports. The profits are much above the average made by the farmer, though they are not in excess of records made by other experiment sta-

Vigilance and Ample Stock of Poisons Will Beat Off Enemies-Make Daily Survey.

Be on the job against insect pests this season. Make your food contribution to the human family, not the insect family. Farmers who provide themselves with insect poisons and then keep a vigil for the first outbreaks of crop enemies will bring through the largest yields. Failure to detect an outbreak at its beginning and delay in getting combative material may be fatal to the crop attacked. is the warning of entomologists in the United States department of agricul-

That a great part of the annual loss to grain crops due to insect injuries can be avoided by vigilance and vigorous action on the part of growers is not sufficiently realized, the entomologists say. Frequently insect outbreaks originate within a limited area, and when this is the case it is often quite possible to stamp them out before any great damage has been don . If the outbreak is general, ther community action is essential to prevent the infestation from becoming widespread.


Amount of Sugar Can Be Determined by the Alcohol Test-Mistakes to Be Avoided by the Housewife.

Fruit for Jelly Making .- The juice from certain fruits, such as grape. apple, erabapple, orange, kumquat and currant, is better suited for making a natural fruit jelly than juices from other fruits. The juices from these fruits contain the properties necessary for jelly making. The best fruits for jelly making contain pectin and acid. Pectin, the fundamental jelly-making substance, does not exist in some fruits out the addition of pectin from some other source. The peach, strawberry and cherry are examples of fruits each of these fruits, a jelly with the sive water. color and flavor of the fruit selected can be made.

proportion is three-fourths cupful of sugar to one cupful of juice. If the pectin is thin and much separated, onehalf cupful of sugar allowed for each cupful of juice will be sufficient.

Quantity of Juice to Cook .- The quantity of juice to be cooked at one time will depend upon the size of the vessel and the methods of heating available. The capacity of the vessel used should be four times as great as the volume of juice to be cooked. If the attempt is made to cook a large quantity of juice at one time over a slow flame, there will be a loss of color and a decrease in the yield, partly due

to the destruction of the pectin. When to Add Sugar .- When the proportion of sugar to juice has been determined, measure the fruit juice and place over the fire to cook. When the juice begins to boil, add the sugar immediately and stir until the sugar is dissolved. By adding the sugar when the juice begins to boil, more time is over the jelly,

given for the inversion of the sugar by the acids of the fruit and there is less langer of crystallization.

Cooking the Jelly .- After the sugar has dissolved, the cooking should be as rapid as possible. Finished jelly can be obtained more quickly by rapid cooking. Long cooking will tend to darken the product and destroy the pectin, which will cause the finished IS PRIME ELEMENT Jelly to be less firm.

Since no definite temperature can be given for the finished jelly, the most convenient means of determining when it is finished is to test it with a spoon or paddle. Dip a spoon or wooden paddle in the boiling mass. Remove and cool by moving it back and forth for a few seconds and then allow the jelly to drop from it. As long as there s sirup present it will run or drop from the spoon. When the jellying point is reached, it will break from the the mold. Filling Glasses.-After skiraming the elly, pour at once into hot sterilized glasses and set aside to cool.

Cooling and Sealing .- Cool as rapidly as possible, avoiding dust which will give contamination with mold. When the felly is cold cover it with melted paraffin. By running a pointed stick around the edge of the glass while the paraffin is still hot, a better seal can be obtained.

JELLIES FROM PECTIN.

Pectin, the essential jelly-making substance, may be extracted from fruits rich in it, and this concentrated deficient in pectin, for the making of out dipping. excellent fellies.

Apple Pectin.-One pound apple pulp (or skins and cores), juice of one lemon, four pounds water. Boil for half to three-quarters hour, press the juice through a cloth bag, then allow this juice to drain without pressure through a heavy flannel or haircloth jelly bag. This juice when cold should be tested with alcohol to determine the proportion of sugar to add to a volume of juice. Pectin can be bottled, processed for 15 minutes in a water bath at boiling, and kept until needed for jelly making.

Orange Pectin .- Cut or scrape the vellow rind from the peel of the orange, the white portion remaining being passed through the food chopper oven to brown, and weighed. For each pound of this through a flannel bag. If not desired may be used if desired. for immediate use, bottle and process as for apple pectin.

Jelly .- One pint concentrated orange (or apple) pectin juice, one pound sugar, two drops oil of peppermint, two drops green vegetable coloring. HELPFUL SUGGESTIONS.

Desserts for children should be planned with care and may be both delictous and appetizing, as



as easy of digestion. Figs and prunes are both highly nutritious and good for children, but they tire of them, served in two or three ways.

As candy is so liked by the little people, the following suggestion may be used to satisfy that longing without feeling that the child is being injured. Take the stones from soaked prunes and add an equal quantity of figs, put them through the meat chopper, and use the water in which the prunes were soaked to boil with sugar, until a heavy sirup that will make a soft ball in water, is formed. remove from the heat and stir until creamy, add the chopped fruit, make into small balls, roll in powdered sugar, and set away to harden.

Home-Made Soda Water.-Take two pounds of sugar, two ounces of tartaric acid, three pints of water and a half-ounce of the essenge of wintergreen, the whites of two eggs. Mix the sugar and tartaric acid together with the water, let it boil slowly for two minutes, then set aside to cool. When cool, stir in the wintergreen essence and the beaten whites of the eggs. Stir all together, put into jars and keep in the ice chest. When required for use put two tablespoonfuls of the sirup in a glass, fill with cold water, and stir in a quarter of a teaspoonful of soda.

Buttermilk Pop .- Heat a quart of buttermilk in a double boiler, when boiling stir in two tablespoonfuls of flour that has been rubbed smooth in a little cold milk. Stir and cook until the flour is thoroughly cooked and serve hot.

Frozen beef tea is a novelty which will appeal to the invalid during the hot weather. To prepare the beef juice take a thick piece of steak and broil it quickly in a hot pan, then score it and put it into a vegetable press to extract all the juice. This juice will, with a pinch of salt, be of much finer flavor than that which is cooked a longer time. Serve either hot or cold.

Turkish Cream Candy .- Put one and a half cupfuls of sweet cream and three and three-fourths cupfuls of sugar. Cook, stirring often until a very soft ball is formed in cold water or the candy thermometer registers 238. Let cool a little then turn out upon a marble slab, add fruit and nuts and work with a paddle until it shows signs of turning to a cream. 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
