The Commercial Club Organized Last Friday Livest Thing in Town

Those who have been wishing a commercial club would be organized and something in the way of a concerted effort done toward the improvement of our town and building up the country, ought to be pleased with the start that was made on Friday evening of last week. Those who have lived here for a long time and have seen several efforts to have a commercial club fail tell us that never before has one started off with more enthusiasm or with better promise of success.

At the appointed time, W. C. Cheney called the house to order with a goodly number present, and D. N. Massay was elected chairman. After some discussion which showed everybody to be heartily in favor of it, a motion to go into permanent organization carried, and the following officers were elected:

A committee on resolutions was appointed, consisting of W. A. Cain, C. L. Cooke and W. L. Haynes.

The subscribers to the capital stock of the Farmers Cash Supply Co. met last Saturday and elected the following officers and directors: R. S. Jordan, president; J. S. Howard, vice president; Wayland Floyd, secretary; C. P. Harbison, treasurer; S. A. Cousins; J. B. Reneau; John Glass. The company will be capitalized for \$15,000.

McLean Joins Pampa in Sending Exhibit to State Fair at Dallas

A. H. Doucette, president of the Pampa Commercial Club, who was in town Saturday, extended an invitation to the newly organized McLean club to join Pampa in sending an exhibit to the Dallas Fair. Being in favor of doing so, W. A. Cain, president, called a meeting of the Commercial Club for Saturday night to decide upon the Pampa proposal.

Twenty or twenty-five members assembled at T. J. Coffey's place at seven o'clock, and after talking over the possibilities of collecting material for a credible exhibit in so short a time, it was decided to try.

D. N. Massay was appointed chairman of a committee to collect products for exhibition, and he chose W. H. Peters, W. T. Wilson, D. M. Graham, T. J. Coffey, C. S. Rice and W. L. Haynes as committeemen. Those who saw the fine assortment of various kinds of farm products they assembled were surprised, and we are expecting the Gray county exhibit to come close to taking first prize at the fair, and will be surprised if McLean's part of the exhibit doesn't prove to be the best.

The matter of having some advertising matter printed for distribution among visitors to the Gray county booth was taken up, and the club voted to have 5000 small folders printed. As no work had been done toward anything of this sort, and as nobody could spare the time to write all of it, seven different men were appointed to write on different subjects, as follows: Location, S. M. Castleberry; churches, Rev. A. F. Agee; schools, W. A. Cain; farming, F. P. Wilson; livestock, D. M. Graham; freight shipments, T. J. Coffey; business enterprises, M. L. Moody. When he tried to get a commercial club organized last year and it turned out to be such a fizzle, the News man felt like he had made an ass of himself, which he may have done. But since one has been organized this year, with much the same purposes as he advocated, he begins to feel better. Another thing that makes him cheerful is that leaders in the new organization wanted to have printed on the folders sent to the Dallas fair a plate of the McLean trade territory map Newsman drew for folks to laugh at last year. For several months this editor has not had the courage to boost, and has wished he could dispose of the Sandhill Jazz and move to a town where there is something doing, but today he's beginning to be glad he is here, and if the commercial club continues to show the pep it starts off with he will reach the point that he would rather publish a newspaper in McLean than do anything else anywhere in the wide world. Hot dog! Get a home in the McLean country, the garden spot of the Panhandle!

There seems to be a growing dissatisfaction with the kind of paper we are printing here in McLean, and it has reached the point where two or three have spoken right out in meetin'. The publisher of the Sandhill Jazz has been dissatisfied with it for a long time, and now that the people are getting tired of a little two by four sheet, perhaps they can yet be persuaded to "come across" with a patronage that will enable us to make The News a real newspaper that will print all the news of McLean and surrounding country. That is what we want to make it, and what we will make it when the patronage justifies. People realize that a commercial

club can't be ran on wind, and are "kicking in" admirably. When they come to realize that a first-class newspaper can't be run on wind either, and patronize The News as any progressive community ought to patronize the home paper, then they will have the kind of newspaper a town like McLean ought to have, if the present owner doesn't go bankrupt in the meantime.

I will pay a twenty-five dollar reward for the arrest and conviction of any party guilty of tying down any telephone wire or in any other manner tampering with the lines. The state law on the subject is as follows:
Penal code, Art. 284: If any person shall intentionally break, cut, pull or tear down, misplace, or in any other manner injure any telegraph or telephone wire, post, machinery or other necessary appurtenance to any telegraph or telephone line, or in any way willfully obstruct or interfere with the transmission of any messages along such telegraph or telephone line, he shall be punished by confinement in the penitentiary not less than two nor more than five years, or by fine not less than one hundred nor more than two thousand dollars.

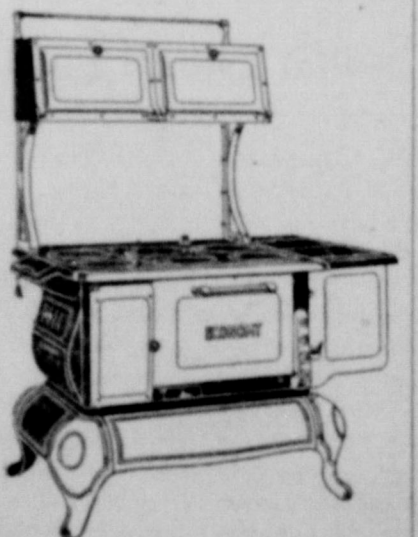
