## BABY DROWNED IN TUB OF WATER SUNDAY MORNING

Little Andrew Charles, eight months old baby of Mr. and Mrs. Claud Stokes of four miles northwest of town, was drowned in a tub of water early Sunday morning.

A tub almost full of water had been left in one of the bedrooms, and while the mother was cooking breakfast and Mr. Stokes was at the barn feeding the stock, the little one, who was just learning to walk, made his way to the tub, fell into the water and was drowned. He was found within a few minutes, but all efforts to revive him were without success.

The funeral was held in the Nazarene church at 10:30 o'clock Monday morning. S. R. Jones officiating. Interment in Hill crest cemetery immediately afterward.

## 4 of 5 North Side Candidates Elected in Primary Saturday

The two opposing sections of the county each polled heavy majorities for their respective candidates, and the Pampa ticket won by reason of the greater number of voters residing in the north side.

The votes polled for the various candidates are as follows:

For county judge—Ayers 729, Wolfe 495.

For county and district clerk—Thompson 653, Patterson 595.

For sheriff and tax collector—Graves 705, Copeland 552.

For tax assessor—Graham 637, Doucette 619.

Miss Miriam Wilson, county treasurer, and Chas. Cook, county attorney, were both re-elected, as they had no opponents.

I will pay a twenty-five dollar reward for the arrest and conviction of any party guilty of tying down any telephone wire or in any other manner tampering with the lines. The state law on the subject is as follows:

Penal code, Art. 784: If any person shall intentionally break, cut, pull or tear down, misplace, or in any other manner injure any telegraph or telephone wire, post, machinery or other necessary appurtenance to any telegraph or telephone line, or in any way willfully obstruct or interfere with the transmission of any messages along such telegraph or telephone line, he shall be punished by confinement in the penitentiary not less than two nor more than five years, or by fine not less than one hundred nor more than two thousand dollars.
