

WHAT CAN BE ACCOMPLISHED

Tuesday the News man and wife had the pleasure of taking dinner at the hospitable home of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Chambers on the east edge of town. After enjoying the excellent repast prepared by Mrs. Chambers we took a stroll over the orchard and vinyard, and the sights that met our gaze were indeed wonderful. We had no idea that such potent results in fruit culture could possibly obtain from

Chambers, two years ago, gath ered sixty gallons of berries off two rows of this plot and the rows are not over fifty steps in length. It is his opinion the present crop will exceed that output. While the grape vines are small and a little backward, they are loaded with blooms and promise a good yield.

The vinyard is separated from the orchard by a tripple row of locust trees, which serve as a wind break. The orchard covers about seven acres and is set mostly to peaches and apples, but also contains fruits of almost every variety. The peach trees are already loaded until the work. We hope soon to have a and the fruit is still small. In case there is no hail to thin the crop it will be necessary to go over it and thin it by hand in order that what is left may have room to mature. The apple trees are too young yet to bear but the cherry trees present the fruit and will yield enormously.

The orchard is practically hid den from view until you get right into it and the sight that awaits the stranger who penetrates the dense foliage of the locust hedge is calculated to take away his breath. Chambers does not farm much but has put in lots of time in his orchard and vinyard and the results of his labors are most flattering, and prove beyond a doubt the fact that fruit is one of the most lucrative crops that can be planted this section.
