THE WAR TODAY: Britain's Major Problem Is In India

British Premier Churchill's renewed offer of dominion status for India after the war may prove to be a less persuasive gesture than will be demanded of him in this life or death crisis when the great Indian empire is in deadly peril of invasion by the successful Japanese.

The proposal of self-government (after the war) was made to the nationalists nearly two years ago—and failed to click. The followers of Mahatma Gandhi have demanded their independence on the barrel head, and not at some indefinite future date.

Of course, Mr. Churchill's offer is accompanied by proposals which have not yet been made public. Still, the question likely will be raised as to whether he couldn't make the road easier, at a time when every hour wasted is a prop pulled from under the security of the already manhandled British empire, if he said:

"We will grant dominion status forthwith, and all necessary formalities will be carried out. However, in view of the difficulty of setting up a new government, we ask you to agree that this be deferred to the end of the war.

Under the circumstances it wouldn't be surprising to see the imbroglío finally take such a turn. Churchill is sending his new trouble-shooter, the leftist Sir Stafford Cripps, to India to try to solve the difficulty.

It must be emphasized that Churchill is dealing with one of the greatest problems England ever faced, even today it is made more difficult by the reiteration

vide the sinews of war for the British.

There's another danger spot up on the northwest frontier in the region of the famous Khyber Pass which leads through the towering stone mountains into Afghanistan.

German agents have been working on these wild men and providing them with arms, with the idea of inspiring an attack against the British. Then the inscrutable mind of Afghanistan itself is never safe to gamble on.

But of all the threats against India, the political difference between England and the nationalists is by far the most serious. It can do untold damage unless it is settled immediately, for the Japs are going to make hay while the Rising Sun shines.

Locker Plant Organization To Be Erased

Liquidation of the Howard County Food cooperative is scheduled at a meeting of the board of directors at 8 p. m. next Wednesday.

Directors have unofficially agreed to liquidate the organization after failing in several attempts to secure someone to promote sale of stock. The cooperative had planned to build a frozen food locker plant here.

Through sale of stock, the cooperative had collected \$1,300 from 43 members, including \$2 who paid in full, one who paid \$15 and the balance paying \$5 each.

Upon liquidation, each member will be refunded the amount he has paid in, less \$1.72 to cover this expense.

Man Not Guilty For Failure To Show Draft Card

HOUSTON, March 12 (AP)—Federal Judge T. M. Kennerly yesterday directed acquittal of a man charged with failure to produce a selective registration card.

Attorneys interpreted the ruling to mean that officers have no authority to stop a man on a public street and demand to see his card.

In directing a verdict for Ray Harbuck, 30, Judge Kennerly said "all the evidence against him consists of statements made to officers after an illegal arrest in that a police officer stopped him on a public street and demanded that he identify himself."

## Six Survivors Reach Land

NEW LONDON, Conn., March 12 (AP)—Six crewmen from the torpedoed Brazilian vessel Cayru, suffering greatly from exposure and the body of a passenger were landed here today by the Navy. The six were the only survivors of 21 men who set out in the ship's number 4 lifeboat after the Cayru was sunk off Ambrose Light Sunday evening.

Two were able to stand with the aid of sailors; the others were carried ashore on stretchers, and all were taken immediately to a hospital.

The survivors brought here were: Miral DeSouza, 20, second mate; Dionisio Dinis Monteiro, 25, seaman; Joao Evangelista DeAraujo, 55, fireman; Raymundo Monato DasNeves, 42, third engineer; Manuel Viera DosSantos, 36, cook; Valdomiro Ferreira DosSantos, 38, seaman.

The passenger was unidentified.

## Mississippi Bans All Sunday Movies

JACKSON, Miss., March 12 (AP)—There shall be no Sunday movies in Mississippi, says the state legislature.

Minister-representatives begged their colleagues not to "ask the devil to come in" as they led opposition to the measure which would have permitted Sunday operation of shows within 30 miles of Army posts for duration of the war.

## Drive Through Norway May Be Undertaken

NEW YORK, March 12 (AP)—Cumulative military and political evidence indicates the imminence of highly important operations centering about the area between the desolate North Cape at the top of Norway and the Crual 1,000-foot granite cliffs of the Russian Murmansk coast.

Major air and naval operations already are under way, involving German capital ships, British torpedo planes undoubtedly operating from an aircraft carrier, other British warships and United States convoys.

These cannot be explained entirely by the routine movement of American and British supplies to Archangel. More than one competent analyst is considering whether the western allied powers will pound a wedge of well-equipped power into the top of Europe when the midnight sun shines this coming summer.

Free Europe, a review of international affairs published in London, said today that an Allied spring offensive in the west should have a good chance of success, for the forces now concentrated in the British Isles presumably are stronger than those the Germans have disposed from Kirkenes, Norway, to Hendaye, France.

This commentary declared that both military and political reasons commended Norway as a spot where the allies could strike with overwhelming forces. It added that control of upper Scandinavia would give the United Nations a convenient link with Russia through Finland and would put them in position to strike directly into the heart of Germany.

An offensive at the top of Europe might well be the extra contribution to Russia's cause which the Soviet Union gives every evidence of expecting. There is plenty to win: A successful push could wipe Finland from the war, open and protect the whole allied-Russian supply line via the excellent port of Murmansk and re-establish the allies in Norway where they could organize and supply increasing resistance by the population. A common U. S.-British-Russian fighting front could be thrown quickly across the thin tip of Finland and this front in time might provide just the impetus which the Russians need to turn the whole German northern flank and collapse it upon the Baltic states and East Prussia itself.

## Fear Heavy Damage From Gypsy Moth

NEW YORK, March 12 (AP)—The eastern plant board reports today that for lack of federal and state money there is danger that the gipsy moth will break out of New England this summer and eventually cover the United States west of the Mississippi river.

Eventual cost for shade tree protection is estimated at \$90,000,000 a year from this breakthrough, with total reaching \$4,500,000,000 in the next 50 to 60 years. This is exclusive of the most serious damage of the gipsy moth, to oak forests, which the report estimates will number 25,000,000 acres stripped of leaves and seriously damaged or killed. No monetary figure is fixed.

The gipsy moth was imported from Europe to Medford, Mass., in 1869 in a silk-worm experiment. It escaped from the Medford laboratory, \$100 was asked to exterminate it and refused. Since then, today's report states, its control has cost \$30,000,000.

# After War Is Over, RAF Fliers Want To Return To West Texas

In clipped British accents, interspersed now and then with a Texas idiom, two English RAF fliers now training at Terrell told Tuesday of their impression of West Texas.

They are Arthur Aaron, 21, and Kenneth Crowther, 20, guests of Mr. and Mrs. A. V. Karchoer.

After fourteen months at Terrell, the students were anxious to see West Texas, the ranches, cowboy and cattle and all the other things they had heard about this section of Texas.

E. Nye of Dallas, friend of Karchoer's, wrote here to see if the visit could be arranged. It would and was and the fliers arrived here Sunday.

A trip to a ranch over Sunday was arranged and the boys got to ride horseback and see ranch life at first hand. It must have been pretty impressive to the boys whose homes are in Leeds, England, for Aaron believes if he could just get his family to join him here, he could spend the rest of his life on a West Texas ranch after this business of war is over.

Crowther is equally as enthused over the country and over the people. "Everybody here looks so happy," he stated, "nobody looks worried about anything. And another thing," and on this both the boys were agreed, "Texas people say what they mean."  
Both Crowther and Aaron were students together at Leeds University and were in their second year studying architecture. They wanted to come to America with a contingent of students to receive flying training and admitted their families were glad for

them to come where there was no war.

Having spent about half their training time at Terrell, the fliers will be going back home and are anxious, of course, to see their families. But of one thing they are both sure, sometimes, some how when this war is over, they are coming back again.

They like this country. As for girls, well, they haven't seen very many so far but they planned to go to the country club dance last night and after that they figured they would have more to say about West Texas femininity.

Other than the country and the people about which the boys sound like high priced press agents, the RAF fliers are interested in Texas food. More highly spiced dishes and the abundance

and variety of food is different than England. There the fliers say they have good food but it is just plain fare and "no trimmings."

Crowther, who is quite a musician and led a band at his university, and Aaron, who is a mountain climbing enthusiast, were dressed in their RAF blue uniforms. From time to time their British accents were perplexing and they would sound off with a Texas phrase like "you all" and "let's go" and grin engagingly at having gotten to use them.

Furlough for the students is up Sunday and they'll be glad to be flying again because they enjoy it. But they'll never forget, they say, their trip to West Texas. They'll take back home a memory of a place that turned out to look just like they thought it would.

## He's Helping Win War—

### H. Appleton, Vincent Produces Much Food

Nobody is going to get hungry during this war if H. Appleton of Vincent can help it.

Appleton's production of war food during the past year included 9,100 pounds of beef, 4,500 pounds of pork, 1,500 dozen eggs, and enough stored food to maintain his home for two years. This home food supply consists of all

kinds of vegetables, canned and dried, and hams, bacon, lard.

The Appletons believe in proper diets and plenty of food to keep up their own health and morale. In addition to all the good things carried over from 1941, they are planning a still larger garden for 1942.

At present there are 400 laying hens producing 60 dozen eggs weekly on the Appleton farm, and Appleton points out that every egg laid is another blow against Hitler. It is Appleton's practice to raise a large number of pullets each year, then cull out the poor layers and still maintain a large flock. Green pasture is provided by sowing small grain in the fall to supplement turnips and rape grown in the garden. Eggs are gathered regularly, and, in warm weather, kept in a cool place so that they can be delivered fresh.

In their beef production, the Appletons fed out 14 yearlings. Seven of these were of their own raising and seven bought as calves. They were run on a sudan pasture for four months, then fed 90 days on a ration of maize heads, hagar and cane bundles, ground limestone, and cottonseed meal, most of which was grown on their farm. These heaves sold for a total of \$954.

The Appletons produced 21 hogs for market. They raised their own pigs and fed them out with farm feed.

The farm on which this vast quantity of food was produced consists of a half section of land with about half of it in cultivation; about an average of Howard county farms so far as natural resources are concerned.

County Agent O. P. Griffin points out that if every farm in the county did so well in 1942, the county could send to market, to help win the war, close to a million dollars worth of beef, half a million dollars worth of pork, and half a million dollars worth of eggs. And this section would not have to draw on other sections for bacon, pork, beef, dairy products, eggs or canned vegetables.

Commenting on inquiries about the use of trees for windbreaks, Keating said the experiments at the farm had shown that the real advantage of the trees in this area was as shields on the western and northern sides of a homestead. Spacings proven at the farm will insure an almost perfect defense against wind damage around the place or against sand piling up in the yard, he said.

## Forsan Man Due To Profit From Hogs

FORSAN, March 12 (Sp)—John Kubecka, Superior Oil company employe here, started a hobby that is developing prospects of profit. He has purchased three bred Duroc Jersey sows from George Slaughter of Wharton, paying \$40 a head, delivered in Big Spring. Kubecka added these to four stock hogs he already had been feeding.

He has built some excellent pens and sheds which cost nothing except his own labor, having worked in his spare time and used discarded materials. With steadily rising meat prices, this pastime interest is due to reap him financial reward.

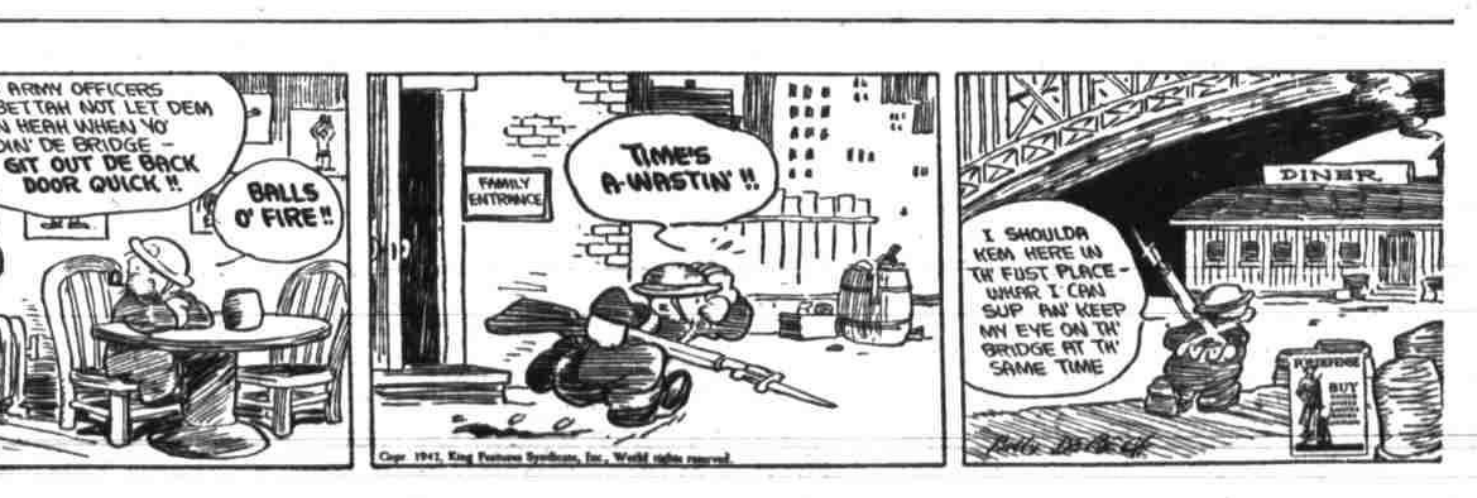
