McLean Gets Good Rain

An excellent rain fell in the vicinity of McLean last Sunday afternoon and night and a slow shower and mist prevailed from the north all day Monday. Together with other recent rains this last precipitation puts the ground in perfect condition and growing crops will have no cause to suffer for lack of moisture.

It is understood that never before in the agricultural history of this section has the prospects been better than at the present time for a goodly yield of all farm and garden products. Corn, in most instances, is about ready to lay by and shows a healthy and vigorous growth. Rye and maize, as well as watermelons, are doing nicely and a yield will doubtless be a record breaker this fall.

It is now up to the town folks to make their feet in hand and go to some of the improvements that are so vitally necessary at this time. The rural districts are developing and the next year or two will witness the best influx of farmers that has occurred here. We should make some strenuous efforts to the town well toward the progress parade and endeavor to do so there are several important things that should be attended to at once. Better water service and better town are the first things that should be looked after.

Convention to McLean Next

D. N. Massay and T. W. Petty attended the Wheeler County District Singing Convention at Corn Valley, in Wheeler county, last Saturday and Sunday and they report the meeting the most successful yet held by this fast growing organization. Something in the neighborhood of five hundred people attended the sessions and the good people of that little community were thoroughly prepared to entertain them in a most fitting manner. A large and commodious tent was secured under which the singing was conducted and on Sunday a monster table about a hundred and fifty feet long was laid with good things to eat in sufficient quantities to feed a regiment.

When the matter of the next place of meeting came before the association these gentlemen presented McLean as an aspirant, promising the singers a first class article of entertainment, and the offer was accepted without a dissenting vote. Ship Fine Hogs.

Cooper & Crabtree, local hog dealers, were over in the Groom country the first of the week where they loaded out two cars of fat hogs for the Fort Worth market. One of the cars was purchased from N. A. Steed and weighed 183 pounds in the pens before loading.

The other car was one of the best that has ever been shipped from the Panhandle section. They were all red and less than a year old. Their weight averaged 265 in the pens. These hogs were raised by Nick and John Britten, two Iowa farmers who settled in that locality six years ago and who are making splendid success with their stock farming operations. The particular hogs mentioned were fed on kafir and maize, and is a practical demonstration of what can be done with the proper handling of these important crops in this section.

Feed Car of Hogs.

C. M. Carpenter, who owns a farm in the McLean country is making arrangements to try a new method of feeding hogs for the winter market and is confident that the rations will prove a profitable and expedient feed for this important money producer.

The gentleman now has sixty head of pigs and shoats and will add to them a sufficient number to make a car load at shipping time. These he will turn on a shinary acorn patch until peanuts are sufficiently matured, after which he will run them on peanuts for about four weeks, taking them off this and feeding them a ration of pie melons and crushed corn, thoroughly cooked. All during this time he will give them a small amount of corn or other grain to keep their flesh from getting too soft, and two weeks before shipping he will put them on a full feed of grain.

While this method of hog feeding is new to this section Mr. Carpenter hopes to make it a success and his operations will be watched with interest by others who are engaged in this particular industry.

The real object in education is to cultivate in the child a capacity for self-control or self-government; not a habit of submission to an overbearing, arbitrary, external power, but a habit of obeying the dictates of honor and duty, as enforced by active will power within the child. In childhood and in youth it is of the utmost importance to appeal steadily and almost exclusively to motives which will be operative in after life. 




Mr. Peter Radford, president of the Farmers' Union, and Mr. B. B. Cain, president of the Texas Commercial Secretaries and Business Men's Association, the official heads of two organizations that are co-operating in an effort to improve methods of marketing farm products.

The Texas Welfare Commission, at its last session in San Antonio, adopted a resolution approving the Farmers' Union plan of marketing cotton and calling upon the financial interests of the state supplement the

work of the Union in obtaining six per cent money to finance distress cotton, and asked President Cain, representing the business interests, to lend assistance to Mr. Radford, representing the agricultural interests, in giving more complete effect to the plan.

It is reliably estimated that with sufficient revenue behind it, the plan to loan money to farmers who are financially unable to hold their cotton, will result in a more stable market and will add at least ten dollars per bale to the price of cotton.

GOOD ROADS



THE ANNUAL EXPENSE OF MAINTAINING MUD HOLES EQUAL TO ENTIRE COST OF STATE CAPITOL.

Familiarity is said to breed contempt, but the mud hole appears to be exempt from this rule, as most of our citizens have been intimately acquainted with it from infancy and we contribute \$3,000,000 per annum to maintaining it, as well as submit to a tax of \$8,000,000 per annum levied by the mud hole in reducing the capacity of the load. A chain is no stronger than its weakest link and the carrying capacity of a road is governed by its worst mud hole and steepest grade. Improved public highways will do away with the mud hole.
