Hospital Open House Sunday

Doors of the new McLean Hospital will swing open to the public Sunday afternoon, and everyone is invited to inspect the facilities between 2 and 5 p.m.

A brief dedication program is planned at the beginning of the open house, and hospital Administrator Bill Robertson said Gray County Judge Bill Craig has been invited to deliver the dedicatory address.

Remarks will be made by McLean Mayor John C. Haynes, who also is a member of the county hospital board, and by Truitt Johnson, county commissioner from McLean.

All members of the hospital board and the county commissioners court are expected to attend the event.

The 23-bed hospital, constructed at a cost of some \$200,000, will

be operated by the county. Robertson, who also serves as administrator of the county-owned Highland General Hospital in Pampa, said the McLean facilities are the finest he has seen in a town of this size.

The latest equipment available has been purchased for the local hospital.

McLean residents themselves have contributed funds for furnishing beds and other facilities for 17 of the patient rooms.

Invitations to the open house Sunday have been sent by Robertson to city, county and hospital officials in several other cities and towns in the Panhandle.

Robertson expects arrangements to be completed for the hospital to receive the first patients next week.

BANQUET FOR TIGERS FRIDAY

El Paso Official Will Be Speaker

McLean High School's football Tigers will be honored Friday night at the annual grid banquet in the American Legion Building.

An estimated 175 persons are expected to attend the affair, starting at 7 p.m. Tickets, costing \$2 each, are still on sale at Master Cleaners, Parsons Rexall Drug and The McLean News.

Guest speaker will be Mike Brumelow, community relations manager of El Paso Natural Gas Co.

Sammy Haynes is to be master of ceremonies, and the welcome will be by Cliff Day, president of the Lions Club.

Head Coach Fred Hedgecock and Assistant Coach Bob Schneider will introduce special guests. The McLean News Most Valuable Player Award will be presented by Jack Shelton, and All-Top of Texas Team certificates are to be presented by Jeff Cohane of Pampa.

Jim Goss, junior high coach, will say the invocation and Lloyd Hunt, high school teacher and former assistant coach, the benediction.

A former coach, Brumelow was an outstanding football player at Texas Christian University in the late 1920's. He was head coach and athletic director at Texas Western College from 1950 to 1957.

The football banquet is sponsored each year by the Lions Club and board of education.

40 Entries Expected Junior Stock Show Is Here Saturday

Forty steers and barrows are expected to be entered in the second annual McLean Junior Livestock Show Saturday afternoon.

Nelson Christie, McLean High School vocational agriculture teacher, said Future Farmers of America and 4-H Club members have indicated they will enter 10 steers and 30 barrows in the competition.

This compares with four steers and 24 barrows in the first show held last year.

Judging will start at 1:30 p.m. at the FFA barn south of the city. However, the animals must be in place by 11 a.m.

The public is invited to attend the show, sponsored by the Lions Club with prize money provided by McLean business people.

Judging the show will be Bob Stagg, Pampa vocational agriculture teacher.

Eligible for Pampa Show

Christie said all animals entered here will be eligible to compete in the Top of Texas Junior Livestock Show March 8-10 in Pampa. Twenty-seven barrows and four steers have already been entered by local youngsters in the Pampa show.

Three weight classes are planned in the barrow judging here—light, medium and heavy.

Steers will be judged in heavy-weight and lightweight classes.

Grand champion and reserve champion steers and barrows will be selected.

TIGERS WIN IN FINAL TILT

Wallop Memphis 65-53 on Friday

That Friday night home victory which has plucked the McLean Tigers in heart-stopping games here through much of the season finally was nailed down last week.

Coach Fred Hedgecock's Bengals laid it on the Memphis Cyclone 65-53 Friday in the final basketball game of the season for both teams.

The final score isn't a true indication, however, of the excitement of the contest. McLean led most of the way, but the visitors pulled into a tie soon after the fourth quarter began.

That was all the Tigers needed to give them the final spurt of scoring which brought the triumph. McLean got on the score board first, but soon surrendered the lead briefly to the Cyclone. The locals took it back right away, and their margin varied from one to 12 points until Memphis deadlocked the score at 42-42 soon after the last period began.

The Tigers held a 17-13 advantage at the end of the first quarter, 34-24 at halftime and 42-37 after three periods.

Eddy Windom, playing his final game in a Tiger uniform, was the leading point-maker with 28. George Green found the range for 16, Eddy Finley seven, Dickie Crockett six and Homer Goldston and Garry Hester four each.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon in the McLean Methodist Church, with Rev. J. B. Stewart, pastor officiating. Assisting was Rev. Dan Beltz, pastor of the First Baptist Church.

Interment was in Hillcrest Cemetery under the direction of Lamb Funeral Home.

Less From Fires In McLean Light in '64, Annual Report Shows

Total amount of insured loss from fires in McLean during 1964 was \$483,21, according to Fire Chief Eoyd Meador.

Meador recently presented his annual report from the volunteer fire department to the city commission.

"It is a pleasure," he said, to report that there were only 12 fires in the city throughout the year.

These included: Three grass, one trash, one grease, one fence, one asphalt pot, three automobile and two house fires.

In addition to the 12 fire alarms answered inside the city limits, Meador said the department made 40 runs outside the city—30 of which were in Gray County.

Of these, 27 involved grass, five automobiles, two dwellings and six miscellaneous.

The fire department receives payment from the county for answering alarms in Gray County outside the McLean city limits.

Clawson's Ship In Retaliatory Strikes

USS HANCOCK—(Special)—Navy Fireman Gary W. Clawson, son of Mr. and Mrs. William D. Clawson of McLean, participated in the retaliatory air strike operations Feb. 7 against North Viet Nam while serving aboard the aircraft carrier USS Hancock, operating with the U.S. Seventh Fleet in the South China Sea.

Navy aircraft took off from the aircraft carriers Ranger, Coral Sea and Hancock. Of the carrier aircraft, 49 attacked Communist barracks and staging areas near Dong Hoi about 100 miles north of the border between South and North Viet Nam.

SCREWORM PROGRAM

Ranchers of the McLean area will be glad to know the screwworm program got another appropriation recently.

The Texas Legislature gave the eradication program a welcome birthday gift by approving a request for \$250,000 in emergency funds to help keep the program alive from April 1 to June 30.

The screwworm fly has now been pushed into Old Mexico. There are still many stones to be turned to keep the program alive. It has been estimated the flies cost Texas cattlemen over 100 million dollars annually before the program started.

We hope it is the plan of the U.S.D.A. to continue to back the screwworm fly all the way to the canal zone. It can be done.

BUSHLAND FIELD DAY

Quite a number of McLean farmers and ranchers are attending the field day at Bushland this Thursday. A two-hour session was scheduled for the morning and afternoon. A barbecue lunch was served with the compliments of the Hoover Oil Co. of Pampa. Information was presented on pre-emergent sprays for milo and cotton. Other phases of chemical weed control were presented. Cultural methods of grain sorghum and wheat were given by a team of specialists doing research at the experiment station.

A special county field day is rather unique at the Bushland station. Over 100 area farmers and ranchers are expected.

STOCK SHOW

Mrs. George Smith of Albreed has sent out letters to all county agents and vocational agriculture teachers in the six county show area advising them of the fact

the home demonstration women will serve short orders during the coming stock show, March 6-8. This must be close to 10 years the women have carried on this task. It is a money raising idea for them. It is an excellent convenience to all those participating in the annual Top o' Texas Junior Livestock Show. You can't get better food anywhere. Each home demonstration member brings along a pie or two.

BRUCELLOSIS CERTIFICATION

Only two herds are left to be tested in the county. We have sent an urgent plea to the Texas Animal Health Commission asking them not to hold up the certification in the county because of these two herds. If the county could be certified within the next two weeks it would mean thousands of dollars to those ranchers having cows or unvaccinated calves on wheat. The cattle would move into other counties or states without restriction from a notified brucellosis free area. It has been estimated that unvaccinated heifers moving through auction markets are penalized from \$1.50 to \$2 per cwt.

Although we in the extension service have nothing to do with the enforcement of the provisions of the brucellosis law, we do have an educational responsibility to advise any holdouts that a heavy fine of \$200 plus a jail sentence can be imposed on those who refuse to present their cattle for testing. Each day a cattle owner refuses to test is considered a separate offense.

These regulations take effect only after a minimum of 75 per cent of the ranchers sign a petition asking the Texas Animal Health Commission for a testing program. In the case of Gray County it was estimated that over 95 per cent of the cattle owners signed the petition.

well—almost flawlessly, in fact.
Mrs. Back pointed out that the
students themselves did the re-
search to uncover the historical
and legendary facts for the show.
She then took the information they
provided, and wrote the script.
It was also Mrs. Back who
directed the show and she proved
once again she is capable of get-
ting much more out of these
youngsters than we parents can—
or ever thought possible.

So . . . take a bow, Mrs. Back.
A dedication such as yours is
rare in this day and time.

We have read and re-read sev-
eral times Congressman Walter
Rogers explanation of his now
famous vote on an amendment to
House Joint Resolution 234, but we
still don't understand his reason-
ing.

The 18th District congressman
from Pampa was irritated by Re-
publican criticism of his vote for
the resolution, which made suppl-
mental appropriation for the fiscal
year ending June 30 "for certain
activities of the Department of
Agriculture."

Rogers went to the House floor
to rap the Republicans for their
"rank distortion of fact and cal-
cously twisted conclusion."

In his newsletter received here
last week, the congressman quoted
from his talk before the House
of Representatives.

An amendment to the House
resolution had been introduced to
prevent the President from selling
surplus farm commodities to the
United Arab Republic, whose leader,
Abdel Gamal Nasser, has been
highly critical and downright in-
sulting to the United States while
playing footsie with the Com-
munists.

Indeed, Nasser has been supply-
ing arms and other assistance to
the Congolese rebels—those same
rebels who murdered many Amer-
ican missionaries. And this at the
same time the people of the
United States are helping to feed
citizens of the U.A.R.

Rogers says his vote against
the amendment and for the resolu-
tion as presented was a "choice
between the President of the United
States and Abdel Gamal Nasser,
a Mideast dictator."

He explained that the US. needs
to continue selling surplus farm
commodities to U.A.R. in order to
secure local currency in that
country.

It is our congressman's belief
that if we stopped selling these
commodities to Nasser it would
give the dictator "a propaganda
weapon which he could use to
solidify the entire Arab world
against the United States and sub-
sequently justify himself in ex-
propriating properties belonging to
private investors of this country,
turning these over to our Com-
munist enemies, closing the Suez
Canal and helping the Communists
to gain additional power on the
continent of Africa . . ."

We wouldn't even pretend to un-
derstand the situation as well as

Congressman Rogers does. But it
does appear that our efforts to
"buy" friends through the years
have been most unsuccessful.

Perhaps the time has come to
take a different approach to this
problem of keeping friends.
We believe that a majority of
our congressman's constituents feel
he took the wrong stand this time,
even though most of us agree
most of the time with the way
Rogers represents us in the na-
tion's capital.

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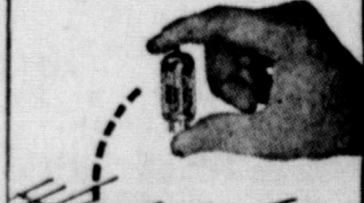
