**SOIL CONSERVATION IN GRAY COUNTY**

The Gray County Soil Conservation District is a non-profit organization initiated in 1948 by local landowners to conserve our natural resources. Since this district was organized, there have been 140,000 acres of range seeding, 237,767 acres of brush controlled, 150 miles of terracing, 375 ponds constructed, 127 acres of waterways constructed, 250 acres of tree planting, 210 fish ponds stocked, 19 erosion control structures installed, 35 miles of irrigation pipeline installed, 17 sprinkler and 34 surface irrigation systems installed, 1,055 acres of irrigation land leveling, 770 acres of wildlife habitat development and development of 315 livestock water facilities. This work has been possible in Gray County through free technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service, an organizational unit of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. This work has cost local landowners several thousand dollars to conserve land and water resources for future generations. Without federal technical and cost-

share assistance, most of this work would have been prohibited because of the total expense involved. **Conservation Cut** The 1966 budget submitted to Congress called for a \$20,000,000 cut in funds to hire personnel to help soil conservation districts. It was recommended that this cut be made up by charging farmers and soil conservation districts for soil conservation assistance. If this proposal carries, it could mean the loss of one man per soil conservation district because districts do not have the money to make up the difference. The 1965 budget also proposes a \$100,000,000 cut in ACP conservation cost-share practices. **Conservation Vital to Economy** The importance of soil conservation work should be carefully evaluated by all citizens. Largely through misinformation, many people feel that the nation is carrying farmers and ranchers at the taxpayers' expense. This is not true. A careful study will show that a strong agricultural economy is essential to a strong national economy. Landowners make up five per cent of the population, 40 per

cent is in agri-business, such as marketing, transportation and processing, and 52 per cent of the population is connected indirectly with agriculture. They are indirectly connected because their customers make their living from agriculture. **Costly Farm Programs?** Many people that complain about costly farm programs do not know that a large percentage of the money is spent for their benefit rather than the farmer's. Consider who benefits from meat and food inspection, school lunch programs and surplus food for welfare. Yet, much of this is hidden in the U. S. Department of Agriculture budget. **Bad Publicity** The farmer has been the "goat" in many articles appearing in national magazines and large newspapers. All this bad publicity has created a false image of farming and the American farmer and rancher. This is especially unfortunate since a great many members of Congress represent people who have little information about the real farm situation.

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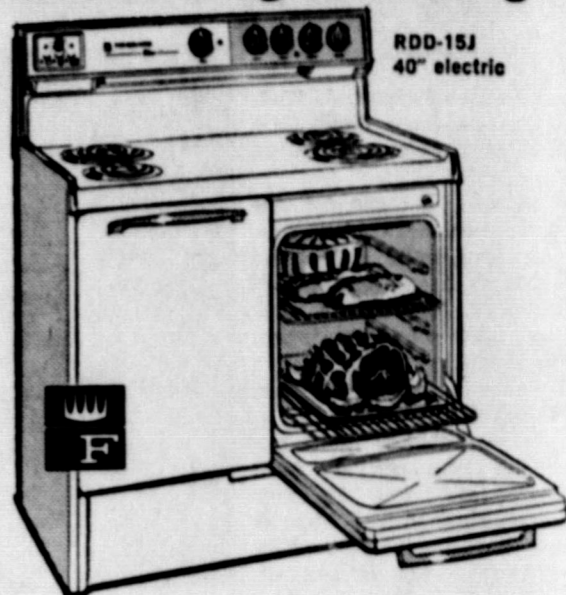

## BRUCELLOSIS PROGRAM

Grainger McIlhany, our state representative, called me last Friday evening to advise that our county has been declared a Modified Certified Brucellosis Free County. The designation of the county came about two months earlier than could be normally expected, due primarily through Grainger's efforts. He made an appeal to the Texas Animal Health Commission and the Animal Disease Eradication Division of the USDA Agricultural Research Service in Austin for an early designation of Gray County. A few thank you notes to Grainger would be appreciated. The general public is constantly reminded to write our legislators and tell them how to vote on a specific issue. Seldom, if ever, do you see anything in print advising the general public to send a thank you note to a legislator. Let's fire a bunch of cards and letters to Grainger.

To people having breeding stock and unvaccinated heifers for sale, this will mean thousands of dollars to them. This is especially true of cattle on wheat pasture that will soon be moving to the markets. It has been estimated that yearling heifers unvaccinated cost the seller from \$1.50 to \$2 per 100 pounds when marketed in Amarillo from a non-modified certified county. The following letter was received from Dr. John Wilbur, U.S.D.A. veterinarian in charge, Animal Disease Eradication Division, Austin:

"Dear Mr. Whaley:  
"We are happy to state that Gray County has qualified as a Modified-Certified area effective Feb. 24, 1965.

"If it would be advantageous to the producers, our offices will notify the states of destination for interstate shipments.

"The official certificate should be delivered to you in the near future."

## WHY CALL ME LORD, LORD

Luke 6:46

Raymond Nelson who lives northeast of Pampa has completed a cross-fence on his place north of McLean. The purpose of this fence is to get better distribution of grazing and allow for deferred grazing.

Cost-share assistance is available through the ACP and Great Plains Conservation Programs.

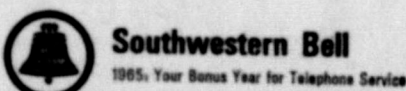

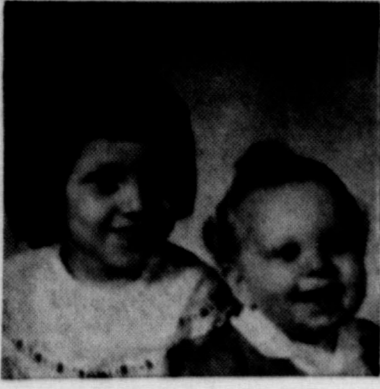
