Fulmer Named New Pastor of Church Christ

John R. Fulmer, formerly of N. M., moved to McLean last Thursday and filled the pulpit of the local Church of Christ Sunday as the new minister of that organization.

Mrs. Fulmer is the only member of the family with him. They have one daughter who is a junior at Abilene Christian College, Abilene, and another married, who lives in Jal.

The new minister is a native of Texas, and has a rather wide experience outside of preaching. He has sold automobiles, insurance, and other commodities, as well as having kept books and operated independent businesses before beginning his preaching career.

He received his Bible training at Freed-Hardeman College, Henderson, Tenn. He has done local work for congregations in Sulphur, Okla., Henrietta and Crystal City, Duncan, Ariz., and Hobbs and Jal, N. M.

In addition to his pulpit work, Minister Fulmer has written several study courses conducted by night and network radio programs. He served in the role of announcer. His pet subjects, outside of the Bible, are psychology and genetics. Wherever he lives, he takes an active part in the civic affairs of his community.

The new minister said that he came to McLean to serve the entire community and is willing to be used in any way that is right.

Tiger Cagers Drop 2 Games To 'Norwood'

Davis Buys Grocery Farm at Panhandle

Mapin Davis, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. A. Davis of McLean and former resident of this city, has bought the Star Grocery and Market from C. E. Lovies in Panhandle. It was announced last week.

Davis has been living in Panhandle for a number of years, and formerly was owner of the Davis Drug store there. He also was the Phillips agent for some time. Since selling the drug store, he has been a painting contractor. Davis also purchased the grocery store building.

Quarantine for Pink Boll Worm Reaches Gray

Gray County has been added to the list of counties placed on the pink boll worm quarantine. Ginners L. H. Earthman and S. R. Jones of McLean were notified this week.

The quarantine, which will probably be of 3 to 5 years duration, means that all burs and trash at the gins must be hauled away and burned, and cannot be used for fertilizing purposes. Farmers will not be directly affected, but two ginners stated:

Other counties of the area have been placed on the quarantine in an effort by the state to control the spread of the boll worm. The only effective way, it has been explained, to prevent the spread is to get rid of all burs and trash at each of the gins as it accumulates, and not allow any to be used as fertilizer.

Harvesting of cotton is now about 90 per cent completed in this area, the ginners stated, and to date 1402 bales of cotton have been ginned at the two local gins. It is believed that not more than 200 more bales remain in the area. The ginning to date however, is nearly 500 bales ahead of last year's crop.

Cotton palling has been delayed due to weather during the past few days. Rain falling Tuesday night and Wednesday totaled 34 of an inch, according to a report from Pete Pulbright, local weather observer. The rainfall brings the total for the year to 20.47 inches.

Thursday morning the skies were fairly clear, although the temperature was below freezing. Weather forecasters are predicting snow for the week-end in the Panhandle area.

Pittman Sells Store Interest To Smallwoods

The interest of M. L. Pittman in the McLean Food Store was bought last week-end by Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Smallwood, it has been announced.

Smallwood and Pittman have been partners in the business since November of last year, when they purchased the Modern Market from C. O. Ward, and changed the name to the McLean Food Store.

The firm will continue to operate with the same personnel, with Roy Kiser managing the market. Pittman, however, will no longer work in the store, and has not yet announced his future plans.

Mailing Rules For Christmas Are Outlined

Postmaster Johnnie Back's rule season is on, for the mailing of Christmas packages is already underway.

Those people mailing packages can greatly aid the post office department in its work, if the packages are wrapped correctly, properly addressed, etc., the postmaster pointed out.

Here are a few of the things that can be done in cooperating with the postal employees:

1. Prepay postage fully on all mail matter.
2. Address all matter plainly and completely in ink, giving street address or box or rural route number whenever possible. Tags should not be used unless necessary, in which case a copy of the address and return card should be placed inside the parcel for identification if tag is lost.
3. Pack articles carefully in strong, durable containers. Wrap parcels securely, but do not seal them except when bearing a printed endorsement reading "Contents, merchandise—postmaster." This parcel may be opened for postal inspection if necessary.
4. If perishable articles are contained, the package should be prominently endorsed with the word "perishables" by the postal employees.
5. Parcels may not exceed 10 inches in length and girth combined.
6. The limit of weight is fourth-class and parcel-post matter, as well as first-class and air mail, is 70 pounds.
7. You may write on the outside "do not open until Christmas" and you may place name, or symbols on the articles inside the package, but do not enclose letters in parcels, as doing so would subject the entire package to letter postage.
8. Christmas seals or stickers should not be placed on the address side of mail.
9. Parcels should be insured. Inquire at post office for rates.
10. Attention is called to the fact that Christmas and other greeting cards bearing particles of glass, metal, mica, tinseal, or other similar substances for decorative substances which are likely to rub off and injure postal employees and cancelling machine must be enclosed in envelopes tightly sealed to the corners with postage prepaid at the first-class rate in order that such cards may be accepted for mailing.

Moving of Hospital Building Delayed Due to Weather

The building for the McLean community hospital was to be moved in this week, but due to the rain Tuesday night and Wednesday, moving of the building will probably be delayed again.

Foundation for the structure is now ready to receive the building. The structure is a former Prisoner of War Camp nurses' quarters.

The board of directors has made one or two contacts with doctors who may be interested in becoming associated with the hospital, a spokesman said this week, but nothing definite has been done about employing one.

Local Theaters Sold to Howard and McMurry

McLean's two theaters, the Avalon and the Lone Star, were sold this week by Paul A. Pierson and his partners to W. A. (Bill) Howard of Memphis and Hall (Mutt) McMurry of Dallas. The new owners took over management Monday, December 1.

Both of the new owners are experienced in the theater business. Howard, who will manage the two theaters formerly was co-owner of a theater in Sunray, selling his interest in that theater several months ago. Since that time, he has been making his home in Memphis, where he lived prior to moving to Sunray. Howard and his wife have already moved to McLean, and are now living in the Hindman Hotel.

McMurry is at present manager of the Evelyn and Star theaters in Dallas and will continue to make his home there and will still serve as manager of the two shows.

Mr. and Mrs. Pierson will continue to make their home in McLean. Pierson is co-owner of the Panhandle Merchants Protective Association with O. L. Barr, and will devote his time to the expansion of that association.

In taking over the businesses, the new owners stated that it will be their policy to obtain the finest pictures available and provide the public with the best recreation possible.

County Agent Ralph Thomas Wins National Service Award

Ralph R. Thomas, county agent of Gray County, received the Distinguished Service Award of the National County Agents Association at the banquet of their annual convention held in Chicago at the Edgewater Beach Hotel December 1.

Thomas came to Gray County as county agent in 1936. He has always taken a great interest in the 4-H Club work, and many of the members first enrolled are now leading farmers in their communities. The need for soil conservation was noted as soon as he came into the county. He surveyed the first level terraces in the county that first year, and

terracing as well as dams on the farms and ranches for erosion control and conservation of water has been a major part of his work.

Crop improvement mainly through the use of certified seed, has been one of the important contributions made by Thomas to the agriculture of the county.

In 1935 he organized the county for testing of cattle for tuberculosis, giving the county an accredited rating as T. B. free. Eradication of bindweeds has come to the front in Thomas' activities since his return from the armed services. Considerable progress has been made in this program.

A total of \$438.50 had been subscribed to the fund early this week. 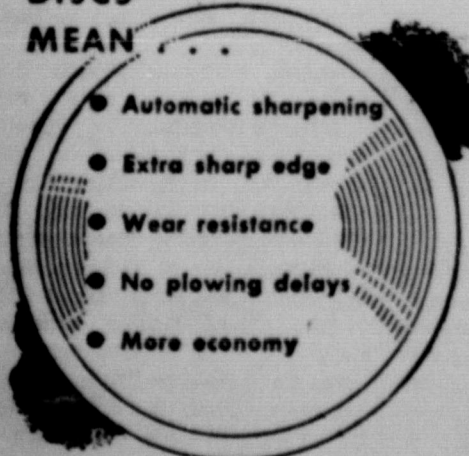



Editorials

CHRISTMAS SEALS

ONCE AGAIN this year, thousands of Americans will receive through the mail Christmas seals, and those Americans will be given the option of buying the seals or not buying them.

Undoubtedly many people receive these seals each year, and never pay for them. But most people send in their contributions, and the money is used for a good cause.

Proceeds from the sale of the seals go to the National Tuberculosis Association, and this organization uses the money to support the tuberculosis control work of its groups.

Residents of this community, at least many of you received your Christmas seals this week. You do not have to keep them, but practically all of you will, and it is the belief of The News that your money is being well invested.

President Truman accepted the first sheet of the 1947 seals, and made the following statement:

"It is heartening to learn that the death rate from tuberculosis is continuing to decline in the United States, but this fact should not give us a false sense of security.

"Hard work has forced the death rate down. More hard work, based on intelligent planning, is necessary to keep it down. We need no other reminder of this than of the spectacular rise in tuberculosis morbidity and mortality in Europe when controls were of necessity relaxed during the war.

"Even in this country we have no right to be too proud of our progress. I am told that 50,000 Americans die annually from tuberculosis. Yet tuberculosis is a preventable disease and we cannot relax our efforts to control it in the face of this needless waste of lives.

"All of us can contribute to the success of these efforts through buying Christmas seals. These seals, on sale from November 24 to Christmas, are the sole support of the National Tuberculosis Association and its affiliates in their year-round, nation-wide campaign to control tuberculosis. We are effectively joining the fight against tuberculosis when we buy and use Christmas seals."
