Most are not too important, but that's the way the Communists want it at first. The News is publishing this series of some questions and answers in a booklet prepared by the House Committee on Un-American Activities, so that you may realize the similarity of some of our present governmental methods with Communism, as well as letting you know how an actual Communistic government here would be.






