AT A MEETING of the directors of the local chapter of the American Red Cross, it was voted to buy a ceiling projection machine to enable bedridden people to read as they desire.

The machine works on the principal of a regular projection machine, except that the film is of the micro-film type. This film actually pictures the pages of the book, and when it is projected on a ceiling, the bedridden person can easily read the material. The Red Cross is buying an initial stock of about 30 books, or films. Some of the books are fiction, some sports, and some of other nature.

As a contributor to the Red Cross in the past, you are now a stockholder in this machine, or at least you will be when it arrives here and is set up for use. You, too, are having a part in furnishing recreation for those unfortunate people who are ill and unable to enjoy themselves outside. This machine helps to bring that outside enjoyment to them.

The projection machine will be placed in the custody of the city librarian, and will be loaned out to those in need in the same manner as books are loaned. There will be no charge for its use, although, if the expected desire for the machine is reached, there will be a limit on the time each borrower can use it.

Just when the machine will be here is not definitely known, but it has already been ordered. Some of the books to be available on the films include such well known titles as "The Robe" and "The Green Years."

Yes, it is a great addition to the facilities of the library, and the directors of the Red Cross are to be commended on their decision to help bring happiness to those unfortunate enough to be shut in.

Have you read yet of the new Land Polaroid camera? It is the new invention which allows you to take a picture, wait a couple of minutes and pull out a finished photographic print. The prints are of the sepia-tone (brown color), are permanent prints, and clear enough to be used in making engravings for newspapers, etc. In the most recent issue of the Texas Press Messenger, bulletin of the Texas Press Association, the camera is fully explained—how it works, etc. It sounds to me as if it would be the real thing for a small paper like this to have around. Maybe if I can buy one on the installment plan, I'll get one. The camera costs \$89.75, the case about \$15, flash bulb attachment about \$11, and exposure meter about \$12. Shucks, I might even put in a stock of camera supplies, if the thing goes off all right. Anything to make an honest nickel, you know. Seriously, however, that was not my point in bringing this matter up. Just happened to think that a camera club could be lots of fun. I like to take pictures, but I'd like to know more about how it should be done.

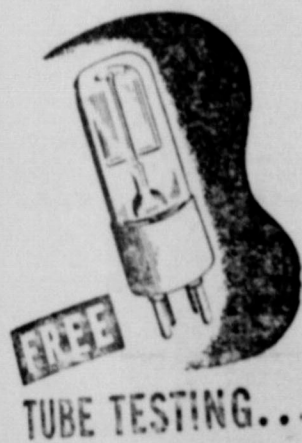

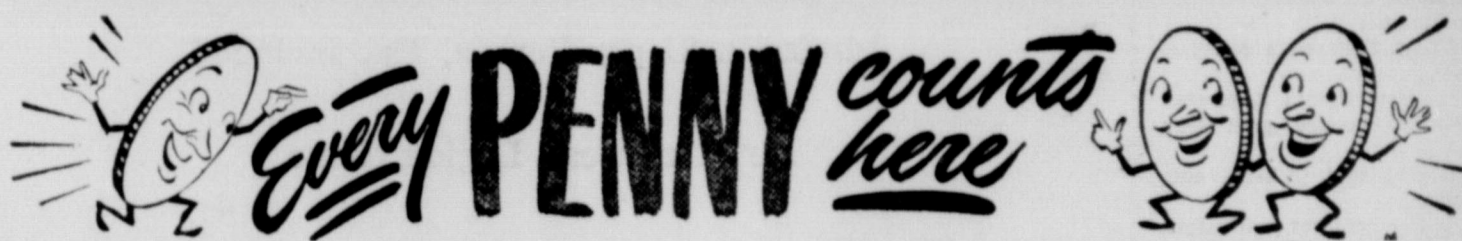

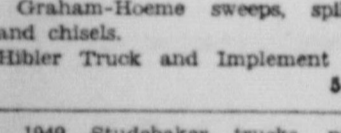
