## Three Are Held in Connection With Forgeries

Three men are being held, two in the Wheeler County jail and the third at Pampa, in connection with forgeries in McLean, Pampa, Wheeler, Sayre, Dalhart, and Arkansas.

Held in Wheeler are Leonard Bonner, 27, an escapee from the penitentiary at Santa Fe, N. M., and Billy Gaither, 19, both of Shamrock. In Pampa is W. Thurston, 30, also of Shamrock.

The three men are being held in connection with checks passed here in March, as well as checks passed in other towns.

The forged checks turned up in the various towns with the name of John Van Husa, Collingsworth County, signed to them. Van Husa's car, along with several others, was ransacked a short time before and Van Husa's cancelled checks found. The forged checks had possible copies of his name to them. Most of the checks averaged about \$40 each.

Sheriff Jess Swink of Wheeler, along with Deputy Sheriff Lynn Cantrell of Shamrock, and Texas Rangers Frank Probst and Kelly Rogers, traced Bonner to Chillicothe where he was picked up several days ago. Gaither was traced to Batesville, Ark., where he was nabbed and signed papers for extradition. Thurston was picked up at Tulla last week.

Rev. Hicks, the new McLean pastor, has been serving at Sunray. He formerly held pastorates at Perryton, Crowell, and Seymour. He is a brother of two Pampa dentists, Doctors L. M. Hicks and H. H. Hicks. He and Mrs. Hicks are due to arrive here Thursday.

Bishop W. C. Martin, in addressing the group in Amarillo, told the pastors who were going to new assignments to leave their former pastorates behind them. He pointed out that returning to former pastorates for such ceremonies as weddings and funerals works a great hardship on both the new pastor and the former pastor, and added that this practice is quickly being done away with.

In leaving McLean, Rev. Longino said, "This is not to inform you that our assignment has been, and we will now be working in Higgins. This is well known by this time. We do want to express our appreciation for the kindness shown by both our church and the citizens in McLean. ## McLean Gains 15 Students in School Census

The annual school census for the 1949-50 school year shows that Gray County will have an increase of 98 students attending during the coming year, with McLean gaining 15 of these students.

Last year McLean's census showed a total of 469 students, and the coming year will find 484 attending the local schools, according to the county report by Hueyln Laycock of Pampa, county superintendent.

The Pampa schools showed the largest increase, a total of 113. Last year Pampa had 4,094, and the coming year will have 4,207.

The total number of students registered in the county schools now is 5,487, as compared to 5,389 for the last session.

Most of the schools showed a decrease in enrollment. Lefors lost three students, leaving 419; Laketon lost two, leaving 21; Shaffer lost three, leaving 10; Farrington, 17, loss of 7; Grandview, 49, loss of 4; Hopkins, 139, loss of 10; Webb, 15, loss of 6; and Back, 22, loss of 2.

Enrollment remained the same at Keplinger, with 4 students; Davis with 3 students; and Alareed with 76 students. Other than Pampa and McLean, two other schools showed an increase. Bell has 9, as compared with 7; and Huntsman, 8, as compared with 4.

### WE FORGET EASILY

WE REALIZE NOW that the subject matter of this editorial should have appeared in last week's issue of The News.

Last Sunday morning at 8 o'clock, memorial services to those who died in past wars were held in the McLean High School auditorium. Only 46 people, by actual count, were present.

Are we forgetting so soon what these men gave? Are we forgetting so soon the great suffering and grief their deaths have brought to their relatives and their friends? The services were not long, were not drawn out, were not boring. The special message was brought by Rev. Clayton Day. It was a timely message, filled with much material for thought. But unfortunately only 46 people were present to hear the message and pause in remembrance of those who not only gave of their time and effort for all of us, but who gave their lives.

Perhaps you were one who forgot about the services. But perhaps you are also one who has forgotten about the war. Perhaps you are one who has forgotten about the great sacrifices which these men made, and about the great sacrifices which many others also made.

The News sincerely believes that we should all be ashamed that only 46 people attended the memorial services. How can we—or you—feel otherwise?

Conquest of Infantile Paralysis Now Near, Says Science Writer

The conquest of infantile paralysis is now within sight, Alton L. Blakeslee, noted science writer, predicts in a pamphlet published by the Public Affairs Committee, Inc., of New York.

"No one can predict just when the victory will come, or in what way," he adds, "but medical science is making such progress that there is real cause for optimism."

Such striking progress has been made in treatment during the past ten years that only about 15 to 25 per cent of polio victims are now "left more or less severely handicapped. . . . Forty to 60 per cent of the children or adults who get the illness in reversible form will recover completely, or almost completely, without any visible evidence of paralysis."

Scientific study of means for preventing the disease has been slower, Blakeslee admits in the 20-cent pamphlet Polio Can Be Conquered, but he lists a number of recent developments that appear to carry great promise. Monkeys have been inoculated against polio safely and effectively, he points out. Unfortunately, the vaccine does not protect the monkeys against all strains of the virus and thus could not offer satisfactory protection for humans.

Top scientists are cited as believing that a safe vaccine for humans will someday be found. The recent success of scientists in almost completely purifying one kind of polio virus should hasten this day, Blakeslee declares.

"Drugs and other chemicals have been found," he reveals, which "protect mice against viruses like polio virus, or which help the mice recover when they are given the viruses." So far, however, none has been used successfully on humans.

Although little is known about the way in which polio spreads, the pamphlet carries a number of tips for parents in the event that infantile paralysis breaks out in epidemic form in their neighborhood. Parents are urged to:

1. Watch for the symptoms that may be weather-vanes of polio: a tired feeling, headache, nausea, upset stomach, pains or stiffness in the muscles, or a fever. A big part of the victory in polio is immediate rest and immediate treatment.
2. Avoid crowds. There is no way of telling who has the virus, who is becoming sick, or who is a healthy, unaffected carrier.
3. Keep children from becoming overtired or chilled.
4. Do not let children swim in polluted waters. Attacks of polio have followed after such experiences.
5. Keep clean. Make sure that the children wash their hands before eating.
6. Keep garbage covered and screen the house against flies.

### DEATH

OF THE 182 pedestrians killed during 1948 on rural highways, 72 lost their lives while crossing the road in obvious disregard of oncoming traffic. An additional 18 were lying on standing in the roadway when fatally injured by a motor vehicle.

Twenty-two pedestrians were killed while walking along the roadway with traffic. Only six were killed while walking on the left side of the road against traffic. Eight lost their lives while pushing or working on their vehicles. The pedestrian is a peculiar person. He would be scared stiff if someone pointed a gun at him, yet he trusting walks into the path of a motor vehicle. When he has barely missed being run down he will indignantly fuss and lunge at the car driver, even though his own carelessness and stupidity nearly cost his life.

The State Department of Public Safety does not relieve the motor vehicle operator of his responsibilities in those accidents where he is the causative factor. The department does find, however, that 159 of the 182 pedestrians killed were violating traffic laws at the time they were hit.

Just as life guards are necessary at swimming pools to save lives, so must our traffic officers concentrate on the pedestrian to save his life. Swimmers who violate safety regulations are warned or prohibited at the pool. The traffic department believes that pedestrians who violate the traffic law should likewise be disciplined.

Use 2 nine-inch round cake pans or 2 square eight-inch pans, two inches deep. Line the bottom of the cake pans with paper and margarine. Start the oven heating with the oven control set in a moderate position (325° to 375° F.).

Mix the chocolate, water, and 1/2 cup of sugar in a pan and cook over very low heat until thick. Remove from the heat and cool to room temperature. Add the remaining ingredients. Sift the flour, and measure; add the salt and baking powder. Sift again. Cream the margarine thoroughly, adding the remaining sugar gradually. Beat until fluffy. Add the eggs one at a time, beating after each egg is added. Add the chocolate mixture (be sure it is cooled to room temperature) and beat until smooth. Now add the dry ingredients and milk, adding about 1/3 of each at a time and finishing with the dry ingredients. Stir just enough to mix. Pour into prepared cake pans. Bake in pre-heated moderate oven. Bake 25 to 35 minutes. Remove from pans and cool on rack. This recipe may be baked in muffin pans for cupcakes. It will make from 18 to 20, depending on size. Frost with quick frosting.

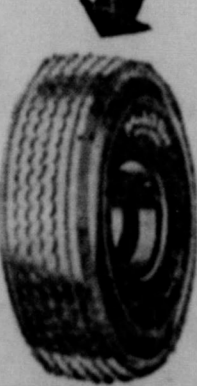

## Weed Killer Still Available, Thomas Says

Gray County still has several thousand pounds of weed killer available for distribution to those who want it under the bind weed program. County Agent Ralph Thomas said Wednesday.

A carload of 60,000 pounds of sodium chlorate was received recently, and all those farmers who were on the county's list have received their share of the weed killer. There are still several thousand pounds left, the county agent explained.

This is the first year that the county has been able to get this type of permanent killer. Up until now, the county has been using 2-4-D.

Chlorate is only adaptable to small areas, Thomas warned, because it leaves the ground bare for a season, with a consequent danger of blowing. Most farmers are continuing to use 2-4-D on large patches.

The county is also buying three spreaders to apply the chlorate. This type of weed poison is spread dry at a ratio of 640 pounds to the acre. Experience in bind weed control in Kansas has indicated, Thomas explained, that the month of August is the best time to begin using chlorate.

The spreaders are expected to be delivered before August 1, to be ready for use this fall.

## Use of Whitewash On Trees Not Good

Although some people whitewash shade trees as a preventive measure against sun scald, Glen R. Durrell, Oklahoma A. & M. College forestry specialist, thinks whitewash is neither beneficial nor good for the general appearance of trees.

Some authorities believe trees should be whitewashed in the summer months, but Durrell points out that the greatest danger from sun scald comes during the winter months when a cold snap follows a brief warm spell. And even during this time, Durrell questions the value of whitewashing.
