Santa Claus to Be in McLean Saturday

Cage Tournney This Week-End

McLean's first invitation basketball tournament, to be held annually in the future, will be staged here today, Friday, and Saturday, Coach Don Leach, basketball mentor who is in charge of the affair, has announced. The tournament will be held in McLean's new Municipal Building, and is expected to attract a large number of people.

A total of 12 boys' teams and 12 girls' teams have entered in the tournament, and 28 games will be played during the three-day tournament. This includes games in both the championship and consolation brackets.

Several of the teams may desire to have their boys and girls remain all night one of the three nights, Superintendent Logan Cummings said, and all local residents who can care for some of these boys and girls are asked to contact the superintendent. The number of places needed has not been worked out, but it is expected that several of the teams will remain all night one of the three nights.

The games will be broken into six different sessions, with two Thursday, three Friday, and three Saturday. The first session will begin today at 12 o'clock noon.

The final session will be the four championship games—championship and consolation finals for both the boys and girls, and will be held Saturday night beginning at 6 o'clock.

Thursday night's session, with four games, begins at 5:45 o'clock; Friday morning's session, two games, at 9:30; Friday afternoon, four games, at 12:30; Friday night, four games, at 6 o'clock; Saturday morning, two games, 9:30; Saturday afternoon, four games, 12:30; and Saturday night, four games, 6 o'clock.

Christmas Parcels Should Be Mailed Early, Back Says

Postmaster Johnnie Back this week urged all residents to mail their Christmas parcels early to insure prompt and safe delivery. Parcels should be prepared well for mailing, Back explained. Brown wrapping paper should be used, parcels should be addressed plainly, and secure tying is also necessary.

Patrons are also reminded that Christmas cards, unsealed, with destinations outside of McLean, require two cents postage each, instead of the old one and one-half cent charge. Those people having a number of greeting cards to deposit are urged to tie them in bundles with addresses all faced one way before mailing so as to facilitate their handling in the post office.

"You may mark Christmas parcels, 'Do not open 'til Christmas,' 'Merry Christmas,' or similar wording if you so desire," the postmaster explained.

'Freedom Fire' To End Legion 2-Day Program

The "Operation Democracy" program, being sponsored by the local post of the American Legion, will end tonight with the burning of the "Fire of Freedom" on the vacant lot north of the City Hall. The "Fire of Freedom" will be a huge bonfire, and will be ignited, of course, only if the weather permits.

The lighting of the fire will climax the programs which are being held simultaneously by 777 Legion posts in the state of Texas. Governor Allan Shivers will aid in the final portion of the program by lighting a similar fire on the state capitol grounds.

This afternoon will be devoted here in McLean to a general cemetery working, and all residents are invited to be at the cemetery and aid in the winter clean-up. J. C. Claborn of the Claborn Funeral Home will have a tent set up at the cemetery, and coffee will be served during the afternoon. This portion of the program may have to be postponed, should the weather be unsuitable for outdoor work.

The first portion of the program was held last night in the American Legion Hall. The program was opened with the regular American Legion opening procedure, followed by the singing of the national anthem. Special songs were given by Bill Day, and also by a group of girls from the McLean High School.

Rev. Buell T. Wells, Baptist pastor, gave the principal address, and the program was concluded with the singing of "God Bless America."

This morning's program was to be held in the Municipal Building, with Paul Kennedy serving as master of ceremonies. Logan Cummings was to serve as song leader.

Three high school girls, Patsy Jones, Mary Ann Back, and Barbara Barrett, were to give readings entitled "I Speak for Democracy." B. F. Shepherd of Amarillo, active in American Legion and Junior Chamber of Commerce work, talked on "Operation Democracy." The singing of "America" was to conclude the program.

Santa Claus, the white-whiskered gent from the North Pole, will arrive in McLean Saturday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock atop the McLean fire truck, ready and prepared to hand out candy to all children of the area.

The time of his arrival here was announced this week by the McLean Lions Club, sponsor of the annual visit of Santa Claus, and plans are underway to give him a gala welcome on his first official pre-Christmas visit of the season.

A large number of children are expected to throng the downtown streets of McLean to welcome Santa—and to receive the candy which he will hand out.

The visit of Santa Claus is one of the activities sponsored each year by the Lions Club. Decorating of the downtown area is another of the activities, and the downtown lights were turned on last week-end. Some damage was done to the decorations by Tuesday's high wind, but the damage has been repaired.

Donations to aid in defraying the expenses of the Christmas activities were being taken up this week by J. C. Claborn, Amos Page, and Bub Smith, Lions Club and American Legion district committee in charge of this portion of the plan and of the annual visit of Santa Claus. The local American Legion is again cooperating with the Lions in the program. The merchants of the city and other individuals each year "chip in" to pay expense of the Christmas activities.

Another portion of the program is the awarding of cash prizes for home and downtown decorations. This year, awards will be given as follows: best outdoor decorations of home (all-around decorations), with first prize of \$10 and second prize of \$5; best decorated window in homes, with first prize of \$10 and second prize of \$5; best decorated window in business houses downtown, with first prize of \$10, and second prize of \$5.

The new Chevrolets will have a more streamlined body, giving the car an ultra-modern appearance on the inside, it was explained. In addition, the interior has been beautified, and a new dash greets the driver. The Chevrolet is again featuring the automatic drive. Powerglide, as optional equipment.

BARR CAN SEE AGAIN

When a man is once blind for a period of 15 months, and then can see again, he has a story to tell.

C. L. (Lee) Barr has that story to tell.

The bandages which were on his right eye last week were removed Friday by his physician in Amarillo, he was fitted with temporary glasses, and he can see again.

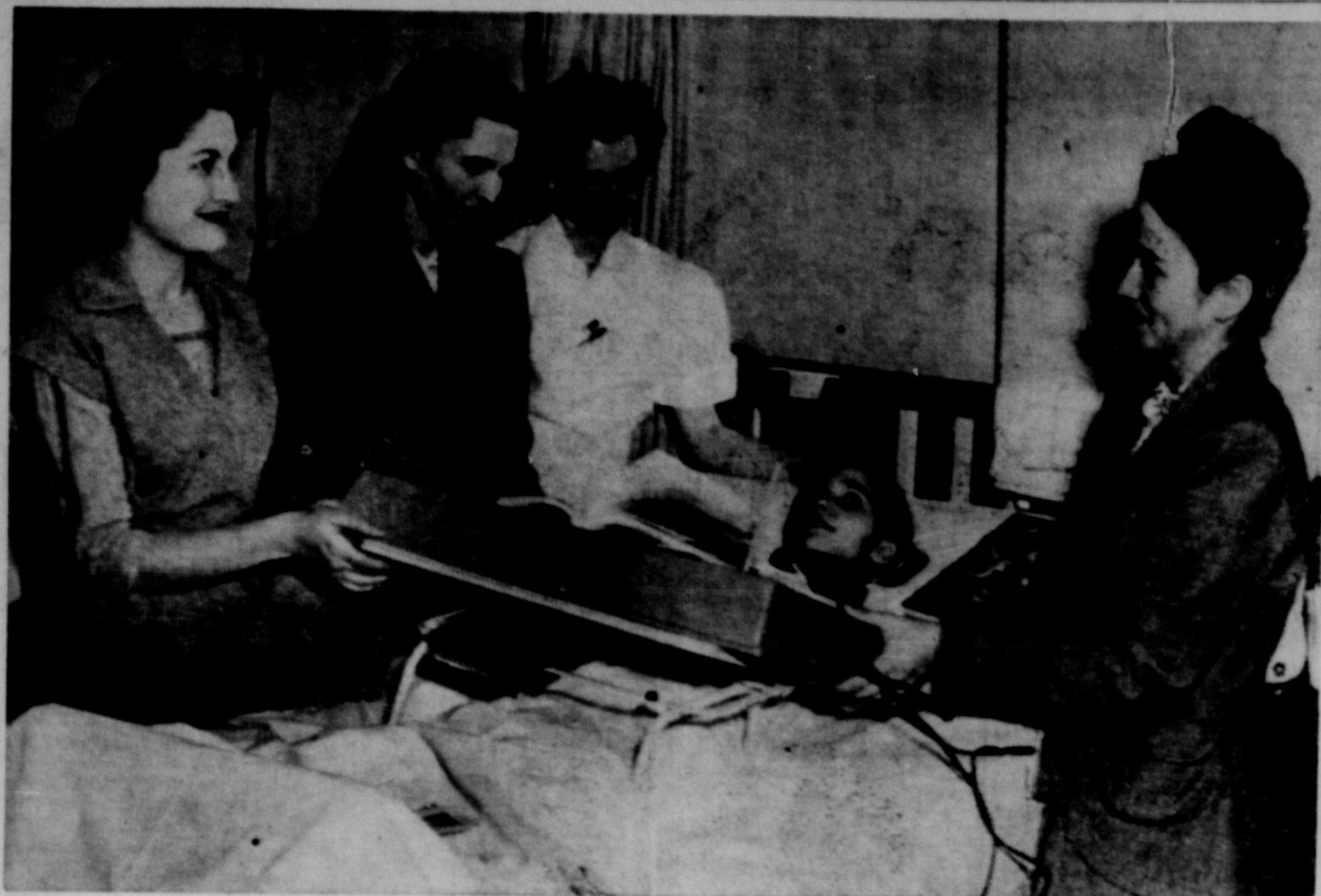
No, he can't see well enough as yet to read a paper, as would a person with normal vision, and he can't drive a car. But by January 1, his doctor says, Lee Barr will have just as good vision in that right eye as most any person. He will have to wear glasses, (and there aren't too many people nowadays who either don't wear them or who should), and he will still have no vision with his left eye. But later he may be able to undergo an operation on that left eye and regain sight in it, too—and he hasn't been able to see from that left eye for 15 years.

"It's a miracle," the doctor exclaimed when he removed the bandage last Friday; and for a moment Mr. and Mrs. Barr were apprehensive. They feared the worst. But it was the best. For that eye had filled out properly (the liquid from the eye ball had to be removed when the eye operation was performed November 14), there were no telltale scars, and even the stitches had disappeared and did not have to be removed.

"The first thing I saw when I looked out from that eye was my little girl, Barbara," Barr said this week. "She looked at me and then ran to her mother saying, 'He can see me, Mama, he can see me.'"

Friday evening, after they had returned home, Barbara spent the entire evening entertaining her daddy, and Barbara is only four years of age. She took each of her toys and showed them to her father, and then modeled five or six of her little dresses. She (Continued on back page)

IT MAKES A DIFFERENCE IF IT AFFECTS YOU

THE HEAD of one of our largest manufacturing concerns (General Motors) recently said, "Our goal should be to have every American a stockholder in business enterprise. Under such circumstances the trend toward socialism can be retarded. It might even be averted. In my opinion management can do much more in the future than it has done in the past, to promote this objective. . . . I asked a group the other day why it was that so many people continue to invest their savings in fixed income dollar securities as distinguished from equities in view of the great depreciation that must take place of necessity in the future if we continue the way we are now going. The answer was that the great body of smaller investors were not familiar with the opportunities to invest otherwise. Management should reveal these opportunities. It should sell their manifest benefits."

At present there are something like 14,000,000 investors in American corporations. Some have many shares, some but a few. But everyone, when he buys stock, regardless of the size of the transaction, becomes one of the owners of the business concerned. He has the right to vote for officers. If the corporation earns a profit and declares dividends, he receives his proportionate share.

The most popular stocks are listed on the stock exchanges of the country. Their value, at any given moment, can be at once determined. They are bought and sold just as any other thing of value is bought and sold. And, contrary to an unhappy misconception, stock exchanges aren't in business to serve the wealthy few, any more than are stockyards for the use of large cattle owners only. They are there to serve the smallest investors no less than the largest.

The widest possible ownership of American industry—all the corporations which provide us with an infinity of goods and services—would do more than anything else to block those who would destroy free enterprise. For no one actually wants to cut off his own nose to spite his face.

LES TALK BY LESTER

Self pity is a damaging thing to one's mind; and often a glance around will eliminate all feelings of self pity.

The other day Jewel Meacham, the hardware man, and I were standing in his store discussing business, which has been pretty slow during these fall months due to the short crop in the area. And we were feeling sorry for ourselves.

About that time a stranger, on crutches, went hobbling by. The man had one leg from the knee down missing. But he didn't seem to mind that a lot.

And Jewel noted that the man was whistling happily as he went by the store.

Both Jewel and I recalled the saying about "feeling bad that I had no shoes until I saw a man who had no feet." That isn't the exact wording, but it gives the general idea.

Then last week I visited with a man who, although he still was not feeling in A-1 condition, was happy. The man I visited was Lee Barr.

Mr. Barr recently underwent an operation which is going to give him vision in one eye, his right eye. So far the operation seems to be a definite success.

Happy is an inadequate word to describe Mr. Barr's state of mind, although he was last week still suffering from a rather acute attack of pneumonia which hit him immediately after the operation.

Mr. Barr, you must understand, has two small daughters, one about four years old, and the other less than a year old. He has never been able to see Barbara, the older daughter, well enough to know what her features look like. And he has been practically totally blind since the birth of the baby.

Oh, what joy he will certainly have when he can see again. I can hardly imagine what his first thoughts will be when once more he can see, when he can proudly look at his two fine little girls, when he can see all the changes which have been made in our little town, in the car models, in so many things, during the days and months and years he has been in darkness.

We all have so much to be thankful for at this season of the year, just after the passing of Thanksgiving and just before the coming of Christmas.

Many of us have suffered reverses during the past year. Perhaps those reverses were of a financial type, perhaps they were reverses of our health, or perhaps we lost someone dear to us. Yet we can still look back and see many, many things for which we should be thankful.

There is always someone worse off than we are, just as there is always someone better off.

It's a good world to live in, if we make it that kind of a world.

As most of you know, McLean will be playing an almost-entirely new bunch of teams in football next year—that is, as far as conference games are concerned. This season, to explain what I mean, we were in District 2-A, in what was known as Class A. Now

there will be a Class 4-A, a Class 3-A, a Class 2-A, a Class A, a Class B, and a six-man football team class.

McLean will be in District 1 of Class A, and our conference opponents in 1951 will be Lefors, Panhandle, White Deer, and Wheeler. Of these five teams, McLean and Lefors were the only ones in Class A. Panhandle, White Deer, and Wheeler have been in the old Class B.

The other four teams in our old district, Shamrock, Wellington, Memphis, and Clarendon, will no longer be conference foes. They are now in Class 2-A. Shamrock will be in district 1 with Dalhart, Dumas, Perryton, and Phillips. Wellington, Clarendon, and Memphis will be in District 3 of that class with Childress and Paducah.

In effect, McLean and Lefors, the two smaller schools of the old district, have been demoted to a lower grade. However, this new Class A, in which McLean will be, will play to a state championship, so it should afford McLean a better chance of winning that state title.

In the future, there will be four state high school champions—4-A, 3-A, 2-A, and A. Class B and six-man football teams will play only to regional titles.

Coach Al Duncan of McLean said it would be good for McLean, in that we would have a better chance to win the state title, or at least to go further in the play-offs.

McLean can, and probably will, still play their old foes of Shamrock, Wellington, Memphis, and Clarendon, for those teams will probably be glad to meet us in non-conference battles. That should keep up the gate receipts to some extent, and help to pay the way of the athletic association.

These classifications will apply to basketball as well as to football.

Perhaps our teams will be better off under the new set-up. I am not qualified to say whether they will be or not. But personally, I always thought McLean gave the other teams around here pretty good competition, and I hate to see us dropped down a notch. Which is what has happened. However, I don't know of anything I can do about it.

Quail Hunting Season Opens

Quail hunters in most of the state may look forward to improved quail hunting this fall, states the executive secretary of the Game, Fish, and Oyster Commission.

The quail hunting season for the state is from December 1 to January 16, both days inclusive, with a bag limit of 12 per day or 36 per week. However, in the 28 county area of the Panhandle, only 10 birds may be taken with a possession limit of 20. West of the Pecos the season is open only during December, and the bag limit is 12, with not more than 24 in possession. There is no open season on Mearns quail.

The executive secretary explains that many counties have special quail laws and urges hunters to check the local regulations before they go hunting.

Wildlife biologists of the Game Department are conducting studies of quail populations through examination of quail wings again this year. The executive secretary requests hunters to cooperate in this work by sending one wing from each bird they kill to the Game, Fish, and Oyster Commission in Austin. A study of quail wings will show the percent of young birds and indicate the production and survival for the year.

To facilitate the mailing of wing collections, the Game Commission will supply special business reply envelopes on request. These provide space for recording pertinent data and require no postage from the hunter. The active help of hunting clubs and other groups is being solicited.

It is essential that wings from cocks and hens be placed in separate envelopes but any number of wings from birds of the same sex may be placed together. Only one wing from each bird should be saved. Date and county of collection are also necessary. If official envelopes are not at hand, any kind of paper sack will suffice if properly labeled.

One further bit of information is requested. In order to compare quail populations in different parts of the state, a place on the wing envelope will be shown for recording the number of coveys found per day of hunting. The executive secretary states that this will also add to the picture of the state quail situation.

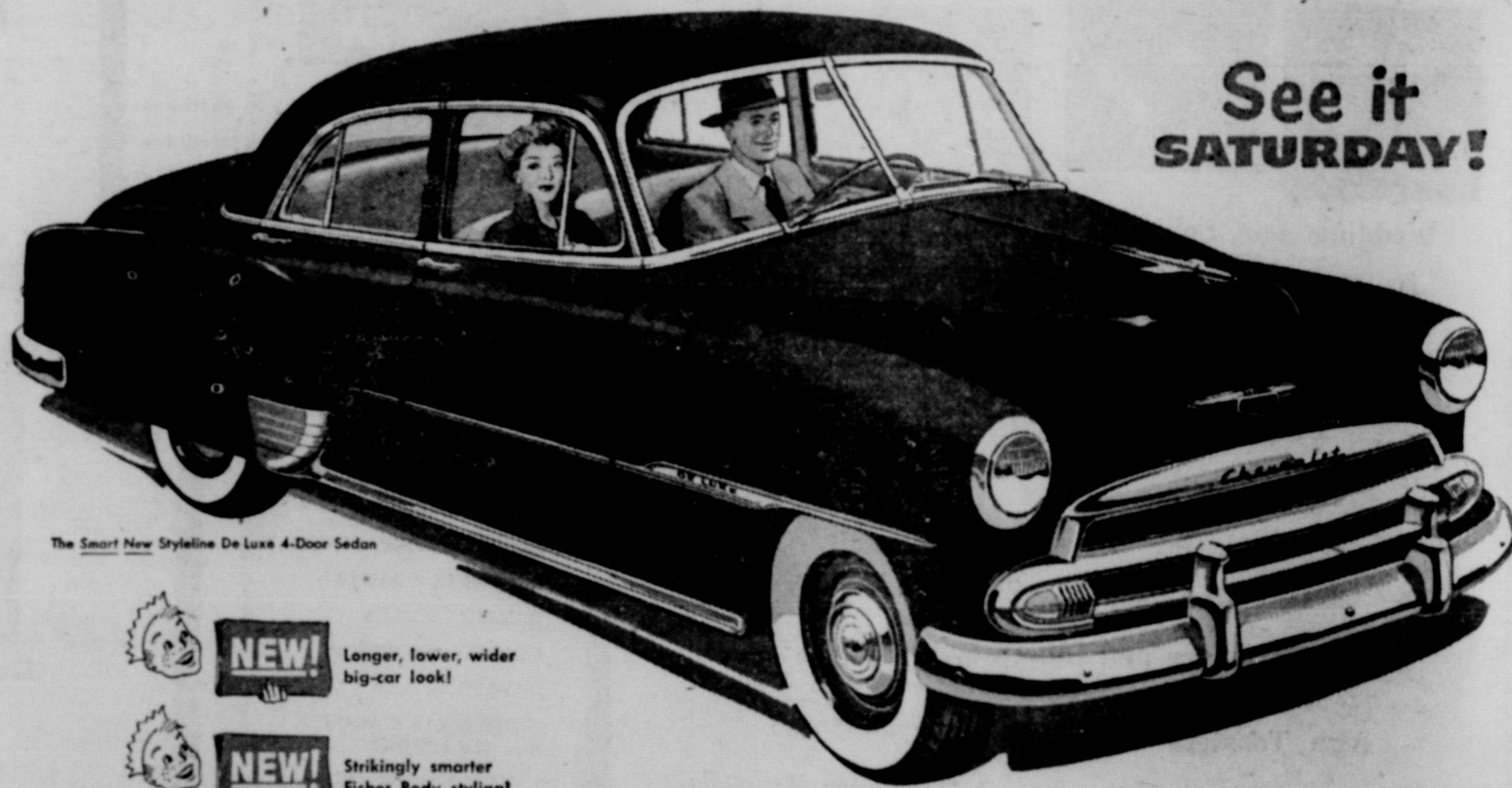

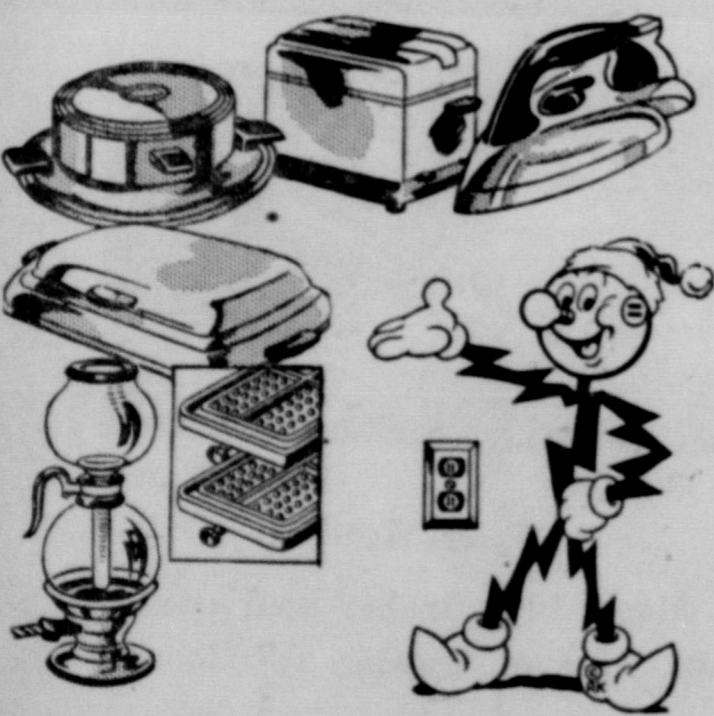

Hughes of Kellerville, who is a paratrooper and made 14 jumps in a previous war and who was in the command and who was in the command, has been called back into service October 1 and is now in Tokyo, Japan. Billie Pete attended high school here, graduating with the class of 1945. He was on the football team while in high school. This is a letter from Billie Pete:

November 22, 1950.
Prov. Co. 133, APO 613
of Postmaster
San Francisco, Calif.

Dear Daddy:
We got here at noon. We are at Camp Drake, near Tokyo. Actually it would be 9:00 p. m. the 24th in the States. I don't know how sure what we will do. I think we will be here 46 hours, or that is what they told us. Everything is a Kowa seems like it is about over with but they will probably get us over anyway. We left San Francisco November 10 about 1:30 o'clock. It took us 11 1/2 days to get here. It took me 26 days to come over in 1945 when I was in the Merchant Marines. I forgot about your birthday until I was on the ship. I was about broke when I left Camp Suisun, Calif., but I sent you a telegram just after I got here. We came over on the U. S. Walker. There were about 2300 soldiers on the ship. I made the trip just fine, never got sick or anything. There is not much to write about the trip because nothing happened. We didn't see any land, ships or anything. The water was pretty choppy all the way but it was not stormy. There is no need to send me a Christmas package because I can't have room to carry anything except what I have to have. I have a wrist watch now. Oh, pa, I forgot to tell you that I got two letters and a card from you when I first got here. They give us the mail on the train from Yokohama. One was dated November 14.

Where is Monroe Combs now? I think they discarded the point system after the election. I heard the fellows with 20 points or more

would have to leave three days after we did, although they were not supposed to.

Well, I can't write here very well as everyone is talking and making so much noise, so I guess I had better close. I'll write again in a few days. I have not had time to re-read any of my letters yet.
