Have butcher clean chicken for roasting. Sprinkle inside with salt and pepper. Place 2 tablespoons margarine inside chicken and crushed garlic, if used. Dot outside of chicken with remaining 2 tablespoons margarine and place breast side down in roasting pan. Combine lemon juice or dry white wine with water and pour gently over chicken. Cover with brown paper and roast in moderate oven (350° F.), allowing 30 minutes per pound. Baste occasionally (about every 15-20 minutes) with 1 tablespoon water. Remove paper during last 20 minutes of cooking to brown chicken, Serve on platter with side dish of gravy. Serves 4.

Gravy: Combine pan juices with 1/2 teaspoon tomato paste and ¼ cup water, and heat slowly.

Do you expect to work during the Christmas holidays? It so, you will need a social security card, and here are facts the Social Security Administration would like for you to know.

It you go to work for wages in private business or industry, you must show your social security card to your employer promptly. If you have never had a social security card and are going to need one soon, or if you have lost your social security card, you should go to the local post office and get an application. Fill it out and mail it to the Social Security Administration, Amarillo, Texas. You will receive your card in just a few days.

Be sure you always have just one social security number. See that your employer copies your name and number from the card each new place you go to work. Then when you or your family apply for payments based on your social security account there will be no delay. Do not apply for a card unless you are fairly sure to need it. Then get one promptly.

Tests of Soil For Fertilizers Now Available

have not had their soil tested for the City of Pampa, at which the correct fertilizers for various time and place all parties interfield crops can get this service ested in the Account for Final (SEAL) from the Extension Service soil testing laboratories of Texas A. and M. College.

H. M Breeclove, county agent for Donley County, says that this laboratory is maintained for the purpose of soil testing and the support of the force in the laboratory is by a fee of \$1 per soil sample sent to the laboratory. One pint of top soil and one pint of sub soil is all that is necessary to send in. The check should accompany

the soil samples and should be made out to the Texas A. and M. College Soil Testing Laboratory. Breedlove says that he will be glad to help anyone prepare the samples for shipping and give them any further information that they might need. Soil samples from different types of soils in Donley County have been tested and a chart is available in the office of the county agent. In some cases

MORE THAN A YEAR AGO, the Lions Club of Van Nuys, Calif., took a definite stand on the growing trend toward more and more government-owned businesses. This stand was the proposal of a 23rd amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America which would prohibit the government from entering into any business in competition with private enterprise.

The American Progress Foundation, a tax exempt non-profit corporation of Los Angeles, Calif., is furthering the attempt to get something along these lines done.

The proposed amendment would read something like this: "The government of the United States shall not engage in any business, professional, commercial, or industrial enterprise in competition with its citizens except as specified in the Constitution, nor shall the Constitution or the laws of any state, or the laws of the United States, be subject to the terms of any foreign or domestic

agreement which would abrogate this amendment." Provision would be made for the liquidation of present properties of the federal government over a certain period of time.

Perhaps you had not given much thought to the trend, but it is most amazing, and most of the government businesses have been started since the beginning of the first term of Franklin D.

At the present time, the U. S. government owns nearly a hundred corporations, some of them termed as bureaus and administrations, which are direct competitors to privately-owned businesses. Let's get one thing straight-a private corporation is not a big, black wolf, but instead is simply a huge partnership affair with hundreds, thousands, or millions of people like you holding shares in its ownership. Then when the government enters into some type of business against these private corporations, you may be one who is affected. Your money was invested in these private stocks to bring you returns, but your own government has gone into business against you with your money without your consent, and your dividends in the private corporations usually begin to dwindle.



A Pretty Finish For A Pretty Dinner



For a holiday or any day that deserves a special dessert, make this pretty parfait with creamy tapioca pudding and whole cranberry sauce.

Literally a parfait is a frozen dessert. But we don't have to be literal all the time; we can make a beautiful and delicious parfait with well-chilled creamy tapioca pudding and any fruit and sauce we like. Pic-tured is a colorful parfait of tapioca pudding layered with whole cranberry sauce. While festive in appearance this dessert is pleasingly light, the perfect finish for a holiday dinner.

1 egg white 2 tablespoons sugar 1 egg yolk

2 or 3 tablespoons sugar

3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca 1/2 teaspoon vanilla 2/4 cup whole cranberry sauce

Beat egg white until foamy throughout; add 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, and continue beating with rotary egg beater until mixture will stand in very soft peaks. Set aside.

Mix egg yolk with small amount of the milk in saucepan. Add 2 or 3 tablespoons sugar, salt, quick-cooking tapioca, and remaining milk. Place over medium heat. Cook until mixture comes to a boil, stirring

Pour small amount of hot mixture gradually on egg-white meringue; blend. Add remaining mixture, stirring constantly. (The hotter the tapioca and the faster it is blended in, the thicker the pudding will be.) Add vanilla. Cool, stirring once after 15 to 20 minutes. Chill. Serve in parfait glasses, alternating layers of pudding and cranberry sauce. fold sauce into pudding, mixing only enough to give a marbled act. Garnish with additional sauce if desired. Makes 5 servings.
