BAND SECOND, FLOAT THIRD AT SHAMROCK

Annual St. Pat's Day Parade Attracts Hundreds of Visitors

McLean's float, using the theme "Our American Heritage," took third place in the community services division of the St. Patrick's Day parade in Shamrock Wednesday morning.

The McLean High School Tiger Band was named the second best band at the festivities, and won a first division rating in concert and second division in sight-reading.

The float, a project of the city, the Lions Club and Junior Chamber of Commerce, was the first entered in the annual parade in several years.

Using a scene from the recent junior high school "American Heritage Week" pageant, Mrs. Jerry Gilbert and Mrs. Creed Lamb designed the float. The idea for the theme came from Mrs. Vera Back, junior high teacher who wrote and directed the American Heritage Week program.

Featured was the Statue of Liberty, surrounded by Uncle Sam, a flagbearer and several youngsters in the roles of immigrants. Also on the float was Jan Bailey, McLean Lions Club sweetheart who was the local entry in the Miss Irish Rose contest. Picked as Miss Irish Rose was Linda Weems of Wheeler.

Hundreds of persons braved the near-freezing temperatures to participate in and watch the parade down Shamrock's Main Street. The Tiger Band, directed by Herb Germer, was one of the numerous bands in the hour-long procession. The Panhandle High School Band was selected as the best in the competition. Germer said this morning he was well pleased with the band's showing. Judges had the highest praise for the local musicians, and offered some "very constructive" criticism, Germer said.

Savings Bond Sales \$31,297 in January

January savings bond sales in Gray County totaled \$31,297, according to George B. Cree Jr., county Pampa, chairman of the county bond committee.

This represents 4.9 per cent of the county's 1965 goal of \$630,000. During January the sales of Series E and H bonds in Texas totaled \$14,311,691, or 9.3 per cent of the state goal of \$152.8 million.

Just Between Us

If your hair stood on end when resident Johnson said during his revised speech the other night at his new voting law would seek to regulate elections on the "state and local" levels... welcome to the club.

We'll go along with the argument offered by Rep. Water Rogers and handful of other legislators, when they pointed out that the United States Constitution already guarantees the freedom to vote.

Why, then, are more laws needed? Or has our Constitution been amended so full of holes by recent Supreme Court decisions it is no longer effective, as some "one world government" advocates suggest?

We wouldn't for one minute condemn the action of Alabama officers who have used clubs and teargas to break up voter registration demonstrations.

Still, an officer has the authority to use any means at his disposal to enforce the law. And the law said there was to be no march. A court injunction had been issued ordering the Negroes and their righteous white supporters from the North not to march. The demonstrators attempted to defy the court, and they knew full well that the consequences could be.

Doesn't it seem a little strange to you that Martin Luther King, the Negro leader, should be awarded the Nobel Peace Prize when violence follows him everywhere he goes?

When his followers are encouraged to break one law, why should they think it's all right to break any other they choose to?

Paul Harvey, noted columnist and radio commentator, had much to say on this very subject in a broadcast we heard last Saturday. Harvey said the Negro is going so far, and support for his cause is beginning to fade, as he demands not equal status with the white man, but much more.

As an example, Harvey noted that Negroes are now picketing General Motors Corp. plants for what they call prejudicial employment practices in favor of the whites.

Percentagewise, the Negro race makes up approximately nine percent of the United States' population. (See JBU, Page 7)

RAINS HELP, MORE NEEDED

.49 Inch Measured Thursday, Friday

Two days of slow rain late last week improved the moisture picture considerably in this area, although much more is needed on the pastures and cropland.

Rainfall last Thursday amounted to .35 inch, and .14 more came to the city on Friday. Gauges on some farms and ranches in the area measured even more.

This brings to 1.15 inches the total moisture received in McLean this year, barely more than one-third the 3.39 which had fallen by the same date in 1964.

Weathermen are predicting, however, that much wetter days are ahead.

Low temperature for the week ending Wednesday was 31 degrees recorded on Monday. Thermometers plunged lower though, Wednesday night and early this morning snow was falling.

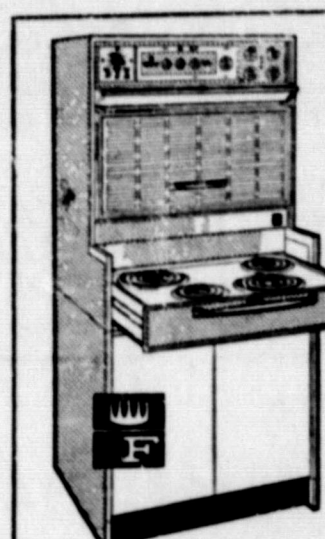

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

WHY CALL ME LORD, LORD Luke 6:46

If we are once saved, will we always be saved? That is a good question, isn't it? In I Cor. 9: 26-27 the Apostle Paul seems to have been worried about becoming lost again when he said, "But I keep under my body, and bring it into subjection: lest that by any means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a cast-away."

Let us read in First Corinthians the tenth chapter Verses 1-12. Here Paul tells us how God's children, the children of Israel, sinned and were lost or destroyed, and says these things were written for our admonition, and if we think we can't fall, we had better take heed to these things he has told us about the children of Israel, lest we fall.

In Genesis 2:15-17, God told man not to eat of the tree of knowledge of good and evil, for if he did he would surely die, but here came the old devil and for the first time preached the doctrine **once saved always saved**. God said you would die if you ate, but not so, go on and eat. You will not die. Yes, you are saved; go on and sin, you can't be lost.

In Luke the 15th chapter Verses 11-32, we have the parable of the Prodigal Son. A certain man had two sons. Here we have God the Father represented, and two children of God represented. We notice that the younger son left his father and wasted his money on harlots, but he came back and said to his father: I have sinned against Heaven and in thy sight. A child of God can have God the Father and waste his money on harlots and sin against God. The older son complained about the father making a feast for the younger son, but the father told the older son: This thy brother was **dead**, and is alive again; and was **lost**, and is found.

Yarborough's "Shame on you, George Wallace," aimed at Alabama's governor, was the most hilarious statement to come out of the entire Selma mess.

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Beef Cattle Meeting Slated in Hereford; Area People Invited

A beef cattle meeting will be held Friday, March 26, at the Hereford bull barn, and Gray and Donley County cattlemen are invited to attend, according to Donley County Agent Ronald Gooch.

The session is to begin at 9:15 a.m. Dr. Jan Bonsma, professor in animal husbandry at Pretoria University in South Africa and currently a visiting professor at Texas A and M University, will be the featured speaker.

Dr. Bonsma will speak and demonstrate on the subject "Selecting Cattle for Functional Efficiency."

Since 1937, Dr. Bonsma has measured an average of 800 cows a year and has correlated the external measurements with a rating of the animals' fertility or their calf-raising ability.

L. A. Maddox Jr., animal husbandman for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, also will appear on the program to discuss "Improving Present Breeding Programs by Selecting for Functional Efficiency."

Gooch said he had seen Dr. Bonsma demonstrate the selection of cows and heifers that will wean a heavy calf each year, and how to pick out the loafers and poor producers.

"All cattlemen should enjoy this program and pick up some useful information that will be helpful to them in managing their cow herd," Gooch said.

Cattlemen planning to attend should contact Gooch at the county agent's office in Claremore, so that transportation can be pooled.

Gooch also reported that many Donley County farmers have been taking soil samples the past few weeks.

"If you have not had a soil test run on your field recently, \$2 for a soil test would be money well spent, particularly on irrigated crops," the county agent said.

Soil sample bags and information sheets can be picked up at the county agent's office, or persons who desire may telephone the office and have the bags and sheets mailed to them.

Sign-Up Period For Domestic Cotton Pay To End on March 26

The sign-up period for domestic cotton payment will end on March 26, Miss Evelyn Mason, manager of the Gray County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office, has reminded area farmers.

Miss Mason explained that if a farmer's domestic cotton allotment is the same as the regular cotton allotment, he does not have to sign in advance.

If the domestic cotton is smaller than the regular allotment, the producer must sign by March 26 to receive the domestic payment.

Requirements for domestic payment are to sign in advance, plant within the domestic cotton allotment and stay within the feed grain base on the farm.

The feed grain sign-up period for 1965 also ends on March 26. In addition, this is the date for farmers to revise their 1965 wheat intentions if they signed up in the wheat program last fall.

The 1965 feed grain program is about the same as in 1964, except that wheat can be substituted for feed grain, or feed grain for wheat.

Other deadlines coming up: March 31, to redeem wheat or grain sorghum under CCC loan; April 30, to apply for CCC price support on 1964 cotton.
