The other day I received a letter from a friend in Pusan, Korea, that has been causing me to lose a lot of sleep ever since. He had just returned

sleep ever since. He had just returned to his quarters after watching a group of wounded and disabled American veterans being sent back to hospitals in Japan and to the United States. "I wonder if you people back home really appreciate what these boys have sacrificed in order that you can live a normal, peaceful life," he wrote. "All of these casualties are young men—some merely teen-age kids.

"All of these casualties are young men—some merely teen-age kids. They came from a comfortable home, just like yours. They were born with the expectation of living out a natural life in good surroundings. They didn't hesitate to go half way around the world to fight for decency and democratic ideals in a stinking hell-hole. And now they are coming back to you—but not as they left! "Some are blind. Others have an arm or a leg gone. Still others have

Living costs have risen 17 per cent since the outbreak of the Korean war, yet disabled veterans are receiving loss componention than the Korean war, yet disabled veteralis are receiving less compensation than they did 50 years ago! The 1950 average monthly payments per vet-eran was \$34.00 as compared with \$65.00 in 1900. The DAV advocates the freezing of medical personnel within the Vet-

of medical personnel within the Vet-erans Administration as well as leg-islation providing for a five-year fedislation providing for a five-year fed-eral aid program in medical education to increase the number of doctors, dentists and nurses for VA hospitals. They also would like to see the 1,600 hospital beds amputated from the VA by presidential order last year returned in order to adequately take care of the Korean wounded now Streaming back to the states. A recent DAV survey revealed that at least 500 million work hours

annually can be made available to ease the current shortage of labor industry by utilizing an estimated 250,000 disabled veterans, now un-employed. Of course we know a war is going on. Aren't taxes sky high? Naturally we keep up with the Korean conflict in a hazy sort of way. Let's see now. How many casualties have we suffered so far? A




