sharp cut in welfare and assistance payments, effective April 1, was announced by the State Board of Welfare.

He said the unprecedented increase in federal medical aid and the constitutional ceiling required an average \$11 a month cut in the families with dependent children program and a 20 percent slash in Medicaid.

Board member Louis R. Sarafort of Fort Worth said there is no alternative.

Board member W. Baker of Houston warned further cuts may be in the offing before the end of the period next year.

He ordered the lowering of payments from 75 per cent per cent of budget needs, to 37.5 per cent. Reductions will reduce this to \$109.54 a month.

He said the loudest protest from Texas nursing home operators who claimed Medicaid pay shrinkage would put 95 percent of them out of business.

He said the situation is "preposterous" and urged Preston Smith to take immediate action to summon lawyers into special session for agency appropriations.

He said the Texas Medical Association urged the federal government to promise more than it can pay in the health care area.

He said, in effect, asking for services to take a loss. He said the 20-year-old veterans program has folded. Through more than 41,000 Texas veterans had purchased land under interest-free, long-term payments. It was a victim of interest rates.

He said the prime interest rate has risen to eight and a half percent, veterans' bonds, and institutional four and a half percent, simply could not continue to attract investors.

He said more than 1,000 applications for insurance will be processed, but more can be accepted until interest-rate bind eases.

He said the insurance company can be sued to foot the damage bill for accidents that occur before the contract is actually written - if the contract already had been written without either applicant or company knowing of a loss.

He said the Supreme Court has held, in a 5-4 decision, that the Court of Civil Appeals fast on its January 21 ruling on the Alcoholic Beverage Commission's proposed rules for private drinking clubs, including guest card regulations.

He said the Antiquities Committee, charged with regulating those dig for historic treasures in the state, has set its rules and its first permit.

He said the rules require that any person seeking to excavate or remove archaeological historical and scientific remains are the major points in the rule.

He said the committee deleted from its proposal that beachcombers and arrowhead hunters would get state permits. They are, however, required to report on their discoveries.

He said the Board of Higher Education requested by the institution asked for \$206.3 million for state senior colleges for the biennium, apart from increases. Board approval of \$66.8 million in additional funding for the state's higher education system.

Texas Hunting Accidents Kill 24 in 1969

Hunting accidents killed 24 persons in Texas during 1969, according to reports from game management officers for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

In 92 hunting accidents reported, 142 persons were involved, of which 69 were 21 years of age, and 40 were 16 years of age or younger.

In three of the accidents, the shooter injured two victims with one shot.

Rifles were involved in 48 of the accidents, shotguns in 34, and handguns in 10. Self-inflicted wounds were reported for 40 of the 92 accidents.

No accidents were reported among archery hunters.

By comparison, 170 persons were involved in 106 accidents, 37 of them fatal, in 1968. Forty-nine of the accidents involved shotguns; 45 rifles; and 12 handguns. Sub-adults -- either victims or shooters -- numbered 101 in the 1968 accidents, and 60 of these were 16 years of age or younger.

PANHANDLE ECONOMIC PROGRAM

Two more area meetings are being planned by the appropriate committee of the Panhandle Economic Program.

A conference with the theme "money in hogs" has been planned for March 24 at Holiday Inn West in Amarillo. It will start at 1:30 p. m. Some of the top experts on hogs have been selected to be on the program.

The other conference is on marketing and is scheduled for March 3rd. It will also be at Holiday Inn West in Amarillo. Starting time is 9:00 a. m.

CATTLE ON FEED REPORT

A six state cattle on feed report was released recently on the cattle feeding situation as of February 1st. A slow down of placements and numbers on feed appears to be taking shape. Although Texas has 30 percent more on feed than a year earlier.

In the six major cattle feeding states there were eight percent more on feed Feb. 1 than a year earlier. Placements in January were four percent fewer than a year earlier. There were two percent more marketed in Jan. that a year earlier. The report was considered favorable.

Qualified voters in the McLean Independent School District will go to the polls on Monday, March 2, to make a decision on \$450,000 in bonds which has been requested by the Board of Trustees. According to recent Federal Court Rulings, every qualified voter, whether he is a property owner or not, must be allowed to vote in the bond election. A qualified voter is one who has resided in Texas one year, Gray, Wheeler or Collingsworth Counties (within the boundaries of McLean ISD) six months; and holds a voter registration certificate. This is one of the most important decisions to the future of our schools and it is absolutely vital that patrons and taxpayers be informed on the issues of this election.

The funds from the proposed bonds will be used to remodel the existing gymnasium and build new high school facilities. The decision to build new high school facilities was based on such factors as the cost of remodeling, educational changes, upgrading of standards, passage of time, maintenance neglect, improvement of design and other factors that make many school buildings inefficient and obsolete for modern education.

The Board of Trustees of McLean Independent School District feel the need for these improvements in our school system is not only unquestionable but also imperative. They realize it is their duty to present these needs and ask only that you attend the meeting Tuesday, February 24, appraise the information presented and ask any questions you have concerning the bond issue.

A public meeting will be held at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, February 24, in the high school auditorium for the purpose of explaining the needs of the McLean Independent School District to patrons and taxpayers.

Everyone is urged to attend the meeting and to voice whatever questions you may have regarding the upcoming bond election.

### 22 Rural Accidents In Gray County During January

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 22 accidents on rural highways in Gray County during the month of January, according to Sergeant J. L. Dalrymple, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons killed, 14 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$16,620.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock DPS Region for Jan. 1970 shows a total of 460 accidents resulting in 15 persons killed, 188 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$648,408 as compared to January 1969 of 447 accidents resulting in 26 persons killed, 260 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$424,881.

The Sergeant reminded all motor vehicle owners that still have their inspection stickers on the lower right-hand side of their windshields that April 15 is the deadline for having the new sticker placed on the lower left-hand side of their windshields. The Sergeant also stated only about 33 per cent of the registered vehicles in the surrounding area have been inspected.

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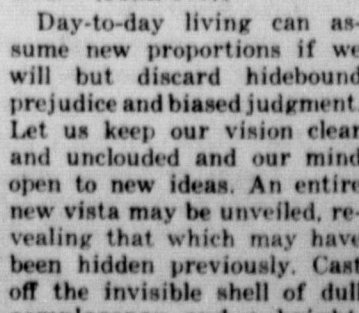

### Caution Urged As Children Travel To School

School bells are ringing and all motorists should remember their own ABC's of driving where school children are likely - Always Be Careful.

And the area where children are likely to be, tends far beyond the so-called school zone.

In general, school zone signs are posted about 500 feet in advance of the school as a warning and as a protection for children who must cross the street to get to school. These signs cannot - and do not - provide any protection for large numbers of children who will be walking along the streets - and crossing them - several blocks from the school. The protection of these children is primarily the responsibility of each driver.

Also, watch out for school buses. Know the laws pertaining to school buses in the area where you are driving. And be careful about passing regular buses which are stopped.

Children who ride school buses are usually taught to cross in front of the bus, since traffic normally halts for a stopped school bus. Sometimes, however, when these same children ride in regular buses, they for-

get and walk in front of those vehicles, too.

The following suggestions for dealing safely with school buses are offered.

1. Don't follow a school bus too closely. Leave yourself room to stop safely when the bus stops.
2. Check following traffic when you stop (a good rule to follow all the time). If a driver behind you is coming up too fast, pump your brakes to flash your stoplights and pull to your right.

3. Don't be too quick to try to pass a school bus. Passing a school bus requires more care than ever.

4. In the morning, watch for children standing along the roadside. They mean a school bus will be coming along soon.

And after school hours and on weekends, watch out for children at play. Children are always going to do the unexpected. They are going to chase after that ball; they are going to dart out from between parked cars. So anytime we drive in the cities and towns, we have to watch out for them.

Texas' new breath test, used to test motorists "suspected" of drinking while driving, could save your life or license, says the Texas Safety Association.

The breath test can tell the difference between a drunken driver and one who is legally sober.

### Dallas Firm Named To Rate County

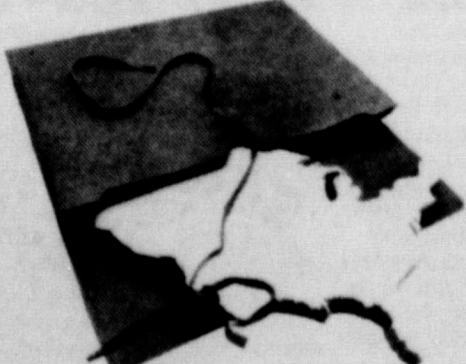

A--The Vice-President of the United States, a governor or any other official chosen by the voters of an entire state, a member of Congress, or of a state legislature, and a federal or state judge of a court of record. Ten more swinging panels have already been spoken for. If you, your family, club, church, etc. would like to be represented on one of these in the museum, you should contact us soon.

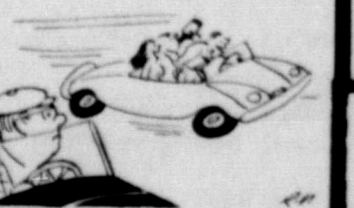

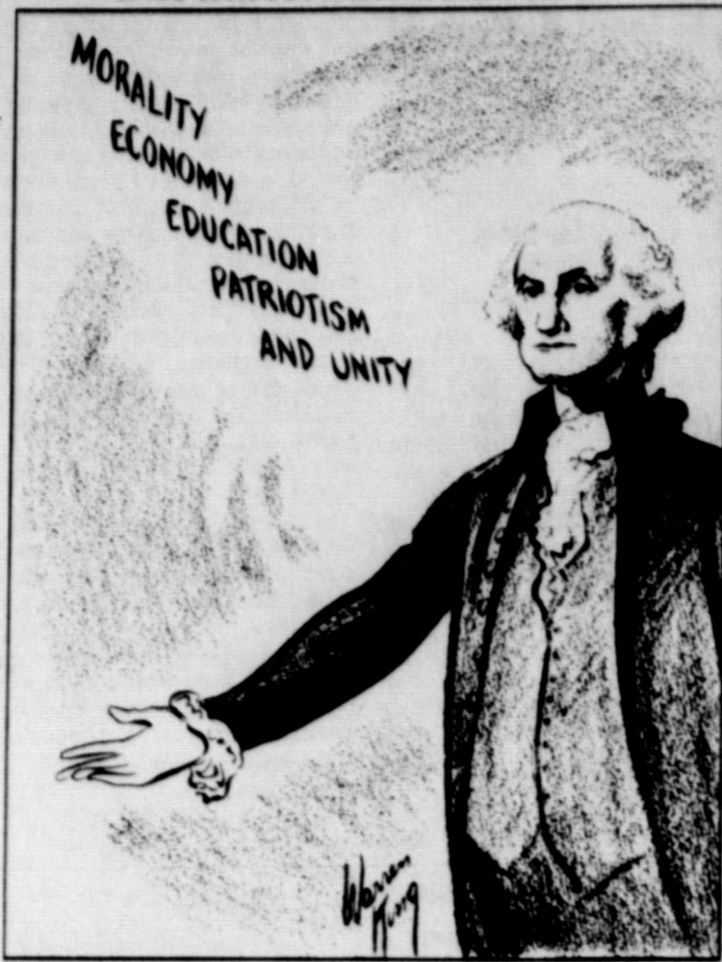

## INSPIRATIONAL GUIDELINES



### A PROPHETIC STATESMAN

George Washington not only provided superb leadership to make our embryonic republic work, but guidelines which are still timely and sound. This is particularly true of his Farewell Address which he used to give advice for the future. This future still has not been fully realized and many of his words can serve as a challenge today.

For example, in administering the affairs of the

new government of the United States he urged "efficient management" with "as much vigor as is consistent with the perfect security of liberty." He said, "Liberty itself will find in such a government, with powers properly distributed and adjusted, its surest guardian."

He valued religion highly, saying, "It is substantially true that virtue or morality is a necessary spring of popular government." Our first President also emphasized the need for education when he said that, "In proportion as the structure of a government gives force to public opinion, it is essential that public opinion should be enlightened."

He also saw the need for government economy, expressing his opinion that public credit should be cherished as an important source of strength and security. "One method of preserving it," he said, "is to use it as sparingly as possible, avoiding occasions of expense by cultivating peace, but remembering also that timely disbursements to prepare for danger frequently prevent much greater disbursements to repel it."

When he talked about the need for patriotism he showed both eloquence and wisdom:

"Citizens, by birth or choice, of a common country, that country has a right to concentrate your affections. The name of American, which belongs to you in your national capacity, must always exalt the just pride of patriotism more than any appellation derived from local discrimination. With slight shades of difference, you have the same religion, manners, habits, and political principles. You have in a common cause fought and triumphed together; the independence and liberty you possess are the work of joint councils, and joint efforts of common dangers, sufferings, and successes."

Truly his words retain their validity as we seek answers to the problems of our day.
