State Capital NEWS

Top Texas officials have agreed on general outlines of a plan to combat the rising problem of drug abuse.

Gov. Preston Smith, Lt. Gov. Barnes, Atty. Gen. Crawford, C. Martin and House Speaker Mutschler are united in a wide concentration of efforts. A plan was announced after meeting of the four in Smith's office last week. Texas Justice will serve as coordinator of law enforcement efforts which will be called on to and dry up the sources of drug supplies.

Top priority is given a "total effort" campaign for youth, police, teachers and law enforcement personnel on drug cases and possible solutions to the problem.

Task forces will be named to develop effective concepts and programs in enforcement education.

Deputies agreed on this immediate-action program: one-day seminars for Texas' officers and prosecutors, exchange of vital information with Mexico.

Assistance through the Justice Council to implement police education.

Review of successful narcotics programs in other states. Greater assistance to local law enforcement and prosecuting agencies in evidence analysis.

Gathering of statistics in major cities on drug-related crime. Creation of a model drug information office.

Narcotics strike force will attempt to explore causes of drug use and to evaluate drug research and rehabilitation programs as well as to implement educational programs.

Texas Highway Dept. Receives Bids On Construction

The Texas Highway Department recently received bids on a new highway construction project in Gray County. The project will consist of constructing base and surfacing on a previously graded section along a five mile section of ranch to market road 2857 east of Lakeston.

Ivan Dement, Inc., of Amarillo was the low bidder at \$119,000. The construction engineering will be handled by the Pampa office of the Texas Highway Department under the supervision of Mr. T. R. Kelley, senior resident engineer.

Officials of the Texas Highway Department and Ivan Dement, Inc., stated that this construction would begin March 2nd and that it should be completed by May.

Mr. Kelley stated that traffic would be routed through the project during construction. Motorists passing through are requested to use extreme caution and to watch for barricades and warning signs which will be prominently displayed. Every effort will be made to minimize inconveniences. In the interest of safety, cooperation of the public is sincerely requested, Kelley said.

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The service improvement applies to persons served out of 18,700 first, second and third class post offices over the country that do not have city delivery services. Affected are those postal customers living more than a quarter mile away from these offices and less than half a mile away.

Persons living less than half a mile away, persons living less than half a mile away previously had not been provided this service. To get this new service it is only necessary that those living in the eligible areas ask their postmasters to provide it, and a majority of those to be served must want the home service.

Under Mr. Blount's order, those living less than a quarter mile from the post office will continue to pick up their mail at these offices.

"But, the postmaster noted, that's no more than a few blocks. This order, however, will make the home deliveries available wherever desired by the majority of those living beyond a quarter mile."

"This distance factor can be significant for much of the year in areas where severe weather conditions prevail, in areas where large numbers of older persons are living, or in more remote sections where even a little distance may mean a lot in terms of travel difficulties."

The expansion of services should be virtually complete in all of the affected delivery service areas - under actions taken by postal regional offices, acting on recommendations of local postmasters by Feb. 1, 1971.

It will be accomplished principally by adding delivery steps to already existing rural delivery routes, or by expanding the area served by some shorter rural routes for the purpose, and, a limited number of new rural routes may also be needed in other instances.

The fact that fewer persons will be calling at post offices for their mail will not alter the independent status of any of the post offices where the service change is provided.

Any one qualified to receive this home delivery must put up a box for mail to be placed in by the rural carrier. To receive this service the majority of the people in this area must request it.

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Coordinated law enforcement will first be called on to dry up the sources of major drugs.

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State officials will meet here March 13 with aides to U. S. Gen. John Mitchell. They will explore federal support possibilities under remedial programs the uniform controlled dangerous substances act now being passed.

ROADS PROPOSED

A surprise session with the Interstate Commission, the Turnpike Authority proved that preliminary studies made for the development of a massive toll road network limited to cost more than \$5 million.

Last year the Legislature authorized the agency, subject to the Highway Department's mission, to spend money for investigating the feasibility of additional pay-road projects. Preliminary studies will take nine months. Feasibility studies may follow where reasonable promise is shown for the projects.

WELFARE CRISIS AVERTED

Welfare Board cancelled its April 1 cuts in aid to needy families and medical assistance. Governor Smith ordered \$5 million in medical school building funds shifted to welfare.

Deputy Welfare Commissioner Herbert Wilson said the fund infusion will run programs at present levels through August and maybe longer.

Cuts of 12 per cent in Aid to Families With Dependent Children and 2 per cent medical aid had been ordered for April 1. Order the transfer to make the reduction unnecessary.

Wilson also directed strengthening of the welfare program administration and a step-up in rehabilitation efforts.

GENERAL RULES

Internal and veterans organizations operating clubs and service alcoholic beverages are subject to sale tax as ultimate containers for mix, beverage, ice cream, etc., says Attorney General Martin in a new opinion.

However, Martin said, the "clubs" are not subject to the sales tax when incorporated into alcoholic beverage sold to guest and members.

Other recent opinions, Martin concluded that: A Maricopa Mayor J. Ernest could not automatically resign as mayor when he announced his candidacy for Rancho County Judge.
