Sam always I do not know where Pearl picked cotton every fall and received her education and often picked over 600 pounds academic training, but I have a feeling (being myself the ninth child in a pioneer preacher's family) that her inspiration came from her father who was on the road so much of the time administering to the souls of the various congregations, but that her interest in humanity, her reverence of God and man. her love for all things good and beautiful must have come mostly from a loving, uncomplaining mother, who cared for the physical needs of her brood and "led them in paths of righteousness." Only one more child joined the Roberts family after Pearl. She was a little sister, now Mrs. May Gray, the only surviving member of the once large family. Mrs. Gray, her husband, and two sons were here for Sunday's services. Pearl Elizabeth Roberts was married to W. E. (Will) Bogan in 1907 and soon afterwards came to visit Will's sister Dolly and her husband, Sam Morse, out on the Triangle Ranch on Northfork River, about fifteen miles north of McLean. Many who read this will recall Pearl's vivid description of that visit last year when she was guest writer of this column. Pearl and Will made several other trips to McLean to visit his parents the C. E. Bogans, who lived on the spot where Elton and Maggie Johnston built their new home. They did not make this their home until in 1926. In 1912, while on one of those visits, Pearl was greatly surprised at the ability of S. B. Morse (six years old) and his little sister Minnie (five) to read, do their num bers, and entertain with songs and poetry. She wondered where, in these wide open spaces, these children learned to be so clever. The Morses gave the credit to their teacher who was informed of the compliment as coming from one of their

beautiful gardens. She was a worker in the Eastern Star and attended their meetings as long as she was able to do so. She was co-organizer, with Mrs. G. C. Boswell, of the Pio-

neer Study Club and has held every office in that organiza tion. She was active in the Hillcrest Cemetery Association and helped plan many of the improvements and beautifica tion projects where the bodies of her son Jack and her husband awaited her coming.

As her minister expressed at her last rites, she loved God and her church. She had recently time. completed the writing of the history of the McLean Methodist Church. She assembled the first scrap book for the Pioneer Study Club and was anxious to get well so she could help depict the story of these two organizations on the swinging panels at the museum. Under the IRS system, which has a different processing cycle for each type of return, the entire payment could be credited to one tax and a bill issued for the other.

Mr. Campbell said, "If one check or money order covers a 1970 estimated tax payment anda 1969 tax balance due, for example, when the returns are separated for processing, the entire payment might be credited to one tax, leaving the other tax unpaid." In such a situation, one tax would be overpaid and a refund issued, while on the other tax a bill would be sent, Mr. Campbell

Taxpayers should put their Social Security number on all checks or money orders sent to IRS, to make sure the payment is properly credited. Business taxpayers should put their Employer identification number on the check.



Bobwhite quail are not ne ually considered a migratory bird, but Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologist Don Davis is beginning to wonder. Last October, Davis tagged and spray-painted 442 birds for tracing purposes on the Matador Wildlife Area near Paducah. He expected the birds to stick around long enough for some data collection.

Just about the only birds collected out of the bunch were five shot south of Chillcothe in Hardeman County -- some 50 air miles from the point of release.




