EXPLOSIVES

Texas is one of 32 states where anyone can freely buy dynamite from anyone willing to sell it to him, but state and national officials are trying to put a stop to such easy access to the high explosive.

There is a state law to stop sales or possession of bombs or dynamite, but the list of exemptions to the law is so broad that almost anyone can fit as a legal dynamite buyer. Attorney General's office is working on a law to curtail the sale of explosives. Proposal will be submitted to the next session of the legislature.

A bill in Congress, supported by the Nixon Administration, that also would pose a federal ban on possession.

LEGISLATION PROPOSED

Coordinating Board of Texas State and University System is urging legislation to boost salaries in senior institutions from \$50 to \$125 a semester.

Spokesmen said students pay at least 25 per cent of the cost of education, and what the tuition fee hike would produce.

at the same time post action on a staff recommendation that it place new ceiling for the University of Texas at Austin (\$5,000) and Texas A. & M. University at Kingsville (\$7,500).

State and independent college spokesmen, meanwhile, are on the board for aid, including a "tuition equalization program" to place them in better competitive position with state-supported schools.

LEGISLATION APPROVED

CONSERVATION GROUP MEET

New Texas Conservation Foundation was chartered by Governor Smith to work toward making the state with a top notch of parks, scenic points, lakes, scientific and recreational areas.

This Foundation was authorized by the Legislature last year to facilitate state acquisition of lands by gift or purchase to accept money or property for parks, educational and scientific purposes.

He has received two awards for excellence, one at Memphis, and the other at Abilene. He is a 1964 graduate of Texas Tech University.

He and his wife Yvonne and daughter Debbie are living at 517 Dogwood in Pampa.

As a result of a fine performance in the Region I Meet, Steve Thacker has won the right to represent his school, district and region in the State Meet to be held in Austin on May 7, 8, and 9. Steve won second place in the 120 high hurdles and was also a participant in the 330 intermediate hurdles. This is the first time in some years McLean High School has been represented in Track at the State Meet. Congratulations are certainly in order for Steve. Dennis Duniven was participant in the Pole Vault and did a fine job.

The McLean Golf Team making their eighth straight trip to the Region I Meet also did a fine job. The "A" Team composed of Butch Lands, David Haynes, Rodney Bailey, Larry Boyd and Marx Melton shot a team score of 654 for third place in the field of fifteen schools. This is a team score that for many years would have won the Region I Tourney. The "B" Team of Stacy Howard, Greg Fabian, Rod Fabian, Jim Baker and Randy Martin shot a team score of 739 for tenth place in the fifteen team field. This is a good performance considering the fact they were the only "B" Team qualifying to the Regional Meet.

Butch Lands had two fine rounds of 79 and 76 and placed third as Regional Medalist only two strokes off first place. Had a few putts fallen Butch could have been in first place.

Roderic Fabian placed third in the Science Contest of the Spring Region I Literary Meet. Though this does not qualify Rod to the State Meet, it is quite a feat for a sophomore to place this high in a contest dominated by high school seniors. ### Highland General Hospital School Of Vocational Nursing

Applications will be taken Monday, April 27 through Friday, May 8 for the 1970-71 class of Vocational Nurses. A \$10 application fee is required but if the applicant is not accepted, the fee is refunded.

The total cost of the program is approximately \$310. This includes tuition fee, uniforms, textbooks and graduation expense. An L.V.N. can expect to earn between \$4,300-\$4,800 per year, after graduation.

Highland General Hospital School of Vocational Nursing is a State accredited school. This means the school is one that has met the requirements established by the State Board of Vocational Nurses Examiners. Highland General Hospital School has had fifty-two graduates and presently has thirteen students who will graduate in August and will be eligible to take the exam given by the State Board of Vocational Nurses Examiners. Upon successful completion of this exam the vocational nurses become an L.V.N.

The purpose of this program is to train men and women as Vocational Nurses to give nursing care under the supervision of professional registered nurses or a physician. The length of the school is forty hours per week for twelve months and the applicant must be between the ages of eighteen and fifty-five years; have completed the tenth grade or the equivalent; be a U. S. Citizen; be in good physical and mental health; and be able to pass the Texas Employment Commission test. If you are interested, please contact the Vocational School for further information.

### Gray County Reaches 28% Of Savings Bond Goal For 1970

In releasing The Department of the Treasury figures, County Bond Chairman George B. Cree announced that sales of United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in Gray County during March totaled \$23,782. During the first quarter of 1970 sales were \$118,760 for 28 per cent of goal achieved.

Texas purchased \$14,317,669 in Savings Bonds and Notes during March compared to March 1969 sales of \$13,684,597 - a 4.6 per cent increase. January-March sales totaled \$46,858,407 - 26 per cent of the state's goal of \$179.9 million.

Sales across the nation during the month amounted to \$458 million - 20.3 per cent above March 1969 sales. Exchanges of Series E Bonds for Series H amounting to \$62 million were reported for the first quarter - a 26 per cent increase over the \$56 million exchanged during 1969.

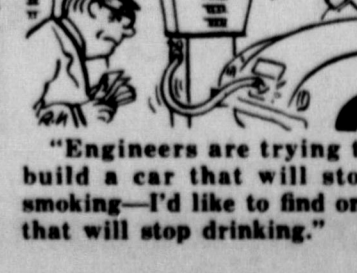

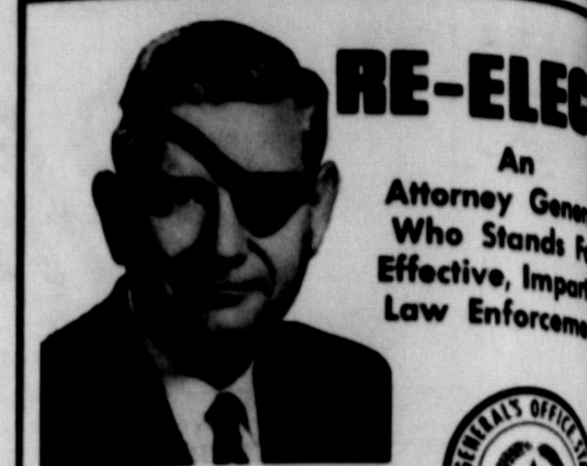

### News On Durable Press Clothes

Thanks to a new process developed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, durable press cotton is now abrasion resistant.

Wearing in men's trousers at knees, pockets and cuffs have been a problem with all-cotton durable press garments, according to Joanne Thurber, Extension consumer education specialist in clothing at Texas A&M University.

The new permanent sizing process improved abrasion resistance as much as five times on sample trouser cuffs. The sample also showed about 65 per cent greater strength than conventional durable press fabrics.

Miss Thurber says the sizing does not interfere with durable press qualities in clothes.

Mr. Campbell said that, in addition to saving tax dollars, good recordkeeping makes preparation of the tax return a much easier task.

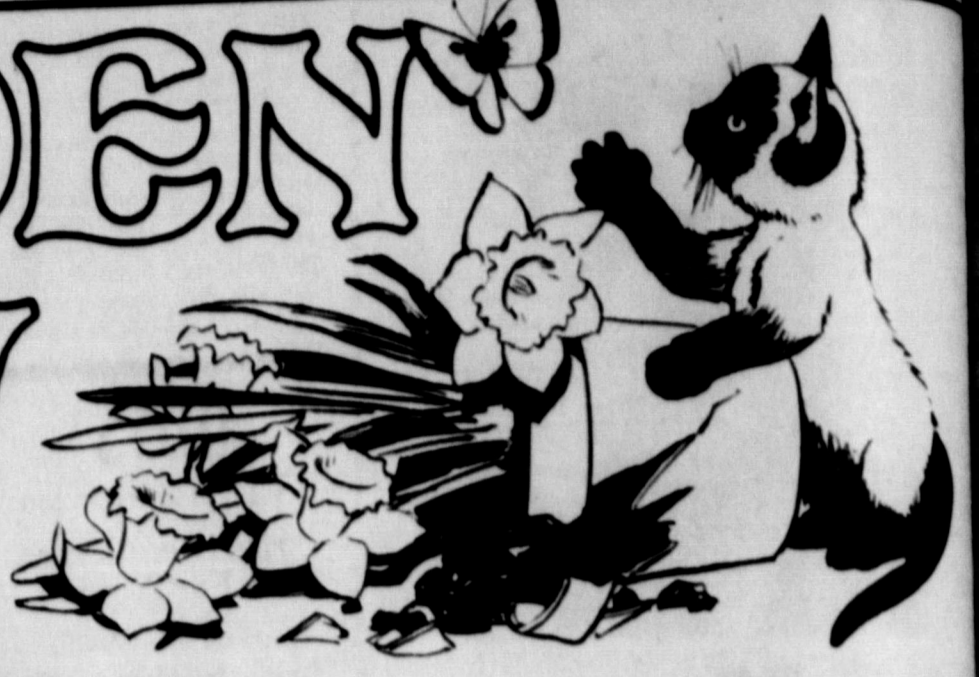
